THE FIRST BATTLE.

Three Boats of Sampson's Fleet Demolish Matanzas Forts.

TERROR CAPTURES A BIG PRIZE.

Land Force Withheld from Guba Until September.

CONGRESS WILL CONTINUE IN SESSION.

Stocks Advance at New York—England Regards Portugal as an Ally of Spain.

Matanzas Demolished.

On Board Flag Ship, New York, April 23—Commander Sampson's flag ship, New York, the monitor Puritan and the cruiser Cincinnati, after being fired upon returned eighty six shots into the Spanish forts at Matanzas silencing and destroying them in eighteen minutes. This engagement occurred at noon on Wednesday and was the first of the war. The movements of our ships and ship gunners was excellent, their accurate and effectual work fully meeting every expectation. The Spaniards failed to hit our boats at all, though they came near it several times. Loss of life among the Spaniards is supposed to be heavy, our loss none. The result of this engagement means that Havana is at our mercy.

She's a Terror.

Key West, April 28—The torpedo boat Terror is steaming in with a prize. She went out single handed and captured the Spanish steamer Guido. The steamer did not want to yield, but two solid shots close across her bow made the situation so serious that she hove to. The Guido was loaded with provisions for the Spanish army.

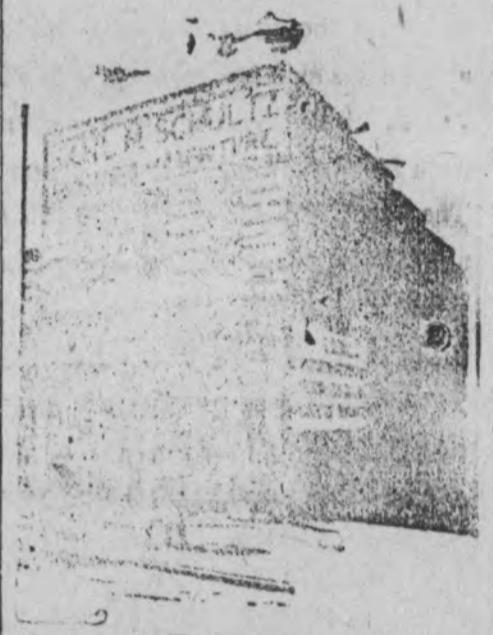

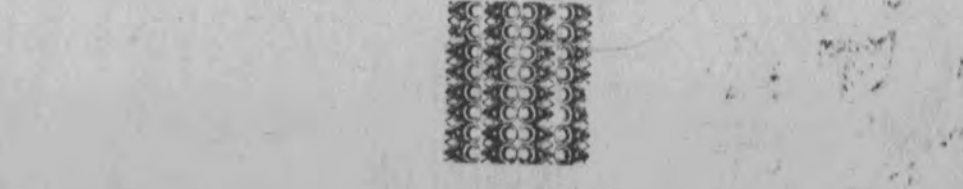
