## CAPT. DEWEY DID THE WORK. A Winner

His Fleet Captured Manilla and Sunk Three Spanish Vessels.

SPANISH CABINET ACKNOWLEDGES DEFEAT BUT DOES NOT GIVE UP.

Engagement Continued for Two Hours, American Loss Practically Nothing.

DEMANDS MADE FOR THE SURRENDER OF THE CITY AND MUNITIONS OF WAR.

Spain Requests British Consul to Negotiate for Cessation of Hostilities—Cable Operators Deserted Their Offices.

### Saturday Night Telegrams

After THE REFLECTOR for Saturday had been issued the following telegrams were received, and though they are a little old now we give them today as they are of some interest.

Washington, April 30—The House refused to accept the conference report on the Boutelle bill appropriating \$47,000,000 additional to the navy.

President McKinley is considering the matter of establishing a press censorship similar to that in operation during the civil war.

Key West, April 30—The court martial aboard the Terror ordered that the traitor Uglesias be shot at sunset today.

Rio Janeiro, April 30—The battleship Oregon and gunboat Marietta arrived here at six o'clock tonight. These are the boats that left the Pacific coast some weeks ago and about which there was much apprehension that they might be intercepted by Spanish warships.

### Spaniards Furious.

By Cable to Reflector, Madrid May 2—This government will establish martial law if the fury of the Spaniards over their defeats at the hands of the Americans continue.

### Success at Manilla

By Cable to Reflector, Hongkong, May 2—The American fleet is now bombarding the forts at Manilla. Commander Dewey expects to land his forces today.

### Spain Admits Defeat

By Cable to Reflector, London, May 2—Latest dispatches from Madrid say no American ships were destroyed in the engagement at Manilla yesterday. The Spanish cabinet admits defeat.

Washington, May 2, 10:45 a. m.—No official advices from the bombardment of Manilla have been received here up to this hour.

### Inhabitants Fleeing

By Cable to Reflector, Hongkong, May 2—The bombardment of Manilla is progressing and the inhabitants are fleeing to the interior for safety. The operators of the cable station in the midst of the forts have fled to save their lives.

### Don't Surrender Yet

Madrid, May 2—After discussing the Manilla defeat for four hours today the Spanish cabinet determined to continue the struggle to uphold national honor.

A dispatch from Hong Kong says that the Spanish sailors refused to leave their sinking ships but went down with them. Three Spanish vessels were lost in the battle.

### Sampson's Boys Cheer the News

Key West, May 2—The news of Commander Dewey's victory at Manilla was received here this morning and greeted with cheers from Sampson's fleet. They consider Spain's back bone broken and think that when the Cape Verd fleet gets this news they will not be so anxious to meet Sampson as they have intimated. Such victories for the Americans indicate that the war cannot last long.

A number of Cubans have gone to Tampa to join the army and act as scouts when Cuba is invaded.

### Spanish Fleet Annihilated.

By Cable to Reflector.

London, May 2—Reports to the British colonial office confirm Commander Dewey's annihilation of the Spanish fleet at Manilla. After destroying the fleet Dewey entered a demand for the surrender of the city, all munitions of war, and possession of the cable offices, otherwise he would bombard the city. The demand was rejected and the bombardment began today. Insurgents are also attacking the city and there is the wildest excitement among the fleeing inhabitants.

The British Consul, evidently at the solicitation of the Spanish authorities, has sailed to meet Dewey and ascertain his most favorable terms to cease the hostilities. All operators have deserted the cable offices. Capitulations are momentarily expected.

Yesterday's engagement between the American and Spanish fleets continued about two hours with the loss on the American side practically nothing!

## PITT COUNTY RIFLES

On Monday of last week Company H., Pitt County Rifles, held a meeting and upon taking a vote as to whether they would volunteer to go to Cuba if needed there were only three members in favor of it, though nearly the entire company expressed a willingness to go anywhere in the United States.

In some way the impression got out among the army officials at Raleigh that the company had volunteered, and on Thursday Capt. Smith received orders from the Adjutant General to move his command to Raleigh on Monday, May 2nd. Capt. Smith issued orders to the members to assemble at 2:30 P. M. Sunday to be in readiness to comply with the orders of the Adjutant General.

There was so much opposition to going manifested by some of the members that on Saturday the following telegram was sent:

Greenville, N. C., April 30th '98.  
 A. D. COWLES, Adjutant General,  
 Raleigh, N. C.

Your orders to go to Raleigh and the newspapers indicate that company H. has volunteered. My company has only offered to volunteer to go anywhere in the United States. Only three members offered to volunteer under the Hull Bill. This is intended to make our position clearly understood. My company will not volunteer under the call by the President for one hundred and twenty-five thousand troops. With this explanation shall we report at Raleigh on Monday, May second, or not, answer.

J. T. SMITH, Captain.

The reply to this was as follows:

Raleigh, N. C., April 30 '98.

 Greenville, N. C.

Have no authority to accept you conditionally, regret that is unnecessary to report here Monday.

A. D. COWLES, Adjutant General.  
 By this time there was a change of sentiment among many of the members, and several recruits also volunteering. Capt. Smith decided to let the company meet Sunday as ordered and take another vote, and notified the Adjutant General that he would wire again in regard to the company.

Recruits kept coming in until by the hour of meeting Sunday the muster roll had reached 65. The company assembled at the armory and after much discussion another vote was taken, thirty voting to follow the flag anywhere, thirty-five voting no. Capt. Smith wired the result to the Adjutant General in the following message sent at 4 o'clock:

Greenville, N. C., May 1 '98.  
 A. D. COWLES, Adjutant General,  
 Raleigh, N. C.

At a meeting of Co. H. held this afternoon thirty men volunteered to follow the flag anywhere. Thirty five declined to volunteer. What action shall I take? Answer,

J. T. SMITH, Captain.

It was about 9 o'clock when the following reply came:

Raleigh, N. C., May 1 '98  
 CAPT. J. T. SMITH,  
 Greenville, N. C.

Your gallantry with the brave thirty has my profound admiration but you cannot do the impossible. Regret your courageous band cannot go. I thank you all the same.

A. D. COWLES, Adjutant General.  
 Before this answer was received the number of volunteers had been increased to 40.

Capt. Smith notified the Adjutant General of this, but received another telegram from him as follows:

Raleigh, N. C., May 2 '98.  
 CAPT. J. T. SMITH,  
 Greenville, N. C.

With deep regret I cannot accept less than eighty men. Wait for second call.

A. D. COWLES, Adj. Gen'l.  
 This seems to end the matter so far as Company H. is concerned, and they have missed the opportunity of being the banner company of the entire State troops.

Meantime, by the enlistment at recruiting offices of the regular army all over the country, and the volunteering in local companies, just so many men are not only being removed from productive occupations, but are becoming charges upon the government—which is to say the people—for board, clothing and wages. The folks who stay at home and who don't think that war is going to cost them anything, will know better after they have tried it on. It is hardly worth while to refer to such matters at this time, for all of us are for Uncle Sam and Old Glory now; but still, it is just as well to be advertent to the cold facts of the situation as we go along.—Charlotte Observer.
