

War Costs \$1,500,000 Per Day.

The Secretary of the Treasury today received from the Secretary of War estimates of deficiencies in appropriations required for the use of the War Department for the remaining two months of the present fiscal year, aggregating \$34,019,997. This sum is necessary to organize the volunteer army and to place that and the regular army, increased to 61,000 men,

The estimate is entirely independent of the allotments made by the President to the War Department from the \$50,000,000 defence appropriation. This will indicate that up to July 1 next (two months) the increased expenditures on account of the war will be approximately \$90,000,000 -Washington Dispatch.




