War Costs \$1,500,000 Per Day.

The Secretary of the Treasury today received from the Secretary of War estimates of deficiencies in appropriations required for the use of the War Department for the remaining two months of the present fiscal year, aggregating \$34,019,997.

The estimate is entirely independent of the allotments made by the President to the War Department from the \$50,000,000 defence appropriation. This will indicate that up to July 1 next (two months) the increased expenditures on account of the war will be approximately \$90,000,000—Washington Dispatch.

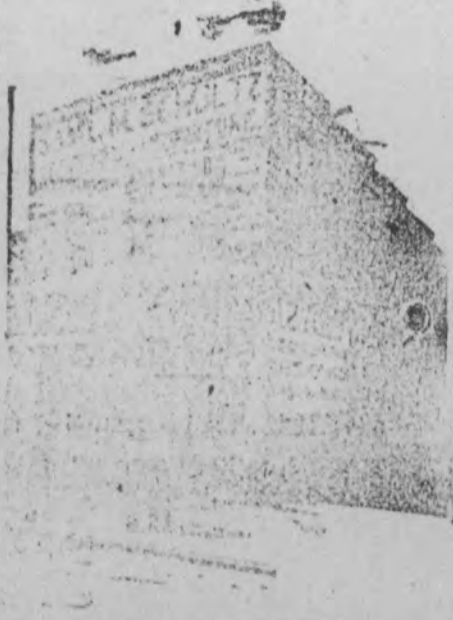

A Senseless Advance in Prices.

The World yesterday printed tables showing the advance made in the wholesale and retail prices of ordinary staple food articles since war was assured.

Flour has advanced 33 1/2 per cent., eggs about 17 per cent., hams about 17 per cent., potatoes 50 per cent., canned corn 20 per cent., beans 15 per cent., and so on through the list.

There is absolutely no sense in these advances. They represent no necessity, no condition, nothing whatever but the greed of the dealers.

All these articles of food are produced exclusively in this country, so far as this country's consumption is concerned. We have every prospect of producing more of them this year than ever before, while there is a practical certainty that we shall export less of them than usual while the war lasts.

They ought all to have declined in price. They would have done so but for the rapacity of dealers who make of the war an excuse for robbing the people in their home.—New York World.

Poetic Personifications of Evil.

Marlowe's Mephistopheles is the fiend of the English renaissance. Milton's satan and Bunyan's Apollyon are the solemn figures conjured up by Puritan faith and art in the time of England's greatest religious ferment. Lastly, Goethe's Mephistopheles typifies, in its cold cynicism and materialism, a spirit developed by that period in German history known as "Sturm und Drang." It is hardly true that Marlowe made a philosophical interpretation of the Faust legend. Such was neither his own nature nor the tendency of the art of his time. But if his tragedy as a whole is viewed in relation to the century it seems pregnant with the old warning, "What shall it profit a man if he gain the whole world and lose his own soul?" This is the somber moral tone in Marlowe's verse against the materialism of his own life and the selfish soul destroying rush for the finite in the renaissance period. "Dr. Faustus" is a dramatic version of a combination of popular stories and ideas, consisting of detached scenes often borrowed from the mere amusement of a vulgar audience, acted by characters constructed in the conventional types of common fancy, the whole action being impelled by a monstrous but pathetic spirit of evil, who is the embodiment of current superstition and belief and a mixture of the comic and sublime.—"Poet Lore."
