NO AMERICANS KILLED, BUT THREE HUN-DRED SPANIARDS SLAIN.

Dewy Heard From By Cable to Reflector.

Hong Kong, May 7 .- At an early hour this morning the Revenue Cutter McCullough, of Commodore Dewey's fleet, arrived here. A handsome officer of the American navy stepped off the gang plank and was soon surrounded by a crowd of eager Americans to learn of the true state of affairs at Manila. The officer proved to be Flag-Ship Lieutenant Brundy of the Olymphia. He brought the good news that Capt. Pewery was safe and that the Spanish Fleet was completely annihilated. The American fleet was unharmed, no Americans killed but Dress Goods, Notions, hree hundred killed and four hundred wounded.




