## MANILA HEARD FROM.

Capt. Dewey and His Gallant Fleet Safe and Unharmed.

NO AMERICANS KILLED, BUT THREE HUNDRED SPANIARDS SLAIN.

Entered the Harbor at Daybreak—Dewey Cut the Cable—Another Prize—Sampson at Porto Rico.

**Dewey Heard From**  
By Cable to Reflector.  
Hong Kong, May 7.—At an early hour this morning the Revenue Cutter McCullough, of Commodore Dewey's fleet, arrived here. A handsome officer of the American navy stepped off the gang plank and was soon surrounded by a crowd of eager Americans to learn of the true state of affairs at Manila. The officer proved to be Flag-Ship Lieutenant Brundy of the Olympia. He brought the good news that Capt. Dewey was safe and that the Spanish Fleet was completely annihilated. The American fleet was unharmed, no Americans killed but eleven injured. The Spanish fleet had three hundred killed and four hundred wounded.

Hong Kong, May 7.—Capt. Dewey cut the cable himself and held it, thereby cutting off all communication. Dewey destroyed all the cruisers, eight gunboats, one transport, and silenced the forts.

Norfolk, May 7.—The batteries and fort around Norfolk are being strengthened and harbor defences in perfect order. No fear of Spanish invasion. Many naval reserves in the city waiting for assignments to ships.

**Dewey's Official Report**

Washington, May 7.—Dewey's official report reads as follows:  
"Manila, via Hong Kong.—The squadron arrived at daybreak Sunday. Had immediate engagement. Destroyed the following Spanish ships: Cruisers Reina Christina, Isle de Cuba, Castello, Don Antonio, Duello, Don Juan de Austria, gunboats General Lezo and Marquis Del Suer, armed transport Isla de Nindoto. American squadron uninjured, and but few men slightly wounded. The only means of telegraphing is through American consul at Hong Kong. Shall communicate him immediately. DEWEY."

**Dewey's Report**  
By Cable to Reflector.  
Hong Kong, 2 p. m., May 7.—Thos. N. Brumley, Dewey's flag lieutenant arrived on the McCullough this morning having Commodore Dewey's official report of the Manila victory.  
Americans killed, none, slightly wounded six. Spaniards killed three hundred, wounded four hundred. Spanish fleet of eleven ships completely annihilated. The American fleet was unhurt by the large projectiles. The battle began at day break Sunday. Dewey safely passed the Corregidal mine fields during the night. The Reina Christina flung the challenge for the battle. The Olympia replied. Cavite gave a murderous fire on Americans. The Spanish flagship was soon on fire and Montigo had to transfer his flag to Isle de Cuba. Ten minutes later the Spanish Cruiser Castella was in flames. Dewey's gunnery drove Cavite's artilleries from guns repeatedly. The Olympia and Raleigh led the Yankee battle line. The Baltimore, Boston, Concord, Petrol and McCullough following. The Spaniards had two lines flanking the Reina Christina. The American warships kept constantly manouvering.  
The Spanish ships sunk or grounded were Reina Christina, steel cruiser, Castella, wooden cruiser, Vellasco, Don Juande Austria, cruisers, Isle de Cuba, Isla De Luzon, steel protected cruisers, Quiros, Vellalobos, Ellano, Marquis Del Suer, General Lezo, Marslined, steel gunboats and the transport Isla de Nindoto.

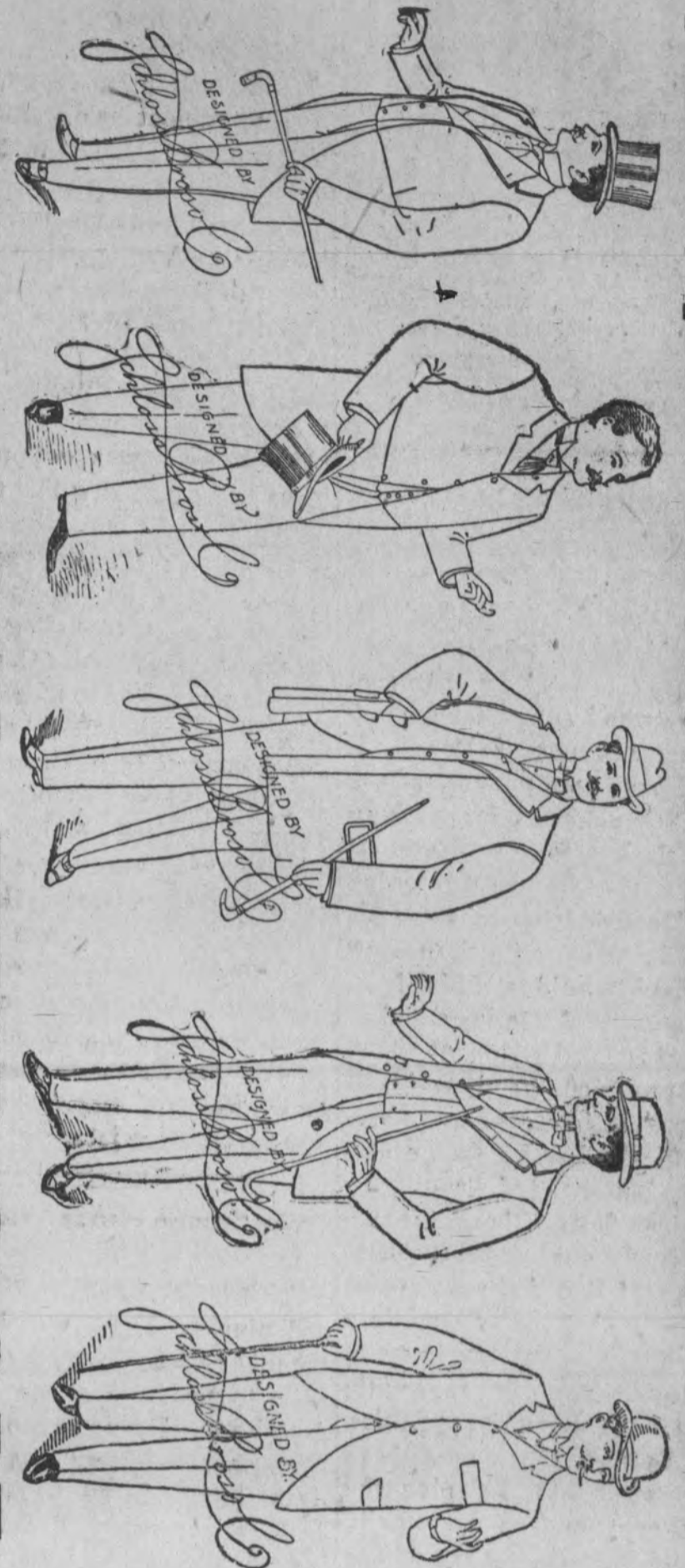
