## SAN JUAN TAKEN.

Battle There Yesterday with Only Slight American Loss.

### SAMPSON LOCATED SPANISH FLEET AND EXPECTED BATTLE TO-DAY.

Flying Squadron Left Hampton Roads at Day Break--Regiment of Troops Landed on Cuba--France Must Make Explanation to United States.

#### Related Telegrams

THE REFLECTOR received the following messages after the paper was printed Thursday evening:

Washington, May 12—The House Committee this afternoon made a favorable report on the bill for the annexation of Hawaii.

Halifax, May 12—A German steamer, Sophie Rickmers, arrived this afternoon and reports being hotly chased by Spanish warships off the New Foundland banks.

Washington, May 12—Assistant Secretary Allen visited President McKinley this afternoon and reported that he had received authentic information that the Spanish torpedo fleet was off the New England coast. McKinley and Long were very much excited over this and directed Allen to convey the information to the strategic board with instructions to act immediately. Allen hurried to the navy department while McKinley, Long and Alger held a conference over the situation.

Washington, May 12—Admiral Dewey wires that the Spanish warship Argus is sunk. He also wires that he is taking Spanish guns.

Philadelphia, May 12—Hamburg-American steamer Alsefe arrived here this afternoon and reports passing two Spanish warships off New Foundland banks on the fifth.

#### San Juan Surrenders.

Washington, May 13—Secretary Long this morning received Admiral Sampson's report saying that his fleet bombarded San Juan at day break yesterday morning, the battle lasting three hours. Both the batteries and city were damaged. One man of the New York's crew was killed, seven others were wounded. No serious damage done to our vessels.

#### Spanish Account

Madrid, May, 13—Spanish official account of the battle at San Juan says the damage done by the American fire is inconsiderable and that the Spanish loss is insignificant.

#### Account of the Battle

By Cable to Reflector.

St. Thomas, W. I., May 13.—Admiral Sampson's fleet at daybreak yesterday appeared before the harbor of San Juan, Porto Rico. After a severe bombardment of three hours they succeeded in reducing the fortifications. The fleet then steamed outside the port to wait for the Spanish Cape Verde fleet which was believed to be off Martinique. About five o'clock the squadron consisting of Iowa, Indiana, New York, Terror, Amphitrite, Detroit, Montgomery and Porter, entered the harbor, Detroit leading, followed by Iowa, both which opened fire upon Morro fort. They almost immediately silenced Morro and also fired upon the town, driving the Spaniards from their guns repeatedly. The Porter at short range drew Spanish fire in fearless manner. Spaniards mounted seven good guns but marksmanship was poor. They sent five hundred shots at the American fleet hitting New York once, killing a seaman, Wedemark, and breaking a leg of Sam'l Felman ordinary seaman, three others only slightly wounded. They also hit the Iowa once breaking an elbow of G. Merricks, seaman. R. C. Hill and John Mitchell were slightly hurt. These were the only injuries. Damage done ashore unknown but estimated large. Fleet now outside the harbor.

#### Flying Squadron Sails

Old Point, May 13—"Be ready to put to sea at early day break" was the signal displayed from Commodore Schley's flagship Brooklyn at one o'clock this morning. The signal was answered by all the ships of the flying squadron in Hampton Roads, and immediately the crews began tumbling out of their bunks to be in readiness for the long looked for active duty. As the fleet had been in readiness for sailing for several weeks little remained to be done but get the steam launches aboard and clear the decks. The nature of Commodore Schley's orders are not positively known, but it is understood that the Spanish Cape Verde fleet has been sighted off Martinique and that the squadron is going there to meet it.

#### France Must Explain

North Carolina was first to lose a soldier in the civil war of 1861-65, and North Carolina was the first state to lose a son in the present war with Spain. Ensign Worth Bagley, whose death was reported in Thursday's dispatches, was a young man of Raleigh. He was an Annapolis graduate and had rapidly advanced along the line of promotion until he had reached the position of second officer in command of the Winslow, the boat to which he was assigned and on which he was killed in the battle at Cardenas. Mr. Bagley was one of the States best young men and had a wide circle of friends. He was a brother-in-law of Mr. Josephus Daniels, editor of the Raleigh News and Observer.

The Methodist Conference in session at Baltimore has put itself on record against dancing, card playing, theatre and circus going, etc. The following memorial was presented to the Conference in the form of a question and answer:

Question—What shall be done to prevent the spread of worldliness among our churches, especially in its most open forms?

Answer—(1) Let our preachers and members faithfully observe our general rules which forbid softness or needless self-indulgence and the taking of such diversions as cannot be taken in the name of the Lord Jesus. (2) When any of our members engage in dancing, card playing or horse-racing, or attend upon theatre, circus, dances, or join social clubs which furnish intoxicating liquors for the members, the pastor shall give private reproof to the offender. If there be any acknowledgement of the fault and promise of amendment the person may be borne with, otherwise the preacher must take with him two or three faithful friends who shall labor to bring the offender to proper repentance; but if he will not hear them, and there be no sign of amendment, the offender must be dealt with as in case of immorality.

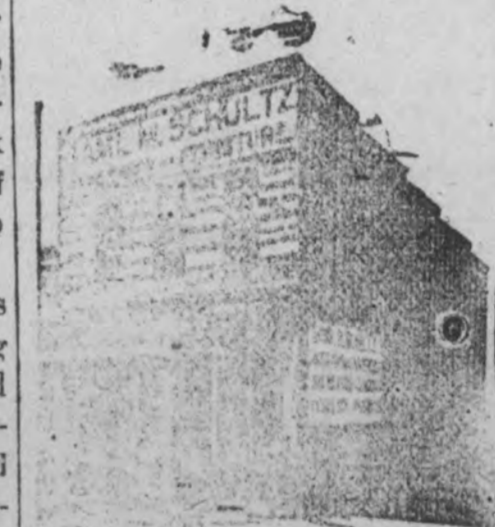
