No Excitement in the War News.

SPAIN OFFERING PAY TO OTHER NATIONS TO HELP HER.

American Ship Reported Blown Up--Merrett may Lose his Commission--War, Bills and Other Measures Before the Senate.

Hospital Burned
By Telegraph to Reflector.
St Hyacinthe, May 16--The hospital conducted by nuns, known as Mataire, burned. It is believed twelve perished. Bodies of two boys named Branchemin, three novitiates and Mrs Fuertin, a barber, recovered. Two servants, another lady boarder and two nuns are missing. The wife of Dr. Chagnon, of Fall River, Mass., jumped from a window and was killed.

The Dodging Fleet

London, May, 17--The story is printed here that the Spanish Cadiz fleet is due at Canaries. This explains the Spanish seizure of cables there.

Without Foundation.

Havana, May 17--It is reported that the American vessel engaged in removing torpedoes at Cabanas is blown up and the entire crew perished.

Washington, May 17--The navy department has no information of the above report.
Havana, May 17--Report of blowing up of American ship as Cardenas is confirmed by later dispatches which say seventeen lives were lost.

Still There

New York, May 17--St. Pierre, Martinique, dispatches report the Spanish torpedo boat Terror is still there undergoing repairs at Fort de France.

London dispatches say according to best advices there the Spanish cruisers mentioned as leaving Cadiz are still there and not ready for sea. It is thought this report is sent out to distract attention from the Cape Verde fleet.

Another Trap

Key West, May 17--The blockading on the northern coast of Cuba is without incident. The Wilmington found a derelict floating about loaded with car wheels of American make. The ship was deserted and her masts chopped off. It is thought it had been sent out for American ships to run against and be sunk. The Wilmington fired four shots into and sunk her.

Washington, May 17--Muster reports received at the War department show eighty two thousand volunteers now in service. It is expected one hundred thousand will be enrolled by Saturday.

Paying Troops

Washington, May 17--The Senate passed a bill to pay troops, those going to Phillipines to receive a months advance pay. Senator Jones, of Arkansas, spoke for Democrats on war revenue bill, saying men of all parties are united on the war question, but he opposed unnecessary burdens on the people. Senator Allison's statement that three hundred and seventy-five millions would be needed for the first year of the war was higher than the statement before committee of secretaries Gage and Alger.

Regular Soldiers Wanted

Washington, May 17--General Merrett says he needs five thousand regular soldiers to accompany volunteers to Phillipines. Must have that number of seasoned and trained men. The War department decided this morning to send that number, and will probably make it twenty-five thousand in all.

May Lose His Commission

Washington, May 17--After the cabinet meeting this afternoon in a conference with the President by Secretary Alger and Dr. Bourne, a friend of Gen. Merrett, it was reported that Merrett said what the papers quote him as saying his commission is in danger and he may not be sent to Phillipines.

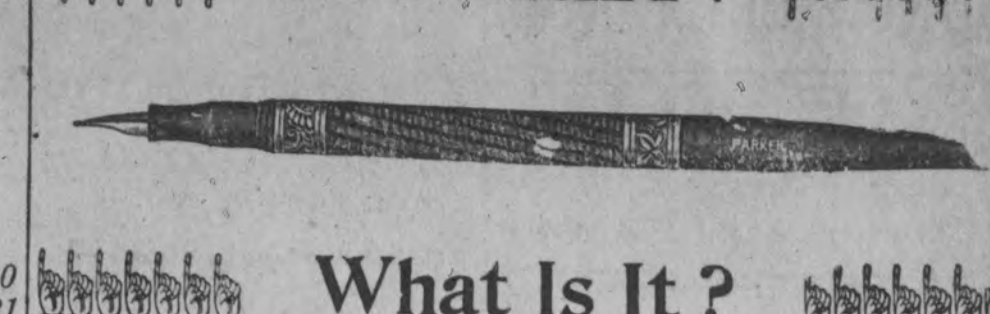
