SPAIN OFFERING PAY to OTHER NATIONS TO HELP HER.

American Ship Reported Blown
Up--Merrett may Lose his Commission--War, Bills and Other
Measures Before the Senate.

St Hyacinthe, May 16—The hospital conducted by nuns, known as Mataire, burned. It is believed twelve perished. Bodies of two boys named Branchemin, three novitiates and Mrs Fuertin, a barder, recovered. Two servants, another lady boarder and two nuns are missing. The wife of Dr. Chagnon, of Fall River, Mass., jumped from a window and was killed.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

From our Regular Correspondent.) Washington, May 16, '98

· Spain fooled us good in that game of hide and seek it played with its Cape Verde fleet, and it is greatly feared that the fleet now has it in its power to choose whether it will fight Admiral Sampson's fleet, which battered the forts in the harbor of San Juan Porto Rice, a few days ago or Schley's flying-Commodore squadron, which is now for the first time acting up to its name enter a Cuban harbor without fighting, or make a wash for some of our coast cities. This state of affairs would be exasperating were it not for the satisfaction everyone feels in knowing that this Spanish fleet is actually in American waters. It may dodge us tor awhile, but it is bound to be our game in the end. The end will be at once if the Spanish fleet dares to fight either of our fleets. One man's guess is about as good as another's about the intention of the Spanish fleet, but a few days will show them.

The postponement of the sending of troops to Cuba made necossary by the presence of the Spanish fleet in American waters is less aggravating than it appears the staff. This incompetency to be. In fact, it is a good thing for us. Had the original plan of landing troops in Cuba last week been carried out, we should not have been able to lard a sufficient number to capture Havana, which in defended by somethings like 80,000 Spanish soldiers, owing to the inability of the government tofurnish equipments needed by the volunteers; and any delay in whipping the Spaniards out of Cuba after our army goes over there will be calculated to lesson our prestige among the nations of the world Dewey's men at Manila and the succession of brave and da ing deeds performed by the men on the ship engaged in blocksding Cuban ports have placed our navy among the foremost fighters of the world, and it would be very humiliating for our army not to make an equally creditable showing when it goes to Cuba. It is therefore abso-Intely necessary that a sufficient number of men properly equipped to accomplished what they go to do should be sent to Cuba. The delay will serve to place the army on a proper footing. Just to give an idea of the deficiency in army equipments, it may be mentioned that the government has purchased the entire visable supply of tenting canvass in the country and yet has only enough to make about half the tents the army will -require; the milis are working on the rest.

The war revenue bill reported to the senate from its Finance Committee is in many respects a marked improvement upon what it was when it was sent over from the House. It now provides for the immediate issue of \$150,000,000 in greenbacks, and for assuing churches. \$42,000,000 in silver certificates to represent the seignorage on the silver bullion owned by the government, which it directs to be coined. It taxes all sorts of corporations, and strikes out the authority for issuing bonds.

A caucus of the democrats ci the House may be held this week for the purpose of discussing the joint resolution providing for the annexation of Hawaii, which has been favorably reported to the House, and deciding upon the advisability of making it a party question. There are a number of democrats in the House who are opposed to annexation. It is the same in the Senate, but tha Democrats of the latter body long ago decided not to make annexation a party question, and the chances are that the same course will be followed in the House To attempt to do otherwise would be to compel those Democrats who favor annextion to bolt the action of the party caucus. It is, of course, in the power of a majority of the Democrats in the House to make opposition to annexation a party question, but it is not in their their power to control democrats who have committed themselves to annexation. There was no sign that the Democratic party as a whole endorsed President Cleveland's anti-annexation polley; on the contrary, there were many signs of opposition there to. If there ever was a time that opposition to the annexation of Hawail could wisely have been made party policy, it has long ago passed.

Hunderd Millions Yearly in Flame and Smokes .




