Between the Fleets, but Daily Expected—Minor News of the Days.

#### Customs Abolished.

Madrid, May 23—Havana dispatches says custom duties on provisions has been abolished at all blockaded ports.

#### Oregon at Key West

Washington, May 23—The navy department is advised that the Oregon arrived at Key West this morning. No details given.

#### Spanish Tactics

Key West, May 23—Search lights on Morro castle were not burning Saturday night. Naval officials are mystified at Spanish tactics.

There was a heavy gale in the gulf Sunday that sent crafts scudding before the wind or hugging the Cuban coast for shelter. No casualties reported.

#### Without Confirmation

Washington, May 23.—No confirmation has been received by the Navy Department of the report of the engagement off Mole St. Nicholas and the story is discredited. Something may develop shortly in that vicinity, as Schley and Sampson are both cruising in that direction and the Spanish fleet is not far distant. Schley left Key West Thursday and Sampson left Friday. The latter has 800 miles to go while Schley had 600. Both were due there by noon to day.

#### Spanish Fortifications

Gibraltar, May 23.—It is stated that the Spanish government will fortify part of Gibraltar bay that is still under Spanish control.

An engagement between Spaniards and insurgents was fought Thursday 15 miles west of Matanzas in view of the blockading fleet. About 300 men were on each side and the firing continued until after dark.

#### Spanish Coast in Darkness

Madrid, May 23.—The buoys in Cadiz harbor have been removed and all lights extinguished. No vessels are permitted to move in or out the harbor during the night.

#### N. C. Troops Wrecked

Savannah, May 23—Early this morning the fourth section on the Florida Central train enroute to Tampa with the first North Carolina regiment, collided with the north bound freight. Private W. M. Barbee of Company I., of Durham, was instantly killed, having his head crushed between two cars. Private J. M. Colough, of same town and company, was injured so badly that he cannot recover. The freight had no air brakes and couldn't stop in time to avoid the collision.

#### Zola's Second Trial

Paris, May 23—The second trial of Zola on the charge of defaming the army began in Versailles Assizes this morning. Zola's counsel declared the court incompetent as the offense occurred in Paris. Pending decision the case was suspended.

#### Prize Court

Key West, May 23.—Five captured Spanish prizes have been condemned, the aggregate value of which is \$1,500,000. This will be divided among the officers and crews of the blockading fleet. Arguments are in progress today on the Panama, Cataluna, Buena Ventura and Miguel Jova.

The British steamer Ardanmosor has been again captured and was brought in this morning in charge of an ensign from Ouceola. She is loaded with lumber but a search beneath the lumber may reveal something else. The same ship was captured once before and released.

## A Bell-Chickens-Soldiers.

Mr. F. E. Hege, the director of the poultry division of the experiment station, has as next door neighbors the Second Regiment. If soldiers have an insatiable taste for nothing it is a nice chicken. Of these Mr. Hege has some 600. On numerous occasions in months past the chickens at the experiment station have been reduced in numbers by chicken thieves. On one occasion eighty fine fellows disappeared in one night.

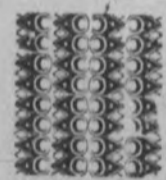
