Reported Engagement in Yesterday's News not Correct—Sampson Ordered to Take San Juan and Land Troops—Schley will Attend to Servera.

Oregon All Right.

Jupiter, Fla., May 26--The battleship Oregon arrived here last night. A Dispatch boat from the Oregon which anchored out, put in about midnight with telegrams to officers' families and navy department. Capt. Clark, commanding the Oregon, steered Oregon, Marietta and Buffalo far out of course usually taken for safety. All hands are much rejoiced at safe arrival. The Oregon may go to Hampton Roads for slight repairs but nothing serious is required.

Insurgents Siding With Spain.

Madrid, May 25--General Blanco telegraphs the government that only four American gunboats are along the Cuban coast from Havana to Santiago. A Hong Kong dispatch says the Spanish captain of the revenue cutter Caliao, captured by Dewey, was shot by the Spaniards for failing to return Dewey's fire. Official Manila dispatch says insurgent leaders commanding 30,000 native volunteers offer services to Gen August i.

First Manila Expedition.

San Francisco, May 25--The first expedition ever sent by the United States to a foreign country sails this afternoon to Manila. The Pekin, Sydney and Australia carry 2,600 men and officers, the latter being the flagship and bearing General Anderson and staff.

Affairs in Manila

London, May 25--A Times special from Manila says the city is tranquil. Foreign cruisers there have taken concerted action for the protection of foreigners in emergency. Rebels lack firearms and are consequently delaying attack on Manila garrison. Advice from Hong Kong say riots are frequent in Manila and houses are being burned daily by rioters. The Archbishop of Manila announces that four Spanish warships are on the way to Manila and prophesies a great Spanish victory.

While the navy department admits nothing it is believed this knowledge enabled the department to deny so positively that a battle was fought in the windward passage. As to the future movement of Sampson and Schley the matter is left to Sampson's discretion and judgment. Whether he will force Cervera out or keep him in the trap is not known outside of official circles.

New Orders

Washington, May 25--The second call for volunteers apportions them among the several States, territories and District of Columbia according to population. Following call, it is semi-officially announced that twenty thousand troops will go to Porto Rico, under convoy of Sampson, who is ordered to proceed to San Juan and reduce fortifications immediately. The Old And The New Opportunity.

When this war broke out we had every opportunity to end it quickly.

If Dewey's splendid performance had been followed up by the destruction of the Havana forts, by the conquest of Porto Rico, by the capture of Matanzas or by any other operation of the kind, there would have been an immediate end to the war.

Spain was already on the brink of a revolution. It needed only one or two more decisive victories to end the war as Napoleon's wars were ended.

But our Washington boards of strategy are not Napoleonic. They have pattered and paltered and wasted time till the great opportunity is lost.

They have unwittingly played into the hands of the Spanish. Instead of sending our great naval engines of destruction to repeat Dewey's performance, they have kept them dodging about all the seas in search of an elusive fleet whose sole purpose was to avoid battle and to restrain our ships from everything like decisive action by ingenious manoeuvring.

The result is that we now have a prolonged war on our hands, when we might have made an end of the affair in thirty days. We have given Blanco time to stretch telegraph wires all around Cuba, and we have thus multiplied his power to concentrate troops and resist our landing.

We shall "do the job," of course. But the cost of its doing, both in money and in brave men's lives, will be very greatly increased because of Sunday-school strategy and debating-society direction of military operations.

Why not even now make an end of the pottering? Why not turn Sampson and Schley and the military people loose and let them do the work? Napoleon said that "one bad general is better than two good ones." Surely one bad general under orders to capture Cuba would do more than any board of strategy bent upon making the most peaceful and bloodless war possible.

"You cannot make an omelet without breaking eggs," said Bismarck. And the more promptly we proceed to break eggs the fewer eggs shall we have to break.—New York World.

It is a noble act in a man when he sees his mistake to stand up and acknowledge it. And it is those kind of honest men who left the Democratic party four years ago, that may be expected to be seen voting with their "old mother" this year.—Louisburg Times.

His story is that John Coleman approached him with a small lock and offered to bet that he could not unlock it. He took the lock and unlocked it quite easily. In a few minutes John Hall came up and looked at the lock again and offered to bet Fulcher \$5.00 that he could not unlock it. The young man replied that he knew he could because he had just done so. The negro persisted in his banter for a bet and the money was staked. To Fulcher's great astonishment he found that he could not work the spring and the negroes walked off with his five dollars. The case was reported to the police and both Coleman and Hall were arrested and locked up to await a hearing before Mayor Wright. The charge is gambling. The \$5.00 was not recovered.—Wilmington Star.

An Exchange of Refs

The heart of North Carolina has been deeply touched at the way the South has taken up arms in behalf of the Union, and its expression of admiration is taking on a patriotic form. The proposition is to return to the South all the captured battle flags now held in the North. The Grand Army of the Republic, at its meeting in Cincinnati, will probably recommend that his proposition be carried into effect.

A number of leading Republican papers are advocating this movement, among them the Cincinnati Commercial-Tribune, which says: "The time to give back the captured flags has come. Ohio wants no longer the trophies taken from her sister States so long ago. She would rather restore them once more into the hands and the tender care of those who first bore them aloft as a token of love for her sister Commonwealths, whose defeat in war has long since been turned into victory of peace and plenty."

This is all right, and if they insist upon restoring our captured flags, we will receive them, but at the same time we will insist upon being allowed to show some magnanimity, too, in sending a cargo of captured swords, flags and other mementoes back to the North in exchange. It is a good time to make the swap and wipe out old scores along that line.—Charlotte Observer.

The Distance to Manila.

The distance from Gibraltar to Manila, by way of the Suez Canal, is 8,354 miles, thus: From Gibraltar to Port Said, 1,820 miles; through the canal, 99 miles; from Suez to Aden, 1,310; from Aden to Colombo 2,130, from Colombo to Singapore, 1,500; from Singapore to Manila, 1,435. It must, however, be remembered that passage of the Suez Canal, though short in distance—99 miles—takes a considerable time, as it must be made very slowly. The canal, by a convention signed October 29, 1888, is exempted from blockade, and vessels of all nations, whether armed or not, are to be allowed to pass through it in peace or war. The distance to Manila from San Francisco is 7,050 miles, thus: From San Francisco to Honolulu, 2,089 miles, from Honolulu to Manila, 4,961. This shows a difference in favor of the passage from San Francisco of 1,304 miles.—New York Tribune.

A Thrilling Meeting.

Col. Parker, one of the most prominent of the visiting veterans and Dr. Kell, of Providence, had a meeting on the square Friday, which thrilled many who witnessed it. The two old soldiers were shot down on the same field of battle, falling side by side. They became friends. After the war each went to his respective home and they had not met since until Friday. They met in front of Jordan's. There was a look of recognition, a start of surprise, and then each opened his arms and the other fell into them. The scene was a touching one.—Charlotte Observer.

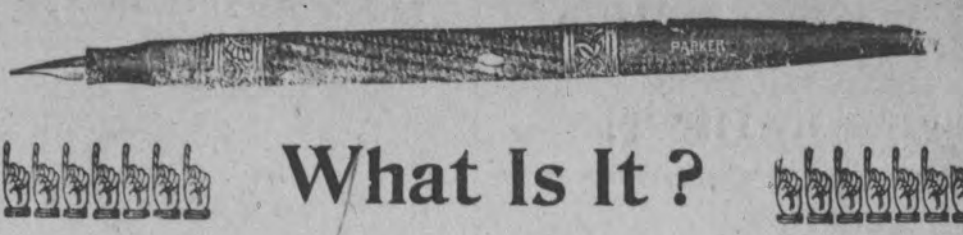

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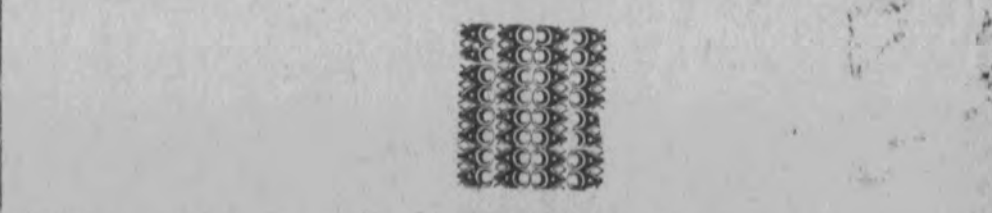
