VIZCAYA CAPTURED

Maine and Turn Her Over to Sigsbee.

Key West, June 4--Commander warship here states that the Spanish Vizcaya. was captured at Santiago this morning. The Spanish fleet attempted to leave the harbor when the Americans fired effectively. The Vizcaya was disabled so that she could not retreat. The Christobal Colon and other Spaniards were driven back.

Washington, June 4 .-- The discussion of the war revenue bill was resumed in the Senate this morning. There being no amendment up Allison dema ded a vote on the measure. Jones obstructed, alleging that no quorum was present. The count showed an exact quorum. B fore the vote could be taken Morgan introduced an amendment which he gave notice of yesterday requiring Secretary of the Treasury to execute the income tax on provisions of the law of ninety four.

In the Senate this afternoon Morgan's income tax amendment to the war revenue bill was rejected by a vote of 38 to 35. Senator Turner, Democrat of Indiana, offered an amendment imposing a tax of one percent. on transportation companies doing business between any State and a foreign country. This amendment was also rejected by a vote of 38 to 35.



I was sadly mistaken in my opinion of Roger Lee Meadows when I told you in my last letter that he would do the square thing by our company and by Lieut. H. M. Snuggs, Yesterday after we left Auj. Gen. Cowles' office and the whole power of arranging the unpleasant affair satisfactory was left in he hands of Lee Meadows, he (Meadows) said: I never intended to undermine Lieut.
