## A Prayer to the God Who Avenges

An interesting editorial in the Vicksburg, Miss., Herald is as follows:

"A translation has been made of a remarkable prayer, offered by the congregation of the 'House of Jacob,' at a special service held at the 'Wall of Wailing,' in Jerusalem. It is an invocation asking victory for the United States in the war with Spain. The closing sentence is a vivid recognition of the Divine claim of vengeance as well as a token of the vital memory in which the Jewish people treasure up their wrong-doers:

"Avenge the blood of Thy servants that has been shed by a cruel nation and crush thine enemies forever, in order that it may be known among all the inhabitants of the earth that Thou our God, art a righteous Judge between the nations, and that all the tyrants shall recognize Thy power and the glory of Thy kingdom. For Thou O God, art the King of the universe. And may a Redeemer come unto Zion. Amen."

"In all the centuries of categories of cruelties and oppressions meted out to the children of the House of Jacob, those they suffered in Spain 400 years ago surpass all since the massacre by the Roman Emperors. Why should they not rejoice, and read in the slaughters in the China and the Caribbean seas, a verification of their faith in the vengeance of the Almighty?"

It is not an insignificant fact that the historians admit that Spain's decadence had its beginnings in the expulsion of the Jews from her borders, after she had persecuted them with all the tortures of the inquisition. It was the sawing off of the limbs upon which she sat. It was a suicidal act, but bigotry is always blind to its own interests. The Jews, with their splendid thrift, energy, ability and intellect—the traders, the ship-owners, the bankers of the country—were the very life of Spain. That act of Spain's is without the shadow of a doubt down on the books of the Righteous Judge. It does not seem that it could be a mere accident of blind chance that one of the court of inquiry which passes upon the cause of the blowing up of the United States battleship Maine in Havana harbor was Judge Advocate Adolph Marix, a splendid type of the Hebrew race and a patriotic servant of the United States, now in command of one of her war vessels. There seems rather to be a very peculiar fitness in the circumstance.

We knew that the Jews of the United States were among the most loyal upholders of the Stars and Stripes, but it is gratifying to know that the sympathies of all the Scattered Nation are with the United States, that the 40,000 Jews of Jerusalem are imploring Jehovah to bless the American arms with success.—Charlotte Observer.

From our Washington Correspondent. WASHINGTON, D. C. July, 30 '98.

Mr. McKinley and his advisers have had more need for all their wits than now that Spanish trickery has made a start through the French Ambassador for the opening of "negotiations" for peace. They have got to remember that while no European power would dare to fight the United States, there are several of them that would be only too glad to aid Spain in getting the best of us through diplomacy.

There is much anxiety to know how Mr. McKinley will meet the Spanish peace play, and fear is expressed that his desire to bring the war to a close may cause him to get caught in some diplomatic trap that may cost this country a whole lot of money.

The news from Gen. Miles is entirely satisfactory, as far as it goes. He had no trouble in landing on Porto Rico early this week, without the loss of a man, and his force is being daily increased by new arrivals.

Admiral Sampson's report of the fight that resulted in wiping out Cervera's fleet was received by the Navy Department and made public this week. It is more satisfactory to Commodore Schley's friends than was the cablegram sent the day of the fight, which seemed to indicate an intention on Sampson's part to appropriate to himself credit that properly belonged to Schley.

Official dispatches from Gen. Shafter bear out the contentions of those who have been claiming right along that the cases of yellow fever in our army were much more numerous than anything given out by the War Department indicated.

According to Shafter's statement, that fit of sulks in which Gen. Garcia took himself and his insurgents away from the vicinity of our army was inevitable, since Garcia asked for more than Shafter had any authority to give him, in the way of official recognition for himself and the government he represents.

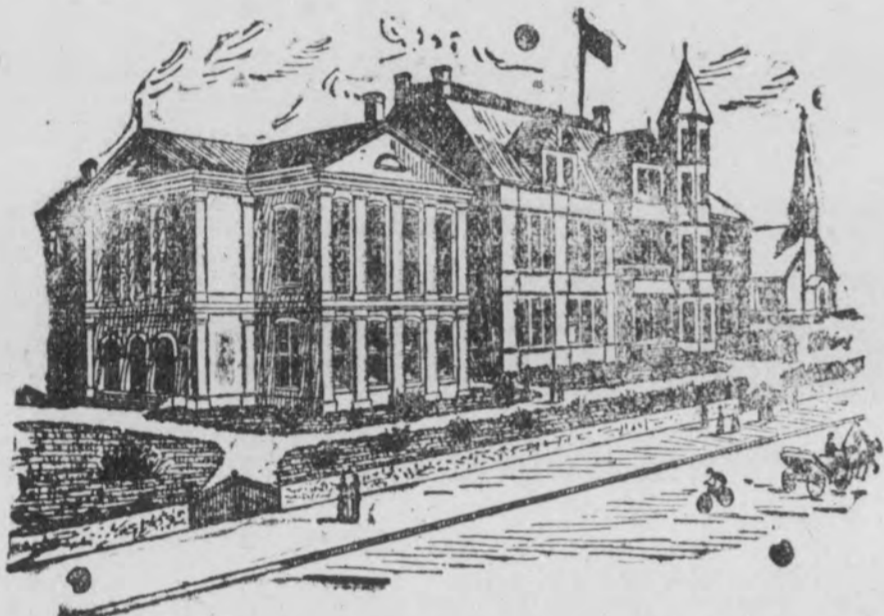

I will, kind reader, your attention claim,  
To show how drink affects the human frame.  
It swells the liver to enormous size,  
And gives the toper jaundiced face and eyes.  
The stomach also gets diseased by drink,  
Its coatings thicken and its foldings shrink;  
The gastric fluid soon its strength doth lose,  
And bilious toppers solid food refuse,  
Till tremors strong their feeble members seize,  
Relax their nerves and lead to heart disease.  
But most of all does drink affect the brain  
And often ends by making man insane.  
What would old Socrates and Plato say  
Could they return to enjoy the light of day  
And see us, Christians, Nature's gifts abuse,  
Indulge the beastly appetites, and lose,  
For vile indulgence, health and wealth and life,  
Exchanging peace and happiness for strife?

**TRUE MORAL STRENGTH.**

No Manliness in Adhering to Virtues Which Are in Harmony With the Disposition.

It is not only unmanly, says Charles Follen Palmer in "Inebriety," but mean-spirited, for the intemperate man to declare that, although he is weak on the one point of getting drunk, he is especially strong on other temptations; that, although he gives away to inebriety, he does not do so in other vices, such as gambling, lying, stealing, taking undue advantages of another in a bargain, scandal-mongering, bearing false witness, adultery and the like. He deceives himself and attempts to deceive others when he says so, for he knows that he does not exercise any strong force of moral resistance to these, and that the reason he does not yield to them is because he has no strong tendencies or inclinations in such directions. If they possessed one-half the power over him that drink does, he would yield to every one of them. There is no manliness in adhering to virtues which are in harmony with the disposition—no moral advancement whatever; for it might be harder to gamble than not to gamble, to take advantage of another than not to do so, to commit adultery than to subdue the prudent fear of consequences, to steal than not to steal.

The truth is that he will exhibit greater moral strength in fighting against his one great temptation, drink, than in any other direction, and it is in this one direction that his restoration to the full stature of man is to come.

The temperance zealot, lacking the appetite or desire for liquor, may be much less the man, as far as drink goes, than the inebriate who resists his craving for drink five times out of ten; and so it is with every virtue in the calendar. We are only strengthened, developed, and made rightful claimants and possessors of the title and dignity of manhood by our successful fightings with every form of weakness.

A large number of men and women go through life with the credit of being manly men and moral women, who have never had the temptation sufficiently strong and potent for a kitten not to resist on the score of impropriety, and who yet fail to resist even these.

**Inebriety in the Young.**

It sometimes happens, says Charles Follen Palmer in "Inebriety," that evidences of inebriety exhibit themselves very early in life. If this be the case it shows unmistakably that the youth is organically unbalanced, that his brain centres are disturbed, and that all effeminate treatment will be only adding to the intensity of the disease. There must be no delay, no indulgence, in the hope that he will see the error of his ways, and amend of his own moral violation, and the same association and home discipline can be maintained.

The environment must be broken immediately, and the patient regarded not as a wilful violator of decency, of religion and the sacred home, to be punished for his wilful sinning, but as one who has suddenly developed symptoms of a dangerous mental malady which requires immediate restorative measures to cure. And as the only known cure of disease of the nervous mental organization, involving the loss of self-control and the power of moral resistance, is by strengthening the self-control by thoroughly building up the general health of mind and body, so immediate steps should be taken to carry out every available plan of doing this, continually bearing in mind that the new training and treatment must begin at the foundation and be very gradual.
