## AN IDEAL HEALTH RESORT

SEVEN SPRINGS, N. C., Aug 23, 1898.

The present season at Seven Springs being the most successful in its history is very largely due to the enterprise of the proprietor, M. C. F. Smith and the manager, M. W. M. Uzzie. This is his first season in charge and they began in a way that will make the resort an exceedingly popular one. M. C. F. has purchased the property and he is interested beyond all other persons for a while season, therefore what he does is with an eye to making the possibility of the place permanent. As rapidly as possible he adds improvement to the property and his efforts in that direction will not cease until Seven Springs becomes a health resort with modern conveniences.

Nature has indeed opened a lavish hand in showing her gifts upon this spot. One acquainted with it might imagine that being so far from the world, the springs are very fine. Except to be compared with the best of them. The land in the vicinity bears a striking resemblance to the foot hills of the mountains in the western part of the State. Spain Scored A Great Point

That the commission should meet in Paris, instead of, as was originally proposed, in Washington, is a martial concession to Spain. The Spanish and the American authorities both knew that the concession would prove distinctly advantageous to Spain; that the making of it by the United States would strengthen the hands of the Spanish commission. Why it should do so is obvious. With the exception of England, there is not a government in Europe that has not, in one way or another, indicated, if not rather too ostentatiously shown, its sympathy with Spain throughout our quarrel with her.

The meeting of the commission will present as a condition, if not as a spectacle, all the great powers, save England, ranged upon the side of Spain aggressively and determinedly against the United States. Spanish diplomacy being subtle, insincere, crafty, is not an easy thing to deal with; it will be

much harder to deal with when it is tutored and counselled by the diplomacy of continental Europe. There is not a government of the continent that does not angrily resent the appearance, as a power to be forever reckoned with, of the United States in the East; there is not one which at Paris will not aid Spain in all her devices to deprive us by arts of diplomacy of the fruits of victory won by the art, of war. The United States government could afford to make such concessions only in case it meant to appoint to the commission its ablest and strongest men. In the two appointments the President has made he has recognized this necessity. He has appointed men of the first rank: In completing his list of appointments he should, with like wisdom and patriotism, appoint to the peace commission no men of lesser rank.—Philadelphia Ledger.

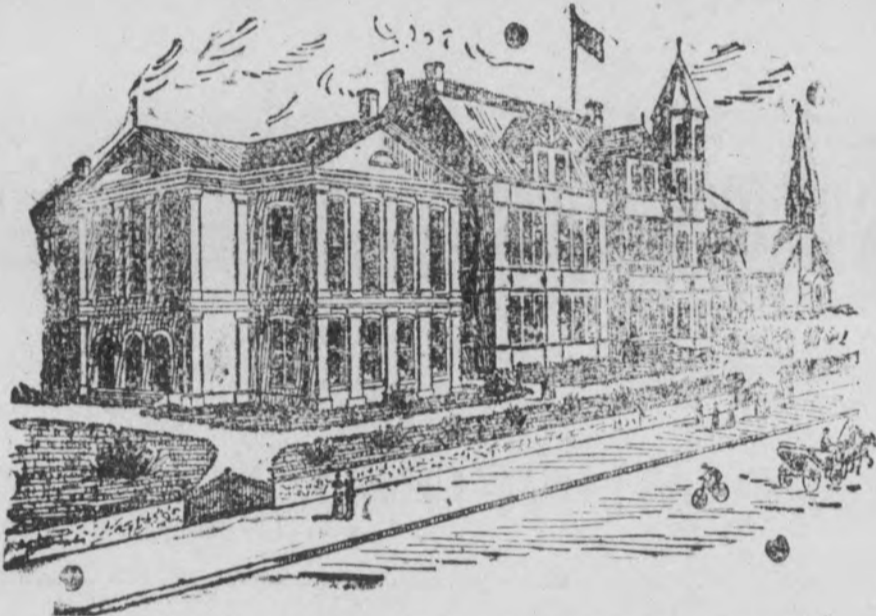

### Stamps on Express Packages

Representatives of the principal express companies had a meeting in this city last week, and agreed that Colonel John J. McCook, counsel of Wells, Fargo & Co., should go to Washington to see the attorney general and secure from him a ruling as to whether the shipper or the express company should pay the internal revenue charges on packages. Colonel McCook yesterday received the following letter from Attorney General Clegg:

Office of the Attorney General.  
Washington, D. C., Aug. 16, '98.  
Colonel John J. McCook, No. 170 Broadway New York:

DEAR SIR: Replying to your letter of the 13th instant, I have the honor to advise you that the attitude taken by the department of justice, with reference to the question as to which party, the shipper or the express company, under the war revenue bill is required to furnish and pay for the revenue stamp which is required to be placed upon the manifest or bill of lading, is that this is a matter entirely between the shipper and the company. This office holds that, so far as the government is concerned, it is only interested to know that the lawful tax is paid.

As he when the shipper and the express company I have decided that the matter is not within my province of consideration under any case that has yet arisen. The United States Circuit attorneys are instructed by this office that they may prosecute for the prescribed penalty any company which places a manifest or bill of lading without the prescribed stamp; but that in controversies as to which one shall be required to bear the expense of the stamp, the government has no direct concern under the war revenue law.
