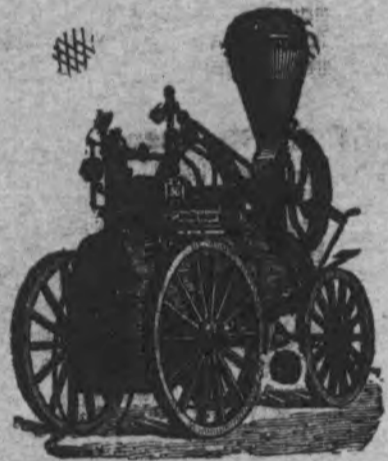

LOCAL NOTES AND TOBACCO JOTTINGS

A few years ago Eastern North Carolina was known as the "New Golden Belt." Today it is known as the bright tobacco belt of America.

The Greenville tobacco market has sold about 30 per cent more tobacco to date than was sold for the same period last year. With five warehouses and on one day 1,500 piles of tobacco on the market, there has not yet been a block sale.

Greenville is the centre of the tobacco markets of the east. It sells more bright tobacco than any of them. It is backed up by the best farming country in the State and with ample railroad and water transportation, live, active, energetic men, she bids fair in a few years to fling her banner to the breeze as the queen city of the garden spot of North Carolina. The soil of eastern North Carolina is peculiarly adapted to the growth of fine cigarette tobacco and bright wrappers. If our people will look carefully after this crop at the right time, a great deal of the nondescript stuff that is made every year can be avoided. I am unalterably of the opinion after considerable investigation that fertilizing with stable manure is not profitable, because if you should fail to make wrappers, a nondescript strip is made instead. It grows tobacco too heavy and coarse, except for wrappers, and experience teaches us that a wrapper crop hits about one year in seven. From the information I get from successful farmers, poor or rather medium land is best for tobacco with a liberal application of some good brand of fertilizers, cultivated on the intensive system and cured a pea green. In three cases out of four the crop will be profitable.

Too rich land will not do for tobacco. Experience, the best school, has taught us all that tobacco does not do well on rich land. Better plant corn or some other crop. Build up your poor land by planting it in tobacco and alternate, don't plant the same land but let it grow up in weeds and in November turn under, break again in January or February and by the time you get ready to plant your tobacco your land is in good condition, the vegetable matter decomposed and the hard dress pulverized.

Now is the time to begin to look after these matters. Don't put it off but the land you expect to plant in tobacco next year be sure to give it one thorough breaking before January.

Montgomery, Ala., September 12.—The Advertiser will tomorrow print the following is a portion of an interview with General Joseph Wheeler and state that the general was in the presence of three gentlemen, one of whom is Hon. Samuel Blackwell, when talking to the reporter:

"I do not believe the war is over by any means; neither does President McKinley, who told me personally he had not faith that the peace commission would settle the differences existing with Spain over the Philippines. The Spanish claim that the battles at Manila were fought after the protocol was signed, and on these grounds will refuse to give up the islands."

Continuing, General Wheeler said: "Spain will want us to give up the Philippines, and," laying emphasis here, "we will never do that. I am going back to duty, and really expect to be called into action again."

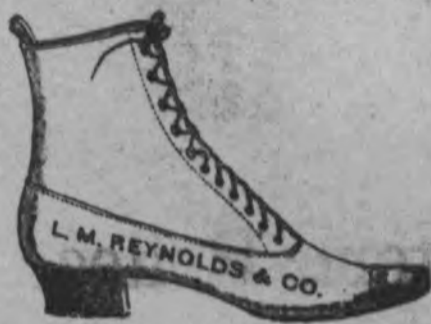
