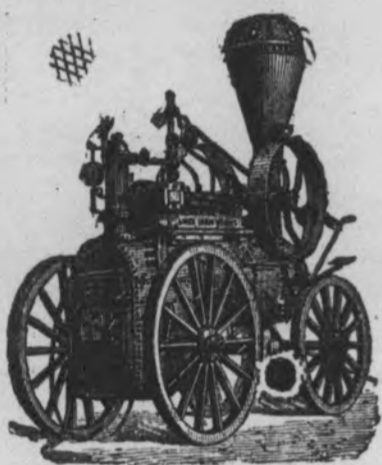

## POPULIST CONVENTION

### The Party Almost Went to Pieces

The Populists met here today to hold their county convention. The attendance was very small compared to the number present in the last two campaigns, and there was an almost entire absence of the enthusiasm that has marked their former conventions.

J. A. Lang, chairman of the county executive committee, called the convention to order. R. L. Joyner was made temporary chairman and was afterwards elected permanent chairman, and R. W. Ward, secretary.

After organization the convention proceeded to nominations, making no reference to the terms of fusion with the Republicans, but just filling out the skeleton ticket that party left with a kind of "yes, sir, and thank you, too," air about it.

Nominations for the Senate being declared in order the names of A. J. Moye, W. M. King, J. T. Phillips and E. A. Moye were presented. The latter was not present, but it was stated that under no circumstances would he accept.

Two ballots were taken without resulting in a nomination when A. J. Moye arose and said "I see that I am not the choice of the ring that controls this convention and the Republican party. I went into the Populist party from principle and labored earnestly for its success. I have been warning you for two years that you were getting too close to the Republican party and the Democrats would be throwing 'nigger' at you. Now you see this, has all come true. I ask the privilege of withdrawing my name and shall act as I choose in the coming election."

Another ballot was taken and W. M. King was declared the nominee for the Senate.

Nomination for Representative being next in order ex-Representative J. T. Phillips, of trunk riding fame, arose and intimated that he didn't want office, that he was doing fairly well on his farm, possibly better than he could in politics, and presented the name of Stude Chapman, their last Representative.

Mr. Chapman at once arose and said, "Gentlemen of the convention; I am married to the same stick with brother Moye, and cannot permit my name to be used." This was followed by cries of "Phillips," he made another speech and was nominated by acclamation.

For Clerk of Superior Court J. A. Lang was presented. Mr. Phillips arose to second his nomination, and after making a big speech in Mr. Lang's behalf tried to run him through at once by a motion to nominate him by acclamation. Instantly another delegate was on his feet and presented the name of W. M. Brown. A third presented the name of F. Ward. A ballot was taken and J. A. Lang received the nomination. There was a pass at applause but it all came from one side of the house.

For Treasurer J. A. Thigpen was renominated by acclamation, as was also W. H. Harrington for Sheriff.

J. S. L. Ward was nominated by acclamation for Surveyor.

J. L. G. Manning and T. H. Langley were nominated for Commissioners. A committee was appointed to wait upon W. M. King, and upon returning it was reported that he declined the nomination for the Senate. J. F. Boyd was then nominated.

The nominees were called to make speeches of acceptance. In the midst of these C. C. Kirkman arose and said, "the convention has rejected every man who was a Populist from principle, they have nominated for the Legis-

lature, a man (J. T. Phillips) who once went there and stayed drunk through the whole session, in fact, it took him a month after the Legislature adjourned to get sober enough to come home. I cannot support the ticket named today and am done with the party." This was a bombshell in the camp. Phillips tried to explain his drunkenness while in the Legislature by saying whiskey was pretty free around there and he got too much of it.

There were cries for Skinner, but that worthy had sneaked off, seeing that he had failed to lead the better class of Pitt county Populists into the Republican party.
