Interesting Tobacco Sale.

Sometime ago Mrs. M. M. Nelson took upon herself the task of raising a fund to build an iron fence around the yard of the Memorial Baptist church here. In talking over the matter with friends, Mr. H. P. Streuse suggested as a plan for helping the fund, that a tobacco sale be had for it. Mr. Streuse took the matter before the tobacco buyers and warehousemen and every one agreed that one bunch of tobacco from every pile weighing over 50 pounds sold for a few days be donated for this purpose. For about eight days the one bunch was taken from every pile weighing over 50 pounds sold on the five warehouse floors. Friday this tobacco was all put together and sold, the nice sum of \$79.26 being realized from the sale.

A large number of ladies attended the sale and helped run up the bids, and it was the most interesting sale that has occurred this season. After the sale Mr. J. L. Fleming in behalf of Mrs. Nelson and the church, returned thanks to the warehousemen and buyers for what they had done for the fund, and invited them to an ice cream feast which the ladies had prepared for them. The tobaccoists enjoyed the feast to the utmost.

This donation from the warehousemen and buyers is in keeping with their liberality. That just one bunch of tobacco from piles weighing above 50 pounds should in eight days accumulate enough tobacco to sell for \$79.26, shows also that the Greenville market is selling the weed this season.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From our regular Correspondent.)
WASHINGTON, D. C. Sept. 30, 98.

Boss Hanna has been appealed to by Mr. McKinley to save the House by the same methods he carried the Presidential election--the unlimited use of money. Hanna is now in Washington preparing to make assessments on the men who put up the boodle in '96. Chairman Babcock, of the Republican, Congressional Campaign Committee told Mr. McKinley that unless something was done at once the Democrats would certainly elect a majority of the House. That is why Hanna was telegraphed for. If money can elect a majority of the House, Hanna is going to do it, unless the men who contributed money for him to use two years ago go back on him.

At the present rate of progress Mr. McKinley's commission will not get through investigating the War Department by the time the Presidential campaign opens. A week ago the commission was organized, and not a line of testimony has been taken; in fact a majority of the Commission have been away from Washington nearly all of this week. They say the taking of testimony will be started next week. The kick against making the investigation secret has caused the commission to modify its original intention so far as to agree to allow representatives of the press associations to be present when testimony is being taken.

Democrats who attended the New

York Democratic State Convention say that Roosevelt's defeat is assured, and that his nomination will help the Democratic candidates for Congress. They are calling "Teddy" a "dime novel candidate," a "comic valentine," a "man full of grit, nerve and wheels," and other picturesque things. The German vote will go almost solidly to the Democratic ticket, and many other Republicans will refuse to vote for a tax-dodger, as Roosevelt has acknowledged himself to be. Some of the old Blaine men will also knife him.

"Little Billy" Chandler dropped in on Washington this week and gave out a somewhat remarkable interview. He began by admitting that many mistakes were made in the conduct of the war, and excused Alger, placing all the blame on the army officers who are at the head of the various bureaus of the War Department. But the most extraordinary portion of this interview was the closing paragraph, which means, if it means anything, a notice served on Mr. McKinley's investigating commission that it must not expose mismanagement. The paragraph closes with this thinly veiled appeal to the Commission not to find out anything disgraceful: "The whole world looks on with wonder and admiration and recognizes the United States as again one of the great powers of the earth. Shall we refuse this position and dishonor and disgrace ourselves by demonstrating that we did not know how to make war; not even how to transport our men and supplies; to locate our camps; to subsist our armies and to take care of our sick and wounded; but have a War Department full of incompetents from head to foot? How degrading such a scheme. We should take warning from the spectacle which France now presents in the Dreyfus case." Senator Chandler's appeal to patriotism to help shield incompetents, neglectful and criminal officers is hardly a new one. It will not lower the country in the eyes of the world to punish the men who caused unnecessary suffering among our soldiers.

That there will be an extra session of the next Congress next Spring is the opinion of many, because it is doubtful whether it will be possible to get all necessary legislation run through during the short session of the present Congress, but it is not true that the Democratic leaders intend to try to force an extra session, if they elect a majority of the next House. On the contrary, it is the desire of the Democratic leaders to avoid an extra session of Congress.

A Definition of a Scalawag

One of Winston's well-known divines tells the Sentinel the following story which he vouches for as true: Soon after the close of the civil war, when the word "scalawag" was so greatly in vogue, the Rev. Wm. Closs, D. D., was presiding elder of the Washington, N. C. district, and was holding a quarterly conference at Endfield, Hyde county, on the day the county candidates spoke there. He and the candidates ate dinner together. While at the table one of the candidates asked: "Well, what does the word 'scalawag' mean--who is a scalawag?" Dr. Closs replied: "I can tell you gentlemen. A 'scalawag' is a native born Southern white man, who says that a negro is as good as he is and tells the truth when he says it."

There are negroes who are law-abiding citizens and who are respected by the white people. It is the duty of these to use their influence to stop the aggressive and domineering disposition of that class which takes every opportunity to humiliate white people when they are in a majority and control. White men will not long submit to this insolence and the fact might as well be understood.--Lumberton Robesonian.
