### Admiral Dewey Ordered to Send the Baltimore and Petrel to Peking.

Washington, Oct. 3.—Secretary Long, upon advices received at the State Department, showing the existence of threatening conditions in China, has ordered Admiral Dewey to send two warships immediately from Manila to a point as near the Chinese capital as possible for a warship to approach. The vessels selected for this undertaking are the Baltimore and the Petrel. It is expected that the Baltimore will not be able to get beyond the Taku forts, at the entrance of the Ping He river, upon which Peking is situated. But the Petrel being of smaller proportions, may be able to reach Tien Tsin, 80 miles above the mouth and about the same distance below Peking.

Secretary Long said that the sole purpose of ordering the Baltimore and Petrel to Tien Tsin was to safeguard American interests and protect life and property of American citizens in the event of an outbreak, Tien Tsin being the nearest point to Peking accessible to warships.

Tobacco Sales Untaxed

The internal revenue department a few days ago issued an order directing a tax upon all sales of leaf tobacco in excess of one hundred dollars, the tax to be imposed upon all statements made to the farmer of his sales and also to the buyer of the tobacco.

This tax was imposed under the provisions of the bill taxing the sales of produce made by exchanges and boards of trade, or similar places.

Mr. Swanson, member of Congress from Virginia, who is always alert to the interests of his constituents and in that respect different from the Congressman of the Eighth North Carolina district, went immediately to Washington to have the ruling reversed and appeared before the department. He insisted that the methods of selling tobacco in Danville, Winston and elsewhere did not make them exchanges or boards of trade.

Mr. Swanson then addressed a letter to the commissioner stating all the facts and reasons that bear on the imposition of the tax. This letter will be referred to

A total of 790 pounds for \$166.24 or an average of a traction over 21 cents a pound. This is the highest sale that has been made this season on any of the markets that we have heard of.
