NEGRO DAY YESTERDAY.

Jury Composed of One White Man and Eleven Negroes in the Criminal Court.

Yesterday was negro day in the Criminal Court. There were negroes on the sidewalks, negroes in the halls and on the stairways, negroes in the court room, negroes everywhere. But the climax was reached when the jury in the case of the State vs. Joe Hooper and William Murphy (both negroes) charged with larceny, was empanelled. It was as dark as the crowd of negro domination that now threatens North Carolina, having but one white spot to relieve its inky blackness. That jury was composed of one white man and eleven negroes.

Some of the white men who came on the excursion yesterday from Randolph and other counties witnessed this positive evidence of the result of fusion in Eastern North Carolina.

One white man and eleven negroes on a jury in the largest city in the State. How long would the white men of the West stand this?

But they'll have to stand it if Dan Russell, Marion Butler, negro Jim Young and negro "Abe" Middleton carry the Legislature in November. Then you'll see negro juries, negro policemen, negro magistrates, negro deputy sheriffs and negro constables in Charlotte, Greensboro, Asheville, Statesville and other towns and cities of the West. Dan Russell will be no respecter of persons or towns if the next Legislature is a negro one. Wilmington Star, Oct 14th.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

From our regular Correspondent,

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 14, 98.

It was fitting that Mr. Perry Heath, who is acting Postmaster General while the Postmaster General is on the stump, and who owes his present position to Boss Hanna, should be the mouthpiece of the administration in informing the Federal office holders that they are expected to pitch in and take an active part in the Congressional campaign.

Having taken a sufficient quantity of one-sided testimony for use in the Congressional campaign, Mr. McKinley's alleged investigating committee will start on Sunday for a pleasant autumn tour of the camps, beginning with that of Gen. Fitz Lee at Jacksonville, Fla. Why this junket is taken only the Commission knows. It will be as useless as that of Secretary Alger, a short time ago, but it will probably fill in the time until after the elections.

Representative Elliott, of South Carolina, has succeeded in getting Secretary Long to order four

United States war vessels to proceed to Charleston for the purpose of participating in the Peace Jubilee, to be held in that city on the 24th inst. The ships ordered to Charleston are the Wilmington, the Nashville, the Montgomery and the Princeton.

That the authorities do not intend to punish those guilty of neglecting their duties in connection with the care of our soldiers, even when their guilt is plainly shown, is made plain by the recommendation of Surgeon General Sternberg in the case of Contract Surgeon Tabor, who was charged with having caused the death of Private Hugh Parrott, at Camp Wikoff, by his neglect and incompetence. The evidence taken by a board of inquiry is understood to have left no doubt of the truth of the charge. Instead of recommending some fitting punishment, or that the Surgeon be declared exonerated, in accordance with his guilt or innocence, Surgeon General Sternberg merely recommends that Dr. Tabor's contract as an army surgeon be cancelled, which is, in effect, declaring him guilty and then letting him go without punishment.

It is estimated that Representative De Graffenreid, of Texas, whose fame as an orator has been widely spread by his colleagues in the House, has received invitations to speak in a large number of Congressional districts than any other individual ever received in a single campaign. Much as he would like to help all of his democratic friends, Mr. De Graffenreid cannot speak at all these places, but he will devote his entire time until election to making speeches, and will cover as much ground as possible.

After awhile, it will get so that this government can do nothing without some syndicate being allowed to get a big profit out of the transaction, if things continue to go as they have gone under the Hanna regime. It was syndicates that compelled the government to pay fancy prices for vessels it bought for use in the war, and now that a board of naval officers have recommended the sale of a number of vessels that are no longer needed, a syndicate of rich men is said to have been formed for the purpose of buying all these vessels at bargain prices and selling them again at a profit. It will be easy enough for the administration to block the game of this syndicate, if it desires to do so. If the vessels are wisely advertised and sold at public sale to the highest bidder, this syndicate will have no advantage over any other bidder.

Unless all surface signs are wrong, Secretary Alger and Gen. Miles will be the leading opponents in a very warm fight in Congress this winter. Ever since Alger became the head of the War Department, he has made hard sledding for Miles; important orders have been issued in his name that he knew nothing about until he saw them in the newspapers, and everything he has wished to do has been thwarted. The first gun in the fight is likely to be the annual report of Miles, which will contain the idea of what legislation is needed for a reorganization of the army. It would probably have been in his testimony before Mr. McKinley's investigating commission, but Alger took good care to see that he was not asked to testify.

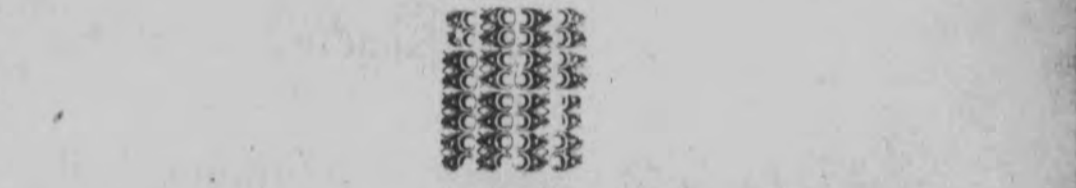
