IS THERE NO DANGER?

The Republican-Populist speakers are saying that the talk about the negro is all a Democrat scarecrow, that there is no danger of negro dominancy. Is there no danger? Take a look at the situation and see. What is the condition in Greenville? This town is under negro control, and the fusionists are responsible for it. They fixed such a condition upon the town to pay the negroes for electing them to office. All will say that the present condition is bad enough, but what may we expect if this fusion crowd is elected again? Who is on their ticket in Pitt county? What can be said of their men who are candidates for the Legislature? One of them is a man who thinks that a negro is as good as a white man. He shows this by the company he keeps, choosing negroes as his own associates in preference to white people. Such a man in the Legislature would no more hesitate to put negroes in the highest offices than he would to draw his pay.

Another of their Legislative candidates has served one term, and was so drunk all the time as to not know what was going on, and brought disgrace upon himself and his county. What could be expected of him if he should go to the Legislature again? Anything that is bad. Even their State organ is begging the Populists of Pitt county not to send such a man back.

Another of the fusion candidates is charged with saying "that if a disturbance arises between the white people and the negroes, he hoped the negroes would be as well armed as the whites." Is he a safe man to elect?

Take all of them together, if they are elected to the Legislature by the negroes, and that is the way they are expecting to get there, they are going to enact laws to please the negroes regardless of how it affects the white people.

White men, there is danger of negro dominancy, and there is danger of it right here in Pitt county. The safe course to pursue to avert this is to go to the polls and vote the Democratic ticket.

White Government Union.

The Court House was crowded Monday night at the organization of the White Government Union. Hon. B. F. Aycock, of Goldsboro, was present and made a speech that carried the audience with him. He is a plain, practical, forcible speaker, who presents the issues just as they are and does not mince his words in charging the corruption of the present administration against those who are responsible for it. He accused his hearers to a still stronger determination that white men shall rule North Carolina. He proved by striking example that the Democratic party gave the best State government on the lowest taxes that any people in the world had ever known, and said that the people were going to turn the affairs of the State back into the hands of the Democratic party that they may be wisely administered again. He said that the present party in power, true to the principles of Republicans, were only looking out for the pockets of the office holders and cared nothing for the interests of the people. Mr. Aycock pointed out where this was the most important election that has confronted the people, and the future of North Carolina hung upon it. If the fusionists should win again it would be the signal for negroes from all the adjoining States to pour into North Carolina and the white people who could get away from such a condition of affairs would leave. He implored white men to be true to their State, their homes and their race by voting the Democratic ticket.

At the conclusion of the speech an invitation was given to all to come forward and enroll their names as members of the White Government Union, and hundreds did so and put the button on their coat.

Another meeting will be held in the Court House Wednesday night to elect officers of the Union.

Mass Meeting of White People.

There will be a great mass meeting of the white people at Goldsboro on the 28th day of October, for the purpose of taking into consideration the political and social conditions of the east. After the adjournment of the convention, there will be short addresses upon the political situation by Honorables T. J. Jarvis, R. T. Bennett, C. B. Aycock, C. B. Watson, Locke Craig, R. B. Glenn, Benjamin Posey and Thos. W. Mason. Senator Jno. W. Daniel of Virginia has been invited and is expected to speak.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

From our regular Correspondent. WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 17, 98. Circumstances alter cases, in politics as in other things. A week ago the Republicans were pointing to the odds offered on "Teddy" Roosevelt by betting men, as indicating what a cinch he had on the governorship of New York.

The speeches made by Mr. McKinley on his western trip were not impromptu by any means.

On the contrary, they were carefully prepared before he left Washington, as a result of numerous conferences with Boss Hanna and other party leaders, and while apparently non-partisan, were intended to aid the Republicans in the Congressional campaign, by harping on the necessity of the country's presenting a united front and standing by the administration until the treaty of peace has been signed.

One of the witnesses, and, by the way, he was the only naval officer who has testified before Mr. McKinley's alleged Investigation Commission, stated that if the navy had not gone to the assistance of the army, the army sent to Santiago never would have been landed. The witness, Lieut. Frank K. Hill, who was detailed from the battleship Iowa to take charge of the debarkation of Shafter's army—continued without waiting to be questioned.
