JARVIS PREDICTS SUCCESS.

Ex Governor Jarvis spoke here to a
large and appreciative audience Saturday
night. Leading Democrats here say
his speech has had good effect, and
they now believe Henderson county
will give a small Democratic majority.
Henderson has for years given 300 to
400 Republican majority.

Ex-Governor Jarvis furnishes your
correspondent with the following statement
today:

"I confidently believe the Democrats
will carry the State. Our great contest
is to secure the Legislature and to
elect our candidates for judges of the
Superior Court. In this State the
Governor has no veto power, and the
power of the Legislature is only limited
by the constitution. Hence much depends
on the Legislature. The party that
controls the Legislature controls the
State. Both parties are therefore putting
forth its best efforts to control that body.

"It now looks like the Democrats
will not only elect a majority of both
houses of the Legislature, but that they
will elect the Democratic candidates
for judges and a number of the congressional
candidates."

"I have been in the campaign since
the 4th of July and have been in nearly
all sections of the State. I find the
Democrats everywhere active and
enthusiastic. There were in the State in
1896 32,000 Populists, and I think 20,000
of this number will vote the Democratic
ticket this year. Many old-time
Republicans will also vote with us,
while thousands others will not vote at all.
With all these elements favorable to
Democracy, it seems to me victory
is certain and that the fusion majority
of 40,000 will be wiped out. The
results of fusion in this State have
been so disastrous that thousands of
good men who voted for it two years
ago, repudiate it now and will vote to
put the State back into the hands of
the Democratic party. Each day, in
my opinion, but adds to our certainty
of victory. The tide sets all the time
one way in this great campaign for
white supremacy in this State."—Hendersonville

THE TRUTH COMES OUT.

On the 26th of September, W. H. Chadbourne, postmaster of Wilmington, and a leading Republican of New Hanover county, wrote a letter to Senator Pritchard, in which he sought to make it appear that statements that had been published in regard to negroes holding office in New Hanover were Democratic misrepresentations, without specifically denying the truth of the assertions. That the letter was well calculated to produce such an impression is evident from the fact that it has been published prominently in every fusionist newspaper in the State and has been issued as a campaign document from the headquarters of both the Republican and Populist State Committees.

Three weeks' reflection upon that letter and the effect it had upon the public; especially in Wilmington where it was impossible to receive his neighbors and friends, sufficed to convince Mr. Chadbourne that he had done the people of his city and county a grievous wrong and by attempting to create a false impression abroad in regard to the state of affairs existing there. The only course open to an honorable man was to do what he could to repair the injury that he had done his community. This Mr. Chadbourne has done by writing a second let-

ter to Senator Pritchard in which he holds back no part of the truth making a statement of facts that fully justifies all that has been charged by the promoters of white supremacy.

The letter follows:
Wilmington, N. C., Oct. 13, 1898
Senator J. C. Pritchard,

Dear Sir:--Since writing you on September 26th, events have taken place in this community which necessitates some farther explanation on my part in order to put myself right before the community here, and also to correct any mistaken impression I may have made in your mind.

For the sake of any fancied political advantage I cannot afford to make a one-sided presentation of the situation in this City and County. and by naming only the white officials and leaving out the colored, doubtless some advantage has been taken, and a false color given to the actual situation, to which the business people and taxpayers regardless of party have made objection.

As a matter of fact, there are in this county thirty-six colored magistrates, and a colored register of deeds and various other minor officials besides some Presidential appointees, and the property owners, taxpayers and business men seriously object to this state of affairs, and there now exists here the most intense feelings against any sort of negro domination.

There is a greater feeling of unrest and uncertainty about the maintenance of order than I have ever seen, and many, even the most conservative feel that a race conflict is imminent, than which nothing could be more disastrous not only to this city and county, but to our party in the State; and rather than have riot, arson and bloodshed prevail here, I, Republican though I am, advise giving up the local offices in this county, as there are no national political principles involved in this contest.

I had thought at first that it was merely the usual political cry and the fight for the offices, but I am now convinced the feeling is much deeper than this, as it pervades the whole community, and there seems to be a settled determination on the part of the property owners, business men and taxpayers that they will administer city and county government.

Investors Driven Away

The effect of negro rule in community may be seen from the following, which is part of a letter written to a gentleman in Wilmington by Mr. G. Fred Anslaud of Cambridge, Md., one of a party of real estate men and capitalists who came to Wilmington on a prospecting tour:

"While in Wilmington we were very comfortably located. We spent part of Saturday, August 13th, at Ocean View, where the spectacle of a burly negro fighting a white policeman, and defying everybody was witnessed by myself and Mr. Ortensten. Sunday, August 14th, we spent a very pleasant day at the Hanover Club Carolina Beach, and I must say that we thought your white population charming and your city and surrounding country all that could be desired; but the power

of the negro was more than we could stand. With a feeling of regret, nay of sorrow, I saw a fine country, with the greatest possibilities, ruined of its prospects, through the baneful influences of a race that few white men and no women can trust. You have no gro police in your city, and we would absolutely refuse negro protection for our families. We saw thousands of acres of land lying waste, but I would not advise any of my clients to settle on them with the negro as a power in your State.

"We found the same deplorable condition in Weldon (colored postmaster, etc.) Wilson, and all over the State." -- Wilmington Star.

Note the Difference.

The Democratic candidates had another big day at Falkland Wednesday. There was a large and enthusiastic gathering of white men and they gave the speakers a warm reception. J. L. Fleming, who goes along with the candidates, gets better every time he speaks, and at Falkland made the best he has yet delivered. A. L. Blow also made a rousing speech, full of facts and figures that exploded the big yarns the fusionists are going around telling. The candidates were all there and fully held up their end of the speaking. At every appointment they find people coming back to the white man's party and the outlook for Democratic success grows brighter every day.

The same day the fusionist candidates were at Ayden, and what a contrast there was between their meeting and the one by the Democrats at Falkland. The Ayden speaking was attended by about 25 negroes and 15 Populists, and a few Democrats who were there out of curiosity. A telephone message to THE REFLECTOR said it was about the poorest attempt at speaking that has occurred in the whole campaign. Phillips told them that he got drunk when he was in the Legislature, but if they sent him back he "wouldn't do so any more." But his promise won't do to count on and he will not be sent back. J. J. Perkins undertook to make a financial speech and tell how much had been saved the county under fusion rule, but they say his speech fell as flat as a pancake. Our informant further said that they were about the most desolate and disappointed looking set of speakers that could be pictured.

Another Row.

Late Wednesday afternoon Messrs. H. F. Keel and Sam Daniel were talking together in the vicinity of Smith & Hooker's livery stables. A colored man named Frank Fleming stepped up and asked what they were talking about. Daniel replied that it was none of his business. The negro became insolent and used abusive language when Daniel struck him across the head with a cane. The negro started off, cursing as he went, when Daniel drew a pistol and fired at him but did not strike him. Later Keel was talking with some other men about the occurrence when the negro came up again and began using abusive language to Keel. Keel struck at him and the two clinched, a few light blows passing. The negro broke loose and got away just before a crowd of white men rushed up. His absence at the time brought an end to the trouble.

With the feeling as high here as it is, it does look like the colored people ought to behave themselves and not be trying to bring on a disturbance.
