WHITE MEN SHOT WITHOUT PROVOCATION.

Lumberton, N. C., Oct. 23—A dangerous riot occurred at Ashepole, this county, last night. Negroes to the number of forty or fifty, all armed, came in early in the evening, threatening to kill the white people and burn the town.

The white citizens hastily armed themselves and drove the negroes out of the town.

The negroes then promised to disperse and return to their homes, but guards were left out to protect the people from the black marauders.

Late in the night the guard was fired on and three white men—Albert Floyd, Rob't Inman and Wm. Bullard were seriously shot.

The ring leaders of the black mob are known and a crowd of one hundred men, heavily armed, are after them with blood-hounds.

More trouble is expected. The negroes have been inflamed by incendiary speeches and the white people are determined to quench it if possible in its incipency.—News and Observer.

PERKINS AT AYDEN.

Some Thoughts on His Speech.

Mr. Perkins in his speech at Ayden emphasized the fact that according to contract he was entitled to the Populist vote of Pitt county and boastingly said "I am going to have it"

In the name of our dear old county, my fellow Populists, who has the right to sell us to Mr. Perkins or any other man or set of men? Are we freemen? If so by what authority can he claim our votes by right? He says he is entitled to our votes because he voted the negro of Pitt county for Populists. Great God! what an insult to the colored voters of Pitt county. How can a colored man vote for him in the face of such an insult? and yet some if not all of them will do it.

There is not a colored man on earth that I am not friendly towards that I know of, and I hate to see their race insulted in any such a wholesale way. But that is with them, I have nothing to do with it.

As for myself, Mr. Perkins will have to produce a stronger claim on my vote before he gets it, I think. What do you say my fellow Populists?

Now I have this to say about his voting the colored men of Pitt county for Populist candidates, that if he did or did not, I am free to vote for whomsoever I will. No man has the right to deliver me or my vote to Mr. Perkins or any other man, and I have a better opinion of the colored voters of old Pitt county than to believe that they would be voted against their wills for any man, by Mr. Perkins or any other man. So they must have voted for Populist candidates willingly. If not Mr. Perkins ought to be dealt with according to law on his own statement.

Again he said, after raising every man present, both white and black, to almost fighting heat, that he was glad to see the people getting mad and went on to quote, "Whom the gods would destroy they first make mad." Well, he succeeded very well in making the people mad, but how he will succeed in destroying them is yet to be seen.

Mr. Phillips said if we would elect him again he would not get drunk like he did before, but I think if we want to save our big gun for future use, and I think we ought to encourage soberness, we will do well to keep him away from Raleigh. He might catch another monkey by the tail. They were actually so hard up for something to talk about that some of the crowd went back so far as the ant bellum negro, how he used to affect political ends. A people that stood by our most sacred interests in the days of carnage and blood as no other people recorded by the historian would have done under like circumstances; a people always to be trusted until they fell into the hands of designing politicians like Perkins and the

rest of the crowd who are so bitterly opposing white supremacy, white metal and good government in our grand old State.

Fellow Populists, I want to appeal to you all in words of truth soberness for I feel that we have the greatest responsibility resting on our shoulders of any party or faction thereof in the history of our country. The life, progress and happiness of sweet womanhood and honest manhood are to be preserved by our votes on the 8th of Nov, or engulfed for ever in ruin and utter desolation. In the name of our beloved State and her sweet women what shall we do? The Republican party says plunge her still deeper in to destruction with her womanhood and manhood. The Democrat party says save the State, her womanhood and manhood. Then what shall we do?

Can we ruin forever our wives, daughters, mothers and sisters and the promising manhood of our dear old State by voting for the Republican party, when our votes are cast in favor of the Democrat party will lift us above the awful disgrace now upon us? No! No! No! fellow Populists, we can't afford to do it. We are too small to stand alone as a party expecting anything, yet we find ourselves standing between the two great contending parties of the state—one the great Anglo Saxon people the other the black race led by a few designing white men who have no higher aspiration than self aggrandizement. We brought on the curse and it is now our duty as honest men to remove it. I expect to do my duty and if we fail to rescue the State, be it known my hands are clean of Populism henceforth and forever.

Fellow Populists, the responsibility that rests on us as a party is awful, then let us be thinking and let us be acting. I have confidence in you as honest men and patriots and as an honest man myself I believe on the morning of the 8th of November when the sun comes forth from beyond the waters of the Atlantic, and darts his silvery rays with electric speed across our State from end to end and forces back the darkness which will have shrouded us through the night, and as those beautiful rays penetrate the mist and kiss away the dew drops from the last rose of summer that has been left blooming alone, and this beautiful orb of splendour as he comes forth from his chamber as a strong man to run a race forces his way across the universe, so also will the white men of North Carolina rise in their might and as a scroll roll back the cloud of disgrace that by our votes for four long years has shrouded our fair State.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From our regular Correspondent, WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 24, 98.
The Republican bosses are hot after the Republican office holders in Washington, both voters and non-voters. The voters have all been given to understand that if they do not go home and vote they will be blacklisted, and to remove their last excuse, the Republican Executive Committee is offering to furnish them with transportation when they say they are unable to pay for it themselves. But this transportation is not to be a gift. Every voter who avails himself of the Committee's offer is told that he must make a "voluntary" contribution, within a given time to the Committee, of an amount equal to the cost of his railroad ticket, or take the consequences. Boss Quay's man is sending letters to Washington office holders into not only going home to vote but contributing \$15 each to the campaign fund. In his letter asking for the money he says, "unless a vigorous and aggressive campaign is waged, we may lose three or four districts." Unless the reports made to ex-Representative Kerr, Secretary of the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee, are wrong, the Republicans will lose those Congressional Districts in Pennsylvania, regardless of what sort of a campaign they wage, and they stand to lose many districts in other States as well. It is a little bit puzzling why

the administration allows time to be wasted by the Peace Commission, at Paris, in discussing various propositions of the Spanish Commissioners concerning our paying or guaranteeing the payment of any portion of the Spanish bonds charged against Cuba, if it be true, as has been claimed right along, that the American Commissioners had positive instructions before they left Washington, to the effect that this Government would under no circumstances either pay or guarantee the payment of one dollar of Spanish bonded indebtedness of any kind. It seems as though even Spaniards could have been made to clearly understand that position without wasting nearly four weeks discussing it, if that really be the position of the administration.

Young "Jim" Blaine, who by grace of pull holds a captain's commission in the volunteer service, has gall, if he has nothing else. The whole country knows that he was ordered home from Manila, whither he went as a staff officer, because he was fonder of intoxicants than of duty, and the opinion has been frankly expressed by officers that he ought to be court-martialed and dishonorably dismissed from the army in the interest of discipline. That being the situation, it was thought that favoritism of the rankst kind was shown when the War Department ordered that Captain James G. Blaine should be honorably discharged because there was "no further need for his services," and that "Jim" would jump at the chance of being let down so easily. Not he. As soon as he arrived in Washington, he succeeded in having the order of the War Department held up until he could see Mr. McKinley and try to have it withdrawn entirely. Great as Jim's pull undoubtedly is, it is doubtful whether Mr. McKinley will consent to his remaining in the army.

Col. Ike Hill, whose long connection with the House has made his judgment good on Congressional politics, said: "We have got the Republicans sure. Nothing short of a miracle can save them. Why, I believe that we will gain four Congressmen right in the President's own State." Colonel Hill says that Gen. Grosvenor's recent offer to bet \$10,000 that the Democrats would not gain a Congressman in Ohio was only a bluff and that he will gladly undertake to make Gen. Grosvenor a present of \$1,000, if he will put up the money to back his offer.

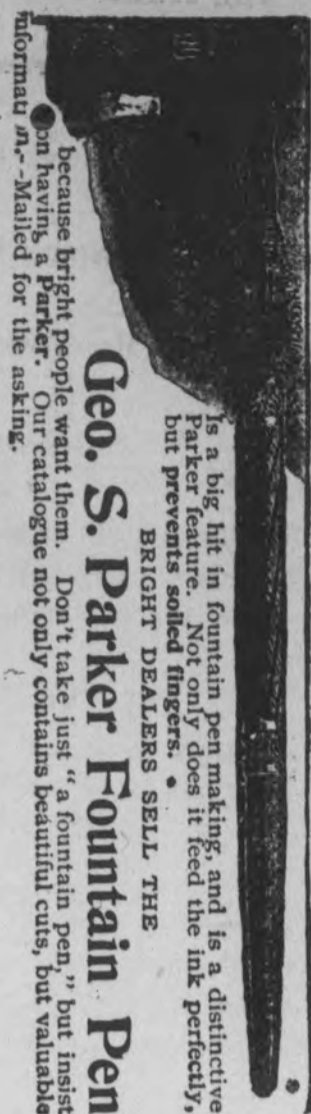

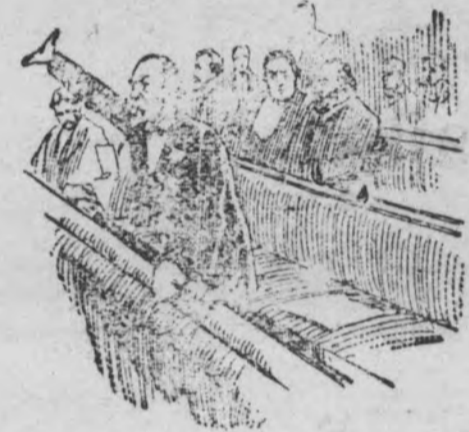
