Dan Russell and several of his negro inflammers were billed to speak in Wilmington on Saturday. The Chamber of Commerce of that city sent a committee to Raleigh to wait on His Corporosity with the information that he and his gang were not wanted to show themselves in the city. The speaking was thereupon declared off.

Here is an object lesson that we want the white people to look upon. In the last few years no man has done more to place Greenville under negro rule than C. M. Bernard. He is the reputed author of the infamous gerry mander bill that divided the town up into zigzag wards so as give two-thirds of the Councilmen of the negroes. He has been foremost in arousing the passions of the negroes and keeping them banded together. And no man has been more active than he in spreading falsehoods over the State and telling the people that the reports of negro domination that went out from this town were exaggerated, that Greenville was well governed, and so forth. But what is he doing now? He is the first man to show that under the conditions that exist here, and as the town is now governed, Greenville is not a good town to live in. As this article is being written, he is in Raleigh looking for a house and preparing to change his residence to that city. He helps to

fasten an outrageous condition upon the white people of his home town, and then is the first to flee from the infamy wrought by himself. Base ingrate! yet Greenville loses nothing in his departure, and no town is to be envied that has him for a citizen. Give any excuse he may for his change of residence, the people see and know the cause of his departure from Greenville.

The Vital Necessity.

There is no other one thing with which I have so much trouble as the lack of persistency among advertisers. They like the nerve to fight long and hard. While they will expend a good deal of cash and energy in making a single plunge, they will grow tired if called upon to expend the same amount through a campaign of six months. The road to success is an uphill road all the way. Do not try to spurt. They failed to consider that the creation of trade through advertising was a long process. They plunged, got a little business for a time, and failed ultimately, or soon found that advertising was costing them far too much for the amount of business they did. —Inland Printer.

Underselling

The merchant cheats himself who sells goods without profit, and commits an economic misdemeanor of wide possibilities for harm. Only one legitimate basis for competition exists, and that is merit. The man who considers cheapness of more consequence than quality, and a variable price list more valuable than a reputation for trustworthy methods, is wielding a two edge sword which will sooner or later cut his own throat as well as that of his competitor. Mere underselling is not competition, though it often passes as such, for eventually it injures rather than stimulates trade, because its practice is either a sacrifice of rightful profits—a loss which no dealer can long sustain—or a fraud on the public, which is disastrous to reputation. —Cycle Trade.

The Feeling of Insecurity in Wilmington.

An incident which indicates the feeling of insecurity here was witnessed on South Fulton street here last night, by a Messenger representative. A youth of about 16 years of age was escorting two ladies and carried a double-barreled shotgun on his shoulder. This shows that ladies do not feel safe from insults and indignities on the streets, and they are prepared to see that no one molests them. 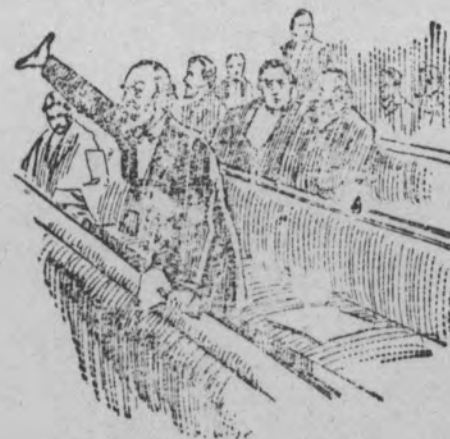
