

WASHINGTON LETTER.

From our regular Correspondent.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 31, 98. A leak in the Paris end of the administration has made it apparent why the Republicans were so apxious that the treaty of Peace should not be concluded be fore the e'ection. We are to get the Philippine islands. But we 10 are to buy them—a new wrinkle after capturing territory by force Advertising rates are liberal and can of arms, to pay money for itther by paying a large sum in cash or by assuming about \$40,-000,000 of Spanish bonds, or by both. It is not surprising that the Republican managers should dread such information as that going to the country on the eve of an important election, or that they should now be trying to discount it by saying that nothing

had yet been positively determined upon, except that we would demand all of the Phillippine 13lands.
