## NO NEGRO IN THIS. WHITE MEN CARRY EVERYTHING.

State 20,000, Pitt County 250 to 400---  
Skinner Goes up Goose Creek---  
Democratic Landslide all  
Through the Line.

And here it is, glorious news enough for one day. The Democrats have done nobly and North Carolina and Pitt county are redeemed for white supremacy. The State Judicial ticket is elected by 20,000 majority, Democrats have two-thirds of the Legislature, eight Congressmen are claimed. Small defeats Skinner, and the entire Democratic ticket in Pitt county gets from 250 to 400 majority.

Here is what news THE REFLECTOR received up to the time of going to press:

### PITT COUNTY.

#### BEAVER DAM.

Figures not in, but the precinct is all right.

#### BELVOIR.

This township was nearly even, which was a big gain for the Democrats over two years ago.

#### BETHEL.

Democratic majorities range from 14 to 50. Two years ago the fusionists carried the township by 19 to 60.

#### CAROLINA.

Majority for James 112, Barnhill 113, Nichols 115, D. C. Moore 108, Mooring 101, T. R. Moore 117, Cherry 112, Laughinghouse 114, Cox 114, Davis 112, Tucker 110, O. W. Harrington 115, L. I. Moore 115.

#### CHICOD NO 1 & 2.

We have no figures from these precincts except that they gave Democratic majorities of over 200.

#### CONTENTNEA No 1.

Majorities, James 101, Barnhill 114, Nichols 135, Mooring 111, D. C. Moore 125, T. R. Moore 124, Cherry 130, Laughinghouse 123, Cox 124, Davis 126, Tucker 132, O. W. Harrington 130.

#### GREENVILLE No. 3.

This precinct gave Democratic majorities about 35 to 40.

Majorities, Ward 51, Phillips 91, Thompson 81, Lang 96, Harrington 109, Perkins 83, Thigpen 98, Brown 86, Jenkins 90, King 96, Manning 98, Wilson 88.

#### PACTOLUS.

This precinct gave the fusionists about 110.

#### SWIFT CREEK No 1.

This precinct gave the fusionists about 50 majority, Democratic gain of 70.

#### SWIFT CREEK No 2.

Majorities, James 32, Barnhill 36, Nichols 41, D. C. Moore, 33, Mooring 26, T. R. Moore 32, Cherry 35, Laughinghouse 33, Cox 33, Davis 35, Tucker 35, O. W. Harrington 35.

#### NORTH CAROLINA.

Raleigh, N. C. Nov. 8th.

Weather fair all over State and advices received up to 7:15 P. M. point to the heaviest vote cast in years. Indications point to large Democratic gains all over the State but no safe estimate can now be given as to result. New Hanover, Pitt, Anson, Lincoln, Franklin, Iredell, Davidson, Richmond, Harnett, Wilson, Caswell, Cleveland, Alamance and Wayne counties are claimed to be Democratic. Craven, Chatham and Washington counties claimed by fusionists. Robeson county in 1896 gave a fusion majority of 1500 is now said to be Democratic at least 400.

Raleigh, Nov. 8.—Chairman Simmonds, of the Democratic State Committee, claims a majority in both branches of Legislature and eight Congressmen. Expects the Judicial ticket to be elected by 25,000 majority.

Raleigh, Nov. 8.—Estimated Mecklenburg county Legislative and Congressional ticket Democratic by fifteen hundred. Rowan county by 1200. Klutz for Congress leading the ticket.

Raleigh, Nov. 8.—Indications point to Democratic majority in Duplin county for the Legislative ticket. Burke county returns up to 8 P. M. indicate Democratic ticket elected by good majority. Granville county carried by Populists. Democrats claim Cleaveland county by 400 majority.

Raleigh, Nov. 8.—Advices received up to 10 o'clock P. M. indicate a Democratic landslide for State ticket with eight Congressmen. This is based on estimated results as nothing official has been received. New Hanover county estimated at nine hundred to one thousand Democratic majority on Judicial and Senatorial ticket, no disturbances reported.

Tyrrell county goes Democratic. Perquimans gives Small for Congress a majority of 181, a charge of nearly 500.

Carteret is conceded to Small by 150 majority.

Edgecombe county is ranging all along from 500 to 1500.

Greene county is close.

Durham county rolled up a Democratic majority of 700.

Large Democratic gains in Washington county—majority for fusion will hardly exceed 300.

Wilson county Democratic from three to four hundred.

Martin county is back in the Democratic column with 125.

Craven county, as was expected, elected the fusion ticket, but by a reduced majority.

Lenoir county gives a Democratic majority of 200.

Wayne county was for the white men by 800 majority.

Catawba rolls up a Democratic majority of 400.

Currituck county is safe by 500 majority.

Beaufort county rolls up a Democratic majority of 300.

### VIRGINIA.

Richmond, Va., Nov. 8.—Quiet election and small vote except in ninth and tenth districts where interest centered. City of Stanton in tenth district gives Quarles, Democratic 48 plurality. Eight precincts in districts gives Quarles, Democrats 399 plurality. Augusta County's estimated majority for Quarles 1000. If so heavy Democratic gains.

Richmond, Va., Nov. 8.—Virginia ninth district Pocahontas gives Rhea 15 majority. Walker's majority in 1896 was 178. Democratic gain of 213. Walker's estimated majority in Washington county 600. Rhea's estimated in Giles 600.

Richmond, Va. Nov. 3.—Swanson carries Davie by 935 majority. Frankie, Grayson, Henry and Pittsylvania counties will give him a majority of 3,000. Parr's majority in Floyd estimated 400. Swanson re-elected by a majority of 2,000 to 2,500 his majority in 1896 was 551.

Richmond, Va., Nov. 8.—Jones, Democrat, re-elected from first district by majority 3,000 to 3,500. Very light votes held.

### OTHER STATES.

Philadelphia Pa 8.—Five Congressional district's re-elect all members. 1st Bingham, Republican; 2nd, Adams, Republican; 3rd, McAter, Democrat; 4th, Young, Republican; 8th, Sanser, Republican.

Boston, Mass. Nov. 8.—Walcott undoubtedly elected small reduced majority. Republicans have elected 10 of 13 Congressmen. Indications

show usual Republican majority in both branches.

New Haven, Nov. 8.—Connecticut elects Republican ticket. Three Congressmen and probably four, one Republican. Claim State by 15,000 majority.

Galveston, Tex. Nov. 8.—The Tribune, independent, claims the entire State Democratic elected by the usual majority. Legislature the same, insuring the election of Culberson, Democrat, to the U. S. Senate. Democrats are sure of eleven Congressmen.

New York Nov. 8.—The World concedes the election of Roosevelt, Republican, for Governor by 45,000 plurality.

Providence, R. I., Nov. 8.—Congressmen Capron and Bull, Republicans, re-elected by about 400 majority.

Baltimore, Md. 8.—Sun says Denny of the 6th Md. district, is elected, Smith, Democrats, of first district, almost certainly elected and 2nd and 5th district in doubt.

The Rhode Island Congressional delegation complete shows two Republican members elected to Congress.

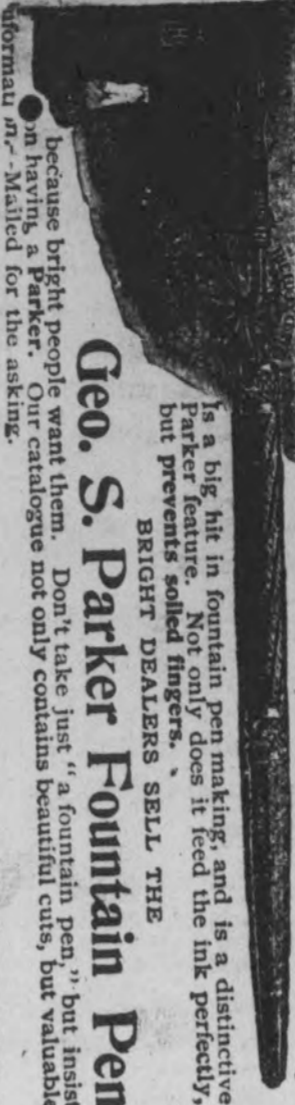
