#### WHITE MEN IN CHARGE

The Government of Greenville Undergoes a Ch nge

There has been a revolution in the government of Greenville, and i' has come about reaceably and quietly The condition of Greenville and the town being controlled by negroes was well known over the State, for there anywhere during the campaign but what it was referred to. And to correct such a condition that existed in this and similarly afflicted towns in the State and restore them to the control of white men, was the prime cause of the Democrats carrying the election so over whelmingly.

Greenville had six Councilmen, only two of whom were white men. Saturday morning John Marable, one of the colored Counc'lmen of the First Ward, filed a resignation. A special meeting of the Board was called and his resignation was accepted, but his successor was not chosen at that time, the mosting adjourning until today for that purpose. When Chief of Police Fred Cox heard of Marables resignation, rather than wait to be dismissed by the Board be bunted up Mayor Forbes and handed in his resignation and badge of

This morning the Board met '10 elect another Councilman from the First Ward and Mr. W. H. Long was closen. William Britt, one of the colored Councilmen for the Third Ward, had in the meantime prepared his resignation which was handed in and accepted, and Mr. R. A. Tyson was elected to succeed him. This turned things around and gave us a Board composed of four white men and two colored.


### White Workmen D:scharged

A QUEER CALCULATION.

the Power That Would Be Required to Move the Earth.

Statisticians sometimes have queer ideas. One of them has amused himself by calculating how much energy, water and coal it would take to move the earth a foot, supposing that it was subjected throughout its mass to a force equivalent to terrestrial gravitation. This is a gratuitous supposition, for in spite of its enormous mass the earth

weighs nothing. Starting with the fact that the earth's mass is about 6,100 million-millionmillion tons, our statistician calculates that we should require 70,000,000,000 years for a 10,000 horsepower engine to move our globe a foot. The boiler that should feed this engine would vaporize a quantity of water that would cover the whole face of the globe with a layer 300 feet deep. The vaporization of this water would require 4,000 million-million tons of coal. This coal carried in cars holding ten tons each and having a total length of 30 feet, would require 400 million-million cars, which would reach 80,000,000 times around the earth. This train, moving at the rate of 40 miles an hour, would take more than 5,000,000 years to traverse its own length. It would require for storage a shed that would cover 1,000 times the area of Europe.

If we realize that this fantastically huge amount of energy is nothing at all compared with what the earth possesses in virtue of its rotation about its axis, its revolution about the sun, and its N xt door to Reflector office. translation in space with the solar system, of which the earth is but an infinitesimal part and which itself is but an infinitesimal part of the universe, we may get some idea of the importance of man in the universe and estimate his incommensurable pride at its just value.

#### DANGEROUS PIGS.

Will Fight Man or Beast.

A writer in the St. Louis Republic says that the most vicious and fearless member of the brute creation is the peccary, or wild hog, of Mexico. This animal seems utterly devoid of fear and displays an intelligence in fighting man strangely at variance with its apparently complete lack of mental attributes.

Their ability to scent men is particularly marked. The only thing to do Centrally located. when they get after you is to run away from them as fast as a horse can carry you, and then there is no certainty that they won't catch you. They are nearly as swift as a horse, and their endurance is as great as their viciousness.

Toward morning they began to eat those he had killed, after which they formed in line and trotted off. If they had not had some of their own number to devour, they would have guarded that tree until my friend, through sheer exhaustion, dropped from his perch and allowed them to make a meal of him.

The wildcats and tigers that infest the Mexican wilds floe from the peccaries with instinctive fear, and even rattlesnakes keep out of their path.

THE SLY POLAR BEAR.

How He Gets His Dinner of Seal or Walrus Meat.

In his native home the polar bear does not often meet with small boys anxious to treat him to buns and other dainties. The consequence is that bruin has to devise many curious ways of securing his food, and none is more strange and interesting than that related by two trustworthy travelers in Greenland, that country of strange

They have known the polar bear to take a stone or a huge lump of ice in his fore paws and from a favorable height, as a cliff or a precipitous ice hill, to hurl the missile down upon the head of a walrus, an enormous brute often twice the size of the bear, and so stun him that bruin could rush in and complete the destruction at his leisure, thus securing a month's rations.

The most usual food of the ice bear, this beast, is the common seal of the arctic regions. The latter is the wariest animal of the north, and both Eskimo and polar bear need their best strategy to catch it.

In the summer time, when the snow islets, the seals can be plainly seen as black dots on the ice, probably asleep, but always near their holes, which lead down through the thick ice to the water below, and into which they can throw themselves by the least movement. Bruin, seeing one afar, walks up as near as he deems safe and then begins crawling on his wary prey

The seal, if the weather be sunuy and pleasant, takes short naps, relieved by shorter moments when it is scanning the vicinity for signs of an enemy's appreach. During these times the bear is very quiet and as still as death itself. with eyes apparently closed, though really a corner of each is kept open, and in this way he hopes the seal will take him for a heap of snow, an appearance which his coat readily helps him to as-

During the naps he creeps forward with greater or less rapidity, according to his nearness to the seal and consequent fear of being heard or seen. When but 10 or 12 yards away, and the seal is in the depths of a good nap, the bear rushes upon him and with a single blow of his powerful paw knocks the smaller brute senseless and so far away from the hole that he cannot escape by that way, even if the blow received is not immediately fatal.

In winter time the ice is covered with snow, and this is hollowed out by the seal into a snowhouse, covering the hole in the ice and connecting at the top of the dome with an aperture about the size of a shilling, called the blowhole, for it is through this that the seal breathes when he is in want of fresh air.

Here the bear watches for many a long hour if necessary, and when the enerts of the seal are heard he crushes in the fragile dome of the snowhouse with his paw, impaling the seal on his crrved claws, and proceeds to practically demonstrate how polar bears can subsist in a arctic winter.-London Telegraph.

### COMMERCIAL ENGLISH.

Warning to Those Who Would Send Trade Circulars Abroad.

Manufacturers who wish to do an export business must have their circulars and catalogues translated into foreign languages, says Engineering, but care should be taken that the translator is not only a good linguist, but also an expert in the particular business to which the documents to be translated refer. Otherwise the translation is apt to be a matter of ridicule to those to whom it is sent.

We cannot well give an instance to show how an English circular might be translated into bad German, for example, but the London Engineer gives us the following illustration of a translation from another language into English, which is probably no worse than many translations from English.

"We pique ourselves," says the circular, "on making you known that the sale of the -- has, by us, undertaken. This preparated, exclusively arranged by some vegetables, is entirely spoiled about something hurtful to the steam boiler blades.
