struggles and rejoiced with you in your successes, and now with open door and open hearts we receive you with a joy akin to that of a mother when, after a long absence, she recieves her child as it enters again the threshold of the old home.

It can be truthfully said that the real life of our denomination began when the Baptists of the state united their efforts under the Articles of the Constitution of our Convention. Let me be understood in that seemingly broad statement, for I would not for one moment ignore the lives and sacrifices of men like Ross and Daniel upon whose labors and sacrifices was builded the institution we love so well; but I would join with no small degree of holy pride to what has been accomplished since our organized work began on March the 26th, 1830, and no one will deny that with this united effort came new life with larger aims and increased activities among the Baptists of North Carolina.

It showed that there are now 2,500 Baptist churches in the State with a membership reaching a quarter of a million. There are 103 missionaries in the field and the amount contributed to missions is \$30,000. Wake Forest College has a faculty of twelve members, 260 students and an endowment of over \$200,000. There were about 1,500 additions to the churches during year and the work in all departments has been largely in. creased. The report made some reference to future plans and recommended still greater efforts towards enlargement.

The financial part of the report showed the following summary of contributions for the year:

(2) That the delegates from the Associations and churches formerly composing the Western North Carolina Convention be welcomed on their application as delegates of 100 Bags Salt. the North Carolina Baptist State Convention.

The resolution was unanimously adopted and the names of the west ern representatives were ordered enrolled as delegates to this Convention.

President Marsh requested Dr.C E. Taylor, of Wake Forest College, to speak a word of welcome to the western brethren. In his remarks he said it seemed so fitting that the Conventions should consolidate at the home of Gov.
