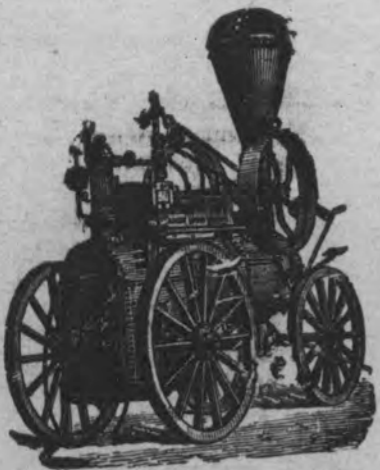

WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent.
Washington, D. C., Dec. 12, '98.
The Democrats of the House were entirely too smart for the busybodies who have been working so hard to make that adjourned Democratic caucus a cat and dog fight that would have resulted in encouraging faction and otherwise injuring the Democratic party. The caucus was held, and there was no fight at all. On the contrary, the meeting was entirely harmonious and not even any show of hard feelings was indulged in by anybody. According to the rule governing Democratic caucuses, no action could be taken upon anything except the resolution, offered at the caucus held last June, providing that an affirmative vote of two-thirds of a caucus should make caucus action binding upon the whole body, except in cases where individuals have pledged their word or been instructed by their conventions to the contrary. This resolution was adopted without opposition. There was no talk in the caucus about party policy to be pursued at the present session.

The bill prepared by Gen. Miles for the reorganization of the army, has been introduced in Congress, but that is about as far as it will ever get, as the Hull bill, prepared largely under the direction of Secretary Alger, is backed by the administration and by the Republican leaders in the House, and is, unless present plans are changed, to be put through the House before the Christmas recess. The Democrats are opposed to keeping the volunteers in service until the Army Reorganization Bill becomes a law, as proposed by the administration, but their protests will not, it is feared, change the programme

because the desire to get the volunteers mustered out is counted upon to help get the votes needed to authorize the increase of the regular army to 100,000 men. The House Military Committee has favorably reported a resolution offered by Representative Hay, of Virginia, asking the Secretary of War to inform the House what towns in Cuba, Porto Rico, and the Philippines will have to be garrisoned by United States troops, the number of troops for each town and the number that will be required at home.

Although Senator Vest did not submit his resolution, declaring that under the Constitution this government cannot adopt the European colonial system, but that all territory acquired must be governed with the purpose of ultimately organizing such territory into States for admission to the Union, to any number of his democratic colleagues before offering it, and giving notice of his intention to deliver a speech in its favor at an early day, its underlying principle is endorsed by many democratic Senators. Already the republicans are saying that Senator Vest will not be allowed to speak on his resolution in open session, because a speech in favor of the resolution will necessarily be against the ratification of the treaty of peace and must be made in secret session.

The Philippine problem is giving the republicans no end of trouble. Gen. Grosvenor, of Ohio, is not a timid man in handling political questions, but he acknowledged himself at a loss what to do with this one when he said, after discussing several of the propositions that have been made to get rid of the islands. "For my part, I wish the Philippines were in the bottom of the sea." Mr. McKinley has allowed it to become known to his party leaders that he has no ambition to lead in a Philippine policy, but will be perfectly satisfied to follow any policy that promises to be in accord with public sentiment, with preference that it should be one that will enable us to get rid of the Philippines, if it be possible to do so without laying this country open to the charge of trafficking in human liberty, for a profit, and without causing war. There is reason for saying that if it had to be done over again, Mr. McKinley would not demand possession of the Philippines, and would save the \$20,000,000 which we must pay Spain for something we do not know what to do with. But that sort of hind sight doesn't help the situation one bit.

The Naval clique that has been trying to keep Lieut. Hobson from receiving attention and deserved glory, ever since his return from a Spanish prison, has succeeded in getting him ordered out of the country for an indefinite period. It was discovered that Hobson was just the man needed to superintend the repairs on the Spanish gunboats, sunk by Dewey in Manila bay, which have been raised and sent to Hong Kong, under a contract made by Dewey. Hobson tried to get a short leave of absence to attend to some private matter, before going so far away, but it was refused him and he was given peremptory orders to leave for Hong Kong on the steamer that sails from San Francisco, Christmas eve.

The proposition, that England and the United States jointly build and control the Nicaragua Canal, has not met with any marked favor

in Congress. The Morgan Bill, by which the United States will own a controlling interest in the company which will build the Canal, guaranteeing therefor \$100,000,000 of the Company's bonds, to be issued at the discretion of the President, is now before the Senate, with the right of way. Senator Morgan, its author, says it will pass by a big majority. Democrats generally would prefer that the Canal be built directly by this government and owned by it, but it is not regarded as a party question and each democratic Senator will vote in accordance with his individual views. What the House will do with this bill will depend largely upon the attitude of the administration towards it—an attitude not yet clearly defined, although Mr. McKinley is committed in favor of building the Canal.

Two resolutions for Congressional investigation of the war, have been offered, one by Senator Vest, and the other by Representative Sulzer, but there is little probability that either will be adopted.

Green County Muddle.

Green is the only county of the ninety-six that is reveling in the luxury of a dual government. Two sets of commissioners are trying to administer the affairs of the county while for the county officers there are two sets of officials—the ins and the outs.

Upon the face of the returns it appeared that the fusionists had carried the county and certificates of election were accordingly awarded to all the fusion county candidates, but in view of notorious frauds that were brought to his notice, Judge Robinson ordered a recount of the vote, the result showed that all the Democratic candidates were elected. That ought to have settled the matter, but it didn't.

Last Monday the Democratic commissioners-elect were recognized by the retiring board and were formally inducted into office. The Democratic officials were sworn in after their bonds had been accepted but more trouble began right there. While the clerk's office was vacated gracefully and the register's seals and records were surrendered under protest in favor of their Democratic custodians, the fusionist sheriff and treasurer refused to budge, and there they are.

It is an interesting muddle, so to speak; but while it principally concerns the respective claimants of the offices, it will seriously inconvenience the public until it is settled by the courts.—Raleigh Post.

Financial Duty to the Church.

Some observing person has this to say in an exchange:

There is something inexplicable in the attitude of some women in moderate circumstances regarding their financial duty to the church. "Let the rich contribute, I can't afford it," says the woman who spends fifty cents for a buckle, a quarter for bonbons and throws a penny into the collection-box. It would be amusing if it were not so shocking to note the richly gowned, jauntily millinered, daintily gloved young person who has nothing but a dirty little copper to offer in the house of God. The widow's mite is never a despicable thing; the small coin of poverty is a generous proportion of her all, but the really indigent woman is not adorned in fashionable attire. A poor washerwoman would be ashamed to give the miserable offerings so unblushingly handed out by many a fine-plumaged dame and demoiselle.

TRINITY NOTES.

The following is a brief synopsis of the report made by the Board of Trustees of Trinity College to the two Methodist Conferences of the State, recently held:

Number of students matriculated in College Department this year 142, an increase of 12 over number at the corresponding date last year. Trinity Park High School has been opened this year and has enrolled 54 students. During this Conference year Mr. W. Duke has added \$100,000 to the endowment fund, and has also turned over to the trustees the Mary Duke building which cost \$4,500. This is for the use of young women. Mr. B. N. Duke has donated \$5,000 for the improvement of the Park. He also donated \$3,000 for the gymnasium. The Alumni are erecting a Craven Memorial Hall costing \$13,000. A school building and dormitory have been erected for the Trinity Park High School, at a cost of \$12,500. The total valuation of property \$512,833. Two new professors have been added to the faculty, making a total of 12. The corps of instructors in Trinity Park High School comprises five teachers.

The Trinity College Historical Society has established a civic celebration to be held annually on February 22nd. The purpose is to have each year on this occasion an address on some subject concerning a better civic life. It has been thought wise to have this celebration on Washington's birthday. The society has been fortunate to secure for the address at the first celebration, Judge H. G. Connor, of Wilson, N. C.

Professor Edwin Mims will deliver the Alumni address at the Vanderbilt University at the commencement in June.

Professor Jerome Dowd will take his Junior and Senior classes in Political Economy to Washington City for the purpose of studying the public institutions.

Treasurer Wants Taxes.

The State Treasurer has sent to all the sheriffs a letter in which he asks them to remit the State taxes for 1898 at an early day, in order to meet the demands upon the treasury during the next few weeks. One day last week the auditor issued pension warrants aggregating \$120,000. On January 1st \$66,000 will have to be paid for interest on the 4 per cent. bonded debt. It will require about \$70,000 to meet the expenses of the next legislative session. The treasurer asks sheriffs and tax collectors to forward taxes without delay, and to forward what is collected in amounts of \$500 or more and so on as rapidly as collected. The treasurer says the receipts on partial payments are \$120,000 less than this time last year.

Although drawing but little over twenty-six feet of water, the battleship, Massachusetts on Saturday last ran aground and sustained serious damage in New York harbor, notwithstanding the pilot's care in sticking close to what should have been a thirty-foot channel. The tide was abnormally low, and the big ship suffered accordingly. Accidents of this sort are bound to occur from time to time where the margin is so slight between channel depth and vessel draught; and war ships, which are difficult to manage when under slow headway, seem to be peculiarly liable to such mischances.
