THE LEGISLATURE.

They Keep Doing Good Work.

Below are some of the important matters introduced Thursday:

HOUSE.

By Mr. Mauney, of Cherokee, to prevent the spreading of contagious diseases among cattle and other live stock.

By Mr. Prichard, to punish the sale of spirituous liquors by persons in towns having the local option law, etc.

By Mr. Craig, of Buncombe, to regulate incorporation and operations of fraternal beneficial and insurance companies in North Carolina.

By Mr. Winston, of Bertie, to amend Sec. 181 of the Code, regulating the service of summons on infants and guardians ad litem in certain cases.

SENATE.

Senator James, from citizens of Pitt county against amendment to stock law.

From citizens of Pitt county in favor of stock law.

Senator Jones, of Harnett, to define the fees of clerks of Superior courts and justices of the peace in claim and delivery proceedings.

Senator James, to amend section 343 of the Code allowing clerks of Superior court to issue restraining orders.
