FILIPINOS SLAUGHTERED.

Thousands of Them Were Killed—Several Hundred Taken Prisoners—The Attack Was Expected and the Americans Were Prepared.

Washington, Feb. 5.—Admiral Dewey today cabled the Navy Department that hostilities had begun between the American army and naval forces in and about Manila, and the Philippine insurgents. The insurgents, he said, had been the aggressors and had been repulsed.

"Manila, Feb. 5.
"To the Secretary of the Navy, Washington:

"The insurgents here inaugurated a general engagement yesterday night, which has continued today. The American army and navy are generally successful. The insurgents have been driven back and our lines advanced. No casualties to the navy. DEWEY."

STORY OF THE FIGHT.

Manila, Feb. 5, 5:15 p. m.—The long-expected rupture between the Americans and the Filipinos has come at last. The former are now engaged in solving the Philippine problem with the utmost expedition possible. The clash came at 8:40 yesterday evening, when three daring Filipinos darted past the Nebraska regiment's pickets, at Santa Mesa, but retired when challenged. They repeated the experiment without drawing the sentries' fire, but the last time Corporal Greeley challenged the Filipinos and then fired, killing one of them and wounding another. Almost immediately afterward the Filipino line, from Calvoan, commenced a fusillade which was ineffectual. The Nebraska, Montana and North Dakota outposts replied vigorously and held their ground until re-enforcements arrived.

The Filipinos, in the meantime, concentrated at three points, Calvoan, Gagalangin and Santa Mesa. At about 1 o'clock the Filipinos opened a hot fire from all three places simultaneously. This was supplemented by the fire of two siege guns at Balik-Balik and by advancing their skirmishers at Paico and Pandacan. The Americans responded with a terrific fire; but owing to the darkness they were unable to determine its effect. The Utah Light Artillery finally succeeded in silencing the native battery. The Third Artillery also did good work on the extreme left. The engagement lasted over an hour.

The United States cruiser Charleston and the gun boat Concord, stationed off Malabona, opened fire from their secondary batteries on the Filipinos' position at Calvoan and kept it up vigorously. At 2:45 there was another fusillade along the entire line and the United States monitor Monadnock opened fire on the enemy from off Malate. With daylight the Americans advanced.

The California and Washington Regiments made a splendid charge and drove the Filipinos from the village of Paico and Cantemosa. The Nebraska Regiment also distinguished itself, capturing several prisoners and one howitzer and a very strong position at the reservoir, which is connected with the water-works. The Kansas and Dakota Regiments compelled the

enemy's right flank to retire to Calvoan. There was intermittent firing at various points all day long.

The losses of the Filipinos cannot be estimated at present, but they are known to be considerable. The American losses are estimated at 20 killed and 125 wounded.

In a subsequent telegram the following statements are made:

Last night's (Saturday) and today's (Sunday) engagements have proved a veritable slaughter of Filipinos, their killed being reported as amounting to thousands. The American forces could scarcely have been better disposed. It is now known that the attack was fully expected, and that every preparation had been made for the contingency. The firing slackened at noon (Sunday), the enemy being apparently demoralized. The American troops, however, are fully equipped to meet possible attack to-night.

The Ygorates, armed with bows and arrows, made a very determined stand in the face of a hot artillery fire and left many dead on the field. Several attempts were made in this city yesterday evening to assassinate American officers. OUR CASUALTIES 175—VERY FEW FATAL.

Washington, Feb. 5.—The following cable from General Otis has been received:

"Manila, Feb. 5.

"To the Adjutant General:

"The insurgents in large force opened an attack on our outer lines at 8:45 last evening. They renewed the attack several times during the night. At 4 o'clock this morning the entire force was engaged; attacks repulsed. At daylight we advanced against the insurgents and have driven them beyond the lines they formerly occupied, capturing several villages and their defensive works. The insurgent loss in dead and wounded is large. Our own casualties thus far are estimated at 175, very few fatal. The troops are enthusiastic and acting fearlessly. The navy did splendid execution on the flank of the enemy; city held in check and absolute quiet prevails. The insurgents have secured a good many Mauser rifles, a few field pieces and quick-fire guns with ammunition, during last month. "OTIS."

OTIS WILL SEND LIST OF CASUALTIES TO-DAY.

Washington, Feb. 5.—The following cablegram from General Otis has been received at the War Department:

"Manila, Feb. 5.

"Adjutant General, Washington: "Have established our permanent lines well out and have driven off the insurgents. The troops have conducted themselves with

great heroism. The country about Manila is peaceful and the city perfectly quiet. List of casualties tomorrow. OTIS."

NO INSTRUCTIONS SENT TO DEWEY OR OTIS.

Washington, Feb. 5.—At 12:30 o'clock, Secretaries Alger and Long left the White House, after a conference with the President. They stated that the dispatch from Admiral Dewey, which was given out an hour earlier, was the only information which was received concerning the engagement. No instruction had been sent to either Dewey or Otis.

LATEST NEWS FROM OTIS REASSURING.

Washington, Feb. 6.—The following dispatch was received at 1:15 a. m.:

"Manila, Feb. 6.

"To the Adjutant General:

"The situation is most satisfactory and no apprehension need be felt. Perfect quiet prevails in the city and vicinity. The list of casualties is being prepared and will be forwarded as soon as possible. The troops are in excellent health and spirits. OTIS."

RECOGNIZED AS THE DEATH BLOW FOR INDEPENDENCE.

Manila, Monday, Feb. 6.—9 o'clock a. m.—The Filipinos have apparently reached the conclusion that the Americans mean business, now that the barriers are removed, as there were no further hostilities last night, and no attempt was made to recover lost ground. It is possible, however, that they are following the tactics they employed against the Spaniards, and will merely lie off a few days to recuperate their forces before returning to the attack.

It is impossible to ascertain as yet how the news has been received at Malolos, the seat of the insurgent government, but the Filipinos in Manila express the opinion that the movement for independence has received its death blow, and that annexation will soon be welcomed generally.

OUR FORCE IN THE ORIENT.

The forces under Otis' command as shown by the records of the adjutant general's office, December 10, the date of the last report, were 21,649 troops, and of these there were present for duty 19,516 men.

THE AID HURRYING TO OTIS.

Approximately 6000 men are on their way to join General Otis, in four separate expeditions, though none are expected to reach Manila for three weeks or a month. They are as follows: The Fourth regiment and four companies of the Seventeenth Infantry, 1728 men; Twentieth Infantry, comprising 37 officers and 1268 men; the twenty-second Infantry with 2000 men and officers of the Third and Seventeenth United States Regiments of Infantry.

If the Charlotte Observer wants to see a good libel law enacted by the present Legislature it had better be curtailing the work of its artists on the members of the body.

On the 15th of last February the battleship Maine was blown up in Havana harbor. The government has contracted with the Camps to build a new vessel by that name. They will lay the keel of the new Maine on the 15th of this month and expect to have her ready to launch on the 15th of February, 1900. As the boys say, they "Remember the Maine."

The Christian element of Charlotte's citizens have gone to work to petition the Legislature to establish a dispensary in that city, and as might be expected, the whiskey element is taking a stand against it and fighting the movement. The Liquor Dealers' Association of Charlotte published a card in the Observer saying they would resist the dispensary, and claiming that they had the Democratic leaders pledged not to interfere with the whiskey business. The Dispensary.

To the Editor of The Observer:

The Charlotte Liquor Dealers' Association says it will resist the dispensary. Of course it will, and this very fact ought to enlist every right-thinking, right-feeling, right-doing man on the side of the dispensary. Liquor men do not want their debauching business molested. Homes may be reduced to poverty, widows and orphans made; the country run to expense by criminals and paupers—men ruined for time and eternity, and all the dark, wretched, damning evils that follow the accursed traffic. These are matters of little moment to men who are willing to deal out liquor to their fellows solely for the money there is in it to them.

Touched by the orphans' cry and the widow's bitter wail, and moved by the wretchedness of the poor, drunk and bound by the chains of

strong drink, the lovers of humanity want to try to change the sad order of things and in some way help the sufferers, and as we make our first move these heartless traffickers tell us they will resist. Well let them resist. If we are right, if God is on our side, it will do them no good to resist. But the strange, shameful and alarming thing, the article signed by the Liquor Dealers' Association reveals is the fact that they have "some of our present representatives of the Democratic party, together with the chairman of the Democratic executive committee," pledged "not to in any way interfere with the present system of the whiskey business." Such representatives and such a chairman may sell themselves to the liquor traffic if they so choose, but there are many good, liberty-loving, Christian people in this county who are not ready to pledge themselves to the body and soul-destroying liquor business. In the article referred to this Liquor Dealers' Association almost directly threatens to disrupt the Democratic party if we do not let them alone. Certainly they will try to disrupt the party if they cannot sell liquor. Men who have so little love for humanity as to sell liquor have no love for party only so far as it protects them in their heartless business. They defy heaven to sell it; they ruin their fellows to sell it, and of course they would break up a party to sell.

Well, if it takes the debauching liquor traffic as it is now run to hold a party together and make it a success, it is better to let it split wide open, and the sooner the better.

I have said nothing about the advantages of the dispensary over the present system. I leave this for others to speak of.

The fight is on. Let it continue till the victory is won, as I am sure we shall win sooner or later. Let us not only work but pray for success. Respectfully,

WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 6, '99
Senator Gorman knew when he began his fight against the treaty that the securing of thirty-odd votes against the ratification of the treaty, would not permanently reject the treaty, because of the certainty of its commanding more than the necessary two-thirds in the Senate of the next Congress; therefore it was unimportant whether he secured them or not. But he has accomplished the principal object for which he fought. The speeches made in the Senate have aroused the people of the country to the danger that lies in our permanent possession of the Philippines, and made it certain that public opinion will prevent the carrying out of the imperial policy that has been buzzing in the heads of Mr. McKinley and some of his chief advisers. Mr. Gorman thinks that public opinion could not have been so speedily or so thoroughly aroused in any other way, as it has been by the fight he and those who acted with him, have made. They were not strong enough in votes to amend the treaty, but the result shows that there are more ways than hanging to kill a dog. If imperialism hasn't been killed, it has been badly crippled.

Mr. Keegan, a representative of

the International Mechanics Union, who was among those heard by the Senate Committee on Education and Labor, on the eight hour bill, made some startling charges. He charged that the Cramp Shipbuilding Company and the Maxim-Nordenfeldt Gun Company, being unable to fill at the price specified contracts for guns and gun carriages, awarded them by the Government, had had the work performed by Government employes at the Washington Navy Yard, and received in cash, the difference between the cost of making and the contract price. He charged that under the arrangement specified, the Cramp Company had received \$17,000, as the difference between the cost of making the Gun carriages and the contract price, and that the Maxim-Nordenfeldt Co. had received \$2,400 each for guns which were made by government employes, at a cost of \$1,000 each, thus pocketing a profit of \$1,400 on each gun, without engaging in the work of making them. Senator Kyle was directed to personally investigate these charges.

The House Judiciary Committee has reported a resolution declaring that General Wheeler, Col. Campbell, Colonel Colson and Major Robbins vacated their seats in the House when they accepted Commissions in the Army. The attempt to have the committee take the same action in the cases of Representatives who are members of several existing Government Commissions, was a failure. The Committee decided that Congressmen may serve on Civil Commissions without forfeiting their seats.

Although the Republican House Caucus decided not to try to push any financial legislation at this session, the extreme gold standard men are trying to force action on the Hill financial bill. A resolution has been offered, fixing Feb. 14th, for voting on that bill, and pressure is being brought to bear on the Committee on Rules, to have that resolution reported back to the House.
