The Right View.

The Dispensary plan of controlling the liquor traffic must be thoroughly understood or it will do more harm than good. We have observed lately that good people in some sections have been arguing in behalf of the plan that it makes more money for the people than the saloon licenses did. That is a very pernicious principle. The object of the Dispensary is not to make money. It has but one reason for existence, namely that it gives to the town and county absolute control of a great evil; exercising this control, youths are saved from the degrading associations of saloons, people in general are saved from the temptations of social drinking, and the power of the saloon element in politics is broken. To argue that the plan "solves the problem," "makes the liquor business respectable" or "adds money to the school fund" is false and dangerous. Even this early efforts are on foot in places where there is prohibition to establish dispensaries. For these efforts to succeed will be a backward step. The proper attitude is—prohibition if possible; dispensaries rather than saloons; personal temperance at any rate. And the greatest of these is personal temperance.—Biblical Recorder.

The Legislature early in its session appointed a committee to investigate the removal by Governor Russell of J. W. Wilson and S. O. Wilson from the office of Railroad Commissioner. This committee made a full and thorough investigation and made its report to the Legislature on Wednesday. The report was to the effect that the Governor was not sustained in the charges he had preferred against the Wilsons, and as he had removed them from office without cause it was recommended that both be re-instated.

Some of the Republican members of the Legislature were so miffed over the impeachment of Judge Norwood that one of them, Representative White, of Davie, by way of attempted retribution was led into introducing a resolution preferring charges of drunkenness against Judge George H. Brown. It filled the House with both consternation and indignation. The resolution was referred to the Judiciary Committee who at once gave it a full investigation. Judge Brown was completely exonerated and the resolution proven a malicious attempt to injure his character. The introducer had to acknowledge that he was not the author of the resolution and he went before the House and asked that it be withdrawn.

From what we can learn the percentage of country people who favor the establishment of the dispensary for Pitt county is even larger than among the town people. The weather has been such that the canvassing with petitions has not been so general as it would have been under better conditions, but out of the number approached on the subject very few have refused to sign the petition. If the Legislature complies with the wishes of a large majority of the white voters of the county that body will certainly enact the law providing for the dispensary. The argument advanced by some that the passage of a dispensary law now might operate against the Constitutional amendment proposed by the Legislature is sheer nonsense. The Constitutional amendment will not be voted on until two years hence, and a dispensary put in operation now can in no way effect an election then. The dispensary is purely a

moral and not a political question, and it strikes us that the best way to keep it from ever becoming mixed with the politics of the county is for the Legislature to give us the law now.

To Revolutionize Telegraphy.

The Crehore-Squire Company, of Cleveland, Ohio, has been incorporated with a capital stock of \$1,000,000 to conduct a telegraph business. The promoters of the new company state that they will adopt a new system, invented by Messrs. Crehore and Squire, which will revolutionize telegraphy.

"We expect to put up wires throughout the country," said Col. Albert E. Squire, one of the inventors of the system, "and in a short time the present system will have become a thing of the past. Our invention is called the 'sign-wave' system. We have sent as high as 4,000 words per minute by the system. It was tested by the government about six months ago.

"Over 3,000 words were sent at that time. The receiving instrument prints the message out on paper."

Among the incorporators of the company is Harry A. Garfield, eldest son of the late President Garfield.

The Neglect of The Present.

Absent mindedness is sometimes considered to be a trait of genius. If this is the case there must be a good many brilliant minds in this country, for at a sale of property, left by their owners in the cars of a certain railroad company there were 1,500 umbrellas alone, to say nothing of the other forgotten articles included in the list.

A contemporary, commenting on this showing, says that "the trouble with all of us is that we are so busy planning the next thing that we have no time to do properly the present thing."

There is a vast amount of truth in this observation. Discounting the future is a favorite occupation with us end of the century mortals. Ambition has so enslaved us that we become breathless in the pursuit of whatever it may be we have set ourselves to attain. Energy, push, perseverance—all these are right and proper, but they should not claim too much of our attention, that we cannot properly dispose of the fruits with which their employment in the past has provided us.

To Reimburse The States.

The Senate committee on military affairs reported the bill introduced by Senator Fairbanks for the reimbursement of governors of states for moneys expended in connection with the recent war with Spain. The bill is amendatory of the act of July 18 last, and extends the provisions of the act so as to include expenditures made subsequent to July 8 and prior to August 12th, 1898.

The committee made several amendments, one of which provides that old claims of the government against states shall not be used to offset these war claims, and another providing for reimbursement on account of claims growing out of the enrollment of individual men who were not members of militia organizations, and also for the settlement of claims growing out of the enlistment of the immune and cowboy regiments.

The per capita circulation of the United States on February 1st, according to the last Treasury statement, was \$25.42—the highest ever recorded in the history of the country.

The Money For Cubans.

Secretary Alger announced that arrangements were being completed for the disbursement of \$3,000,000 among the soldiers of the Cuban army, and that the distribution would shortly begin. The first payments would be made to the troops in the provinces of Havana and Santiago de Cuba, and be extended to those in the remaining provinces as rapidly as possible.

It was decided to instruct the secretary of the war investigation commission to prepare a synopsis of 8,000 or 10,000 words of the commission's report, and to give out for publication the synopsis and the full report simultaneously.

In the Hotel Everett, one of New York's oldest hostleries, a custom adopted fifty years back is still in vogue. It is that of placing the reading of the thermometer immediately under the date line of the register. This is the duty of the clerk who takes the early morning watch. Years back, before Gotham's centre was a myriad of hotels, thermometers were not so plentiful, and nearly all the hotels adopted this custom of telling their patrons the condition of the atmosphere; but the Everett is the only one to continue the practice now.

The timber of the scaffold on which four murderers were hanged at Chestertown, Md., was afterward used in building a henhouse on ex-Sheriff Plummer's farm. It is a significant fact that while other farmers in the neighborhood have suffered from the depredations of chicken thieves, Plummer's henhouse has never been robbed.

The Lumberton Robesonian says: "People quarrel too much with their lot in life. They complain too much about their never ceasing cares, petty surroundings, the vexations they have to stand, the small and sordid men they have to live among." My country, and the legislature in session, too! Why do they not come and have a bill proposed to put an end to all vexations flesh is heir to.—Raleigh Post.

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EVERY American teacher possessing a library, and many that do not possess one, will be interested in the announcement of the history of the late war with Spain, now published by the REVIEW OF REVIEWS COMPANY. Much of the narrative was written by Dr. Albert Shaw during the actual fighting of the summer. This has been revised and amplified by him in the light of the official reports and documents, which have only become available after hostilities ceased. A free quotation from the critical Congressional debates and other public utterances at crucial periods aids in making this work what it is, the standard reference history of this decisive and successful struggle. But it is much more than a lively and comprehensive narrative. It goes back to the years of struggle in Cuba which prepared the way for the war; it discusses energetically all problems which confronted the United States after the war as to the Philippines, Cuba, and Porto Rico; and as a whole it forms a broadly conceived picture of the year which has seen America brought face to face with new world duties.

The important special and technical matters of the war period, generally dismissed by the historian with only slight and often insufficient discussion, are fully and authentically dealt with in contributed chapters, written by men who had unusual opportunities for studying their subjects. Thus, the lessons which the war has for us as to the relative efficiency of rifles and machine guns are in a carefully written chapter by Lieut. John H. Parker, of the United States army; the military movements of the Santiago and Porto Rican campaigns are analyzed by the editor of the *Army and Navy Journal*; the battle with Cervera is described by the novelist, Winston Churchill, who is a graduate of the United States Naval Academy; the actual condition of Cuba before the war and the facts which caused the war are described by eye-witnesses, Murat Halstead and Stephen Bonsai.

The illustration of the book is especially valuable in the hundreds of portraits, pictures of the navies, photographed scenes of the war, and the entertaining cartoons reproduced from the Spanish, French, German, and English papers, as well as from the American.
