But it is much more than a lively and comprehensive of this decisive and successful struggle in Cuba which prepared the way for the war; it discusses energetically all problems which confronted the United States after the war as to the Philippines, Cuba, and Porto Rico; and as a whole it forms a broadly conceived picture of the year which has seen America brought face to face with new world duties.

The important special and technical matters of the war period, generally dismissed by the historian with only slight and often insufficient discussion, are fully and authentically dealt with in contributed chapters, written by men who had unusual opportunities for studying their subjects. Thus, the lessons which the war has for us as to the relative efficiency of rifles and machine guns are in a carefully written chapter by Lieut. John H. Parker, of the United States army; the military movements of the Santiago and Porto Rican campaigns are analyzed by the editor of the Army and Navy Journal; the battle with Cervera is described by the novelist, Wir.ston Churchill, who is a graduate of the United States Naval Academy; the actual condition of Cuba before the war and the facts which caused the war are described by eye-witnesses, Murat Halstead and Stephen Bonsal.

DEHMAN THOMPSON'S FIRST

His Earliest Appearance on the Stage Was With a West Swanzey Club.

One of the most treasured memen. tos of Denman Thompson's long! and successful career on the stage is a programme of the first entertainment in which he appeared. Mr. Thompson has the bill incased in an oak frame, and he takes more pride in showing it to his friends than any of the costly souvenirs which he has collected during the 47 years he has been before the public. During the call of a Sentinel reporter upon Mr. Thompson at his home in West Swanzey a day or two ago the distinguished actor exhibited the precious piece of paper with the remark that no newspaper man had ever seen it or written about it.

The bill is 61/2 by 171/2 inches in size, was printed at The Sentinel office in Keene and aside from the cast of characters reads: "Exhibition by the request of their numerous friends. The West Swanzey Shakespeare club will give another entertainment at the town hall, Swanzey, on Tuesday, Dec. 10, 1850. Doors open at 5 o'clock, p. m. Curtains rise at 61/2. Tickets 121/2 cents."

The first number was an orchestral overture and then a song, "Greeting Glee," by A. E. Bennett, now of Keene, and others. Then came a national drama in two acts, entitled "Brazen Drum; or, The Yankee In Poland," in which Mr. Thompson played the part of Calvin Cartwheel, a drum major in the "Vermount" militia, "a carter and a whole team in the cause of Polish freedom." After that came a song, "Oh, Carry Me 'Long," by A. E. Bennett and others. "Therese, the Orphan of Geneva," was the next offering, in which Mr. Thompson appeared as the Count de Moroville. Then there was another song by A. E. Bennett and others and a fancy dance, "Lucy Long," by Mr. Thompson, and another song by Mr. Bennett.

The one act farce, "The Omnibus; or, A Convenient Distance," was the next number, in which Mr. Thompson had the part of Pat Rooney. A comic pantomime, "Adventures of Jack Jameson," closed the entertainment. The music was furnished by Ramsdall's band, which consisted of a violin and melodeon. The game was stopped just long enough for him to read it and lay it aside. In 20 minutes a second dispatch arrived, was read and cast aside. Doubleday was winning at the rate of 35 cents an hour. What did he care about Hannibal and St. Joe? Later in the afternoon a third summons came from Van Schaick & Co., and at 5 o'clock a fourth. Then Doubleday arose and remarked: "Gentlemen, I have enjoyed the game. My winnings are exactly \$1.65. I must say good afternoon, as it is necessary for me to take the first train for New York." The next morning his brokers informed him that he could settle for \$100,000. At the time the first telegram was sent he could have settled for \$25,000, at the time of the second for \$50,000, the third for \$75,000. He had ample warning, but in the thick of the Sudbury game of whist he believed the rise was only a threatening flurry.-New York Press.
