## TO THE WOMEN OF NORTH CAROLINA:

I am making an effort to form a State Federation, composed of all the organizations of women in North Carolina. This will bring the women of this State in touch with each other and with the women of other States, thereby securing the increased benefits which come from enlarged acquaintance, exchange of thought, and unity of action with definite aim. All organizations of women, and all Women's Departments of mixed organizations (such as Daughters of Rebekah, Rathbone Sisters, etc.) are invited to join in this movement, which is non-sectarian, non-political, and only designed for mutual helpfulness.

If this effort meets with general approval, a convention of women will be called at an early day to organize this Federation, and outline future action for the same.

This body of women, representing the organizations in the State, will decide whether this State Federation shall affiliate with the National Federation of Women's Clubs, and all other action proposed to the convention. Each delegate representing an organization will be entitled to vote on all questions discussed by the convention.

An effort will be made to secure reduced railroad rates for the delegates, and the fact duly published.

All organizations of women are requested to communicate with me on this subject.

All State papers are requested to copy this letter.

### Happenings in North Carolina.

The Southern Railway put on a new train between the north and south beginning its schedule last Sunday. The very first trip of the train through this State ran over a man, near Raleigh, and killed him.

No person can enter Elizabeth City now without producing a certificate of good health signed by a physician or health officer, and the railroads have been instructed not to sell tickets to Elizabeth City unless the purchaser has such certificate.

The New River Inn Hotel at the mouth of New River, Onslow county, was blown down by last Tuesday's storm. The hotel was owned by men from the state of New York, who came there every summer to hunt and fish. It could accommodate about fifty people and was valued at \$4,000.—Kinston Free Press.

### Making Up The Regular Army.

A Washington dispatch to the Asheville Gazette says that the recruiting under the regular army bill is going on at an unprecedented rate. The new organization of the regular army will consist of 14 batteries of 120 men each; ten cavalry regiments of 13 companies, 100 men to the company, and thirty-five regiments of infantry of twelve companies each and 112 men to the company. There is beside hospital and signal corps, beside bands and commissioned staff officers. The whole army is to contain 65,000 officers and men.

## The Governor's Remarkable Speech.

In a recent speech Hon. Robert Taylor, the retiring governor of Tennessee delivered himself of certain remarkable sentiments. He said in part:

"I am about to shuffle off this mortal coil of politics and fly away to the heaven of my native mountains, where I may think and dream in peace, safe from the sickening sting of unjust criticism, safe from the talons of some old political vulture; safe from the slimy kiss and the keen dagger of ingratitude.

"I do not mean to say that all politicians are vultures, or that they are all hypocrites or assassins; for the great majority of our public men are upright and honest and worthy of the confidence reposed in them by the people; yet there are black wings in the political firmament, and reptiles crawl and hiss in every capital. But, thank God, the live thunders of eternal truth always clear the atmosphere, and the heel of justice will surely bruise the serpent's head.

"I do not retire, the somnambulist of a shattered dream, but with all the buds of hope bursting into bloom and all the bowers of the future ringing with melody. I am contented with my lot in life. Three times I have worn the laurel wreath of honor, twined by the people of my native State, and that is glory enough for me.

"While I believe that the good of politics outweighs the bad, yet how thorny is the path, and how unhappy the pilgrimage of him who dares to do his duty! There are no flowers except a few bouquets snatched from the grave of fallen foes; there is no happiness except the transient thrill of cruel triumph which passes like a shadow across the heart.

"To me there is nothing in this world so pathetic as a candidate. He is like a mariner drifting without a compass, drifting on the tempest-tossed waves of uncertainty, between the smiling cliffs of hope and the frowning crags of fear. He is a walking petition and a living prayer; he is the dromedary of politics, the pack-horse of public sentiment. And even if he reaches the goal of his ambition, he will soon feel the serpent's fangs.

"Never again will I be inaugurated into public office. The ark of my public career now rests on the Ararat of private life, and I stand on its peaceful summit and look down on the receding flood of politics. The dove of my destiny

## Thousands of New Offices.

The clerks whose duty it is to prepare a statement showing the number of new offices authorized by Congress at its last session have a difficult task this year. Not only has there been an abnormally large amount of legislation creating new offices, but they must also construe the army reorganization bill and determine just what additional force of enlisted men and officers it provides for. According to Representative Steele, of Indiana, an ardent antagonist of the bill, it is susceptible of constructions fixing the strength of the army at various figures ranging from 20,000 to 109,000.

Besides the increase in the army, Congress has authorized, in addition to the clerical force made necessary by the war with Spain and the usual increase of departmental force, the appointment of many thousand employes and officials. These are provided for chiefly in the bill authorizing the taking of the twelfth census. Including the enumerators, whose service will be only temporary, there will be nearly 60,000 census employes. Then there are the additions to the navy roster carried in the personnel bill; the commission and employes necessary to make a national park of the Vicksburg battlefield; the commission to investigate the Isthmus canal routes, with its surveying parties; the clerks and attaches to the Paris Exposition commission and many commissioners to select sites for new public buildings.—Washington Dispatch.

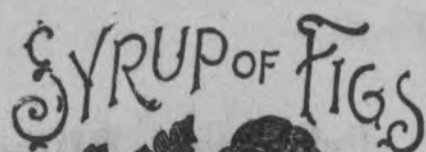
