### WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent.

Washington, D. C., Mar. 31, '99

Gen. Otis is still winning victories, but Aguinaldo still has an army, and we have not undisputed possession of a single island of the Philippine group. The administration seems to have acquired the "mañana" habit along with other Spanish property. So far as known our victories over the Filipinos have not been very productive of results, although the country has been daily told that "tomorrow will end the organized fighting." Mr. McKinley told his cabinet that he didn't like the situation and asked for opinions on the advisability of calling for the 35,000 volunteers authorized by the last Congress. It was pointed out to him that nothing could be accomplished by enlisting the volunteers now, as the rainy season in the Philippines would stop all active military movements long before they could be got there. An army officer came very near to correctly sizing up the situation when he said: "We lick the Filipinos every time we fight them, but they are such fools that they won't stay licked, and we have to keep doing it over again, which is monotonous; also expensive, both in blood and money."

The two Cubans who are in Washington as agents of the Cuban Assembly have been dropping some mysterious hints about their political backing in the United States and their expectation of succeeding in getting the consent of the administration to an issue of bonds by the Cuban Assembly, notwithstanding the semi-official statement that the administration would not recognize them in any way. Although only Congress can guarantee the payment of these bonds, a New York syndicate has offered to take \$20,000,000 of them, at half their face value, if the administration will sanction their issue. Ex-Representative King, of Utah is one of the democrats who expresses regret that the Jefferson dinner controversy should have occurred. He said: "I believe that Mr. Belmont or Mr. Croker had a right to get up a Jefferson banquet or to participate in one and to invite such gentlemen as were desired. There would be no impropriety, in my opinion, in Mr. Bryan's sitting down at a banquet with Croker and Belmont. If I should be invited to a Lincoln dinner I should accept with pleasure and would be glad to do honor to that distinguished statesman."

Democrats should get together. The last sentence shows that the difference between the opinions of Mr. King and Col. Bryan is an immaterial one, and that upon the main question they think alike.

Representative Sulzer, of New York, who is now in Washington, said: "I am sorry that Col. Bryan has seen fit to give Belmont so much free advertising, as Belmont represents no portion of the democratic party in New York. Col. Bryan has not impaired his popularity in the Empire state by his refusal to count Mr. Belmont and his fellow-bolters as democrats. The democracy of New York will see to it that Chicago platform democrats are selected to the next National Convention, and all apprehension in this regard is needless and absolutely without justification, from the attitude of the true democratic party in New York."

Gen. Eagan, when he was again placed on the stand by the Military Court of Inquiry, which is now sitting in Washington, promptly took the cue given him by the beef contractor, who testified that Eagan "must have been mistaken" when he stated that it had been his intention to make the contracts stipulate that refrigerated beef should keep 72 hours after being taken from the refrigerators, and that by an error it appeared in the contracts as 24 hours. Here is Eagan's last statement: "When I was asked here about the 24 hours I had totally forgotten that I had changed my own opinion as to the condition from 72 to 24 hours. I recall since in thinking it over that I was impelled to change it to keep 24 hours from the refrigerator on shore. I felt that 24 hours from the refrigerator would be ample to reach the troops." Things look blacker and blacker for Eagan. He must have seen it in the cold politeness with which he was treated by the officers in the court room; also by the looks of everyone present when he swore that he had never spoken to Boss Hanna and would not know him if he met him. This last was in answer to Maj. Lee's question—"Were you present at a conference between Senator Hanna and someone else in regard to a beef contract?" The "someone else" referred to was Secretary Alger. Capt. Black, who was in the Commissary department, did not help Eagan any when he testified that Eagan had been greatly excited when he returned to Washington and told him that the troops in Porto Rico had refused to take and eat the meat on the Manitoba. According to Capt. Black's testimony, Eagan said: "Blank, blank them. They had no right to refuse it, blank, blank, them; I would have made them take it."

Our accomplished correspondent, Mr. Ogden E. Edwards, makes the point that the United States are not making war upon the Filipinos as such, but upon Aguinaldo and his followers. Our distinct information is that all of the inhabitants of the islands excepting a few semi-barbarous tribes are enlisted under Aguinaldo's banner or are giving him their sympathy and support. Mr. Edwards thinks that we all should sustain the government at Washington in the war in which it is engaged. We believed in and lived up to the belief that it was the duty of all good citizens to hold up the President's hands in the "war for humanity" into which public clamor and a volatile Congress forced him. But the murder of these people on the other side of the earth was not on the cards when we set about to secure a "safe and stable government" for Cuba, and we can't get away from the conviction that we have no business with them or their affairs.—Charlotte Observer.

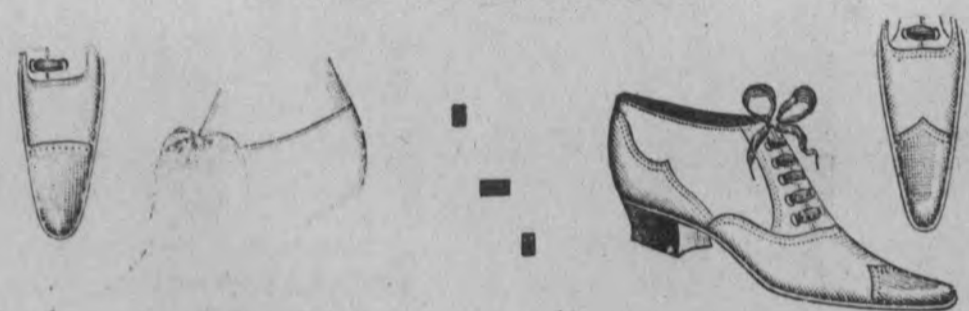

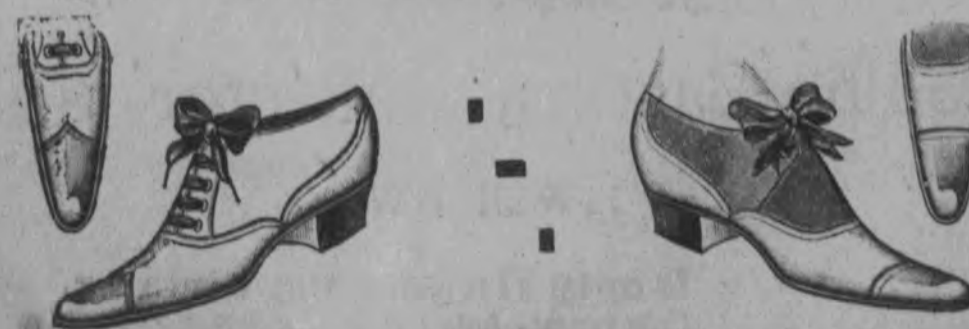
