GREENE COUNTY MUDDLE.

Decision in Favor of Fusionists.

Ever since the last election there has been a muddle in our neighboring county, Greene, as to who is entitled to hold the offices of the county. When the polls were declared the Superior Court Clerk gave certificates of election to the fusion candidates, the returns indicating that they had a small majority. It being evident that there had been irregularities at certain precincts, the Democratic candidates took a petition setting forth these irregularities before Judge Robinson at the December term of court, and he ordered a recount of the ballots. This recount showed that the Democratic candidates had received a majority of the votes. On the strength of this the Legislature seated the Democratic candidates, notwithstanding the fusion candidates held the certificate from the Clerk, and this course was generally approved by the people.

As to the county officers there was not so peaceable a conclusion of the matter, but on the contrary there has been constant litigation. There has been something of a dual government of county affairs, both sides trying to run things and both sides receiving more or less recognition from the public. The Democratic candidates had gotten possession of the Sheriff's and County Commissioners' offices, and against these the fusionist candidates brought mandamus proceedings for the insignia of office, claiming that the title was already vested in them by virtue of the certificate of election given by the Clerk. The mandamus proceeding was heard before Judge Timberlake. His decision, which has just been rendered, was in favor of the plaintiffs, the fusion candidates. This decision dispossesses the Democrats, but leaves the way open to them to take action under quo warranto proceedings.

There was quite an array of counsel on both sides and the case was strongly contested. The plaintiffs were represented by N. J. Rouse, A. J. Loftin and A. M. Moore, and the defense by C. B. Aycock, F. A. Daniels, F. A. Woodard, L. V. Morrill, G. M. Lindsay, S. Galloway, Wooten & Shaw and H. G. Connor.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent.

Washington, D.C., April 21, '99
The McKinleyites are jubilant because their bluff intended to drive Czar Reed out of Congress has succeeded, and Reed has accepted an offer to join a New York law firm. This means a new deal all around in the House and a general shaking up of the desirable chairmanships, many of which were held in the last House by men who were no more subservient to the administration than Reed himself was. All this will be changed in the organization of the present House, if present plans of the administration can be carried out, and no man will get anything desirable in the way of a chairmanship who does not wear the McKinley collar. There are about a dozen republicans who consider themselves candidates for Speaker of the House, but they are wasting their time. The Speaker and all the important chairmanships of committees will be selected by Boss Hanna and Mr. McKinley and all the republican caucus will have to do will be to ratify the selections. There will, of course, be republican objection to this programme, but without a stronger leadership than it is likely to have, it will not be able to change it. A friend of Mr. Reed says that he intends as a farewell shot at the administration to take a hand in the election of his successor. If he only would, there would be a lively scrap, but as his law firm is to make a specialty of corporation practice his partners will doubtless be able to convince him that he cannot afford to offend such an influential corporation magnate as Mark Hanna.

The talk about deposing Chairman Jones of the Democratic National Committee because of his extreme silver views is tommyrot of the worst kind. Chairman Jones has represented a majority of the committee, and still does, but his health is in such a condition—he is now at Atlantic City, slowly recovering from his recent serious illness—that his physicians have told him that it will be risking death for him to attempt to do the amount of work he had been doing up to the time he was taken sick. This being the situation, Senator Jones' retirement from the position of chairman of the committee was easy to predict, but it was very small business to try to make it appear that he was to be forced out because he was not this or that, and is calculated to cause a man like Senator Jones to take the bit in his teeth, regardless of his health or the orders of the doctors, and retain the chairmanship until the democratic candidate for President in accordance with custom, names his successor. Should Senator Jones die under the strain, those who originated the stories mentioned would be as surely murderers as though they had administered poison to him.

Hon. Bartlett Tripp, the American member of the Samoan Commission, which will leave San Francisco next week, on the auxiliary cruiser Badger, doesn't regard the trip as anything more than a pleasant summer excursion. He said before leaving Washington: "I do not believe it will take any extended period for the representatives of the three governments interested to agree on some policy that will be satisfactory to all. There are no insurmountable difficulties in the way of an understanding that will protect everybody. It isn't as though the mastery of a continent was involved; the comparative smallness of the interests

There is more interest in the result of the Commission's investigation of the charge that German treachery was responsible for the ambuscading of American and English marines than in anything else it has to do. Nobody seems to care a continental what the Commission does about the government of the Samoan islands.

A sharp reprimand to the military censor at Manila was sent by the War Department, because he allowed the remarks of Gen. Lawton about 100,000 men being needed in the Philippines to be cabled to this country; it is said that Gen. Shafter also got a hint from the same source that he was doing too much talking about his belief that it would be necessary to kill off half of the Filipinos before we could keep peace on the islands.

Mr. McKinley has decided that it would be bad politics to call for more volunteers to be sent to the Philippines, and has ordered that the volunteers now over there shall be sent home as fast as vessels to bring them are available. Regulars will be sent to take their places as it is not considered safe to reduce the number of men under command of Otis, even during the rainy season, soon to begin.

There was quite a shock in Washington when Admiral Dewey reported that Lieut. Gilmore and 14 of the crew of the Yorktown had been, while away from the ship on a launch, either killed or captured by the Filipinos. Washington is Lieut. Gilmore's home.

Biggest Check Ever Drawn.

There were made out last year two checks which were and still are the largest ever drawn in single financial transactions, says the St. James Budget. The smaller of the two checks established a record as the largest ever drawn; but although it was for more than \$55,000,000, it did not long remain the largest, being soon eclipsed by a check for \$622,500,000. These valuable pieces of paper were drawn in connection with the last Chinese Loan, and the final installment of the war indemnity money which was due to Japan from China, and changed hands in the parlor of the Bank of England.—Keystone.

Good Advice.

Have some system about your advertising expenditure. Decide at the beginning of the season how much you can afford to spend for the sake of publicity, then divide it among the various mediums as the experience of the past has taught best. If you have two local papers—one good and one with no excuse for existence—put all your money in the good paper, and not three-fourths in the good paper and one-fourth in the poor one, just for the sake of "standing in" with the manager of the latter. Don't make contracts right away for the full amount you intend to spend. Hold back about 10 per cent or 15 per cent, for good opportunities may come along later and find your money all spent. When you do use the local newspaper use it steadily—go in every issue, even though you have to use small space. A modest-sized advertisement in every issue is better than one twice the size in every other issue.—G. H. E. Hawkins, in the Wheel.

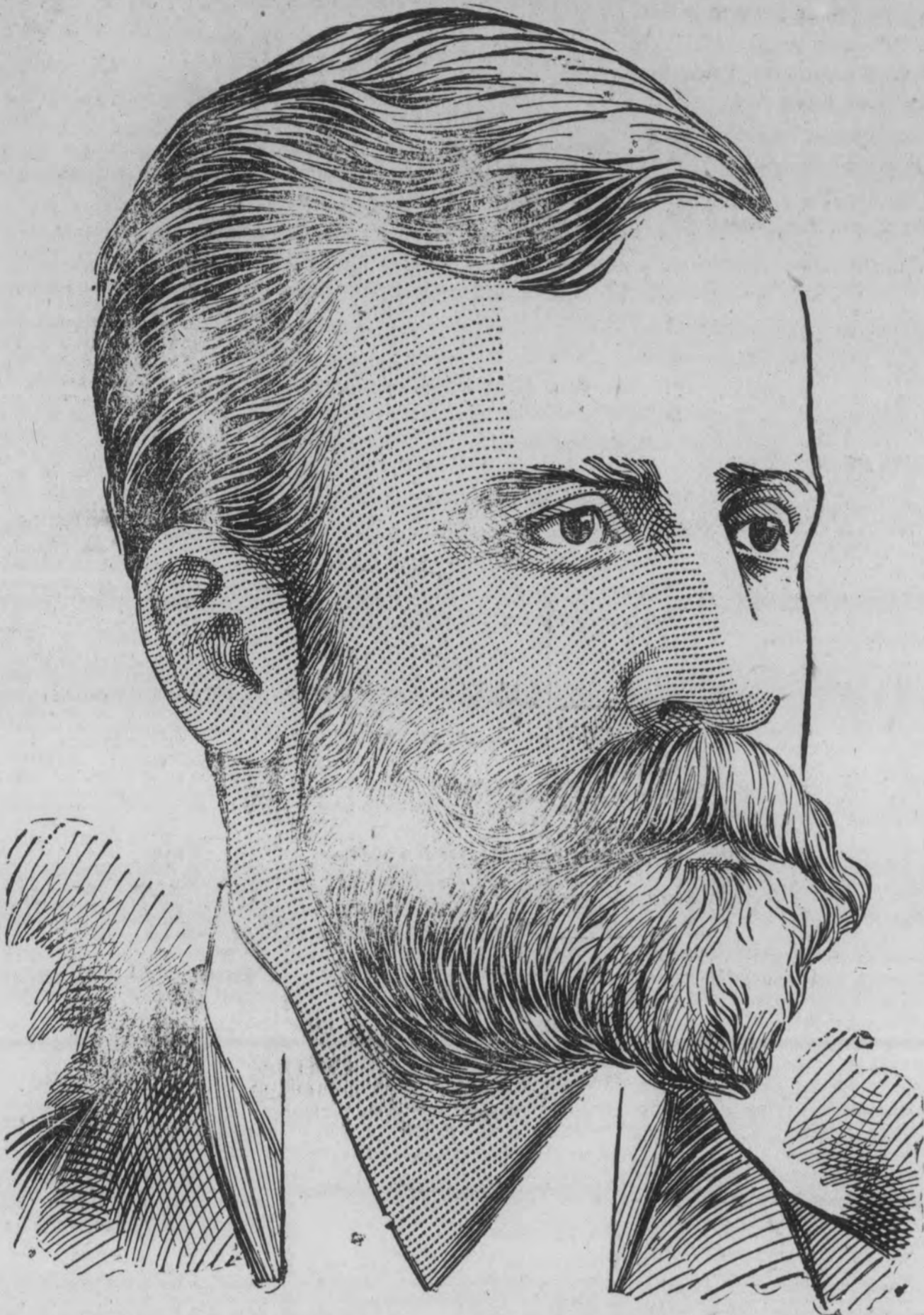
