ORDER AT THE DEPOT.

A Good Ordinance Adopted.

At the special meeting Monday afternoon the Town Council adopted an ordinance that will put a stop to the boisterousness around the depot, and will also prevent hotel porters and hack runners from crowding around in the way of passengers getting on and off trains. The ordinance reads as follows:

It shall be unlawful for any agent or porter of any hotel or boarding house, for any owner, agent or driver of any hack or other vehicle, or for any other person at the depot or railroad station in this town to obstruct the way to such station or the platform or sidewalk of such station or car so as to hinder or prevent the free and uninterrupted access to or departure from such station or car, or those attending or receiving them at such station. It shall be unlawful for any person at such station to make any unnecessary loud outcry or clamor, or to solicit custom or employment in a tone louder than a conversational one, or to take hold of any passenger's person, clothing, baggage or property, unless previously requested by such passenger to do so. No such porter, agent, driver or owner of any hack or other vehicle shall go upon any such platform or sidewalk, or beyond the posts erected by the railroad to mark the limit of such persons, for the purpose of soliciting custom or employment, unless authorized to do so by the police officer on duty at such station; nor shall any person loiter or loaf around such depot or station after being warned not to do so by the policeman on duty. Any persons violating the provisions of this ordinance shall on conviction before the Mayor be fined \$5 or be imprisoned ten days.

SHELTERS AND SIGNS.

Town Council Says They Must Come Down.

At its special meeting Monday afternoon the Board of Councilmen unanimously adopted the following ordinance:

It is hereby declared to be a nuisance to erect, maintain or keep a wooden shelter over any sidewalk in the town on Evans street between Second and Fifth streets, or to erect, maintain or keep any sign, post or other obstruction upon or over said sidewalks or streets between said points. Any person violating this ordinance shall upon conviction before the Mayor, be fined \$5 for each day such shelter, sign or post or other obstruction may remain. This section shall not apply to telegraph and telephone poles or tie posts which are located, erected and maintained by permission of the street committee. This ordinance shall take effect and become operative on the 10th day of May, 1899.

Going to Washington

The Osceola Band will go to Washington, May 10th, to attend Memorial Day exercises and will give a concert there that night. They will charter a steamer and expect to take down a crowd from Greenville.

TOWN MATTERS.

Councilmen Making New Laws.

The Town Council held a special meeting Monday afternoon and adopted two new ordinances, one for the purpose of securing order about the depot and the other prohibiting shelters, signs or other obstructions to the sidewalks of Evans street between Second and Fifth streets. Both these ordinances are published in full in this issue of THE REFLECTOR.

The Council granted permission to Strause Bros. to extend their railroad siding across Tenth and Eleventh streets to their factory.

The Mayor was directed to notify all liquor dealers of the town that they must close their places of business at night by the hour required in the new town charter. (11 o'clock.)

The committee was authorized to offer \$22.50 per month for a man to attend to the fire engine horses and to do the street hauling.

Congressman Baird, of Louisiana died Saturday afternoon in Washington. He had just finished his first term in Congress and had been re-elected to the next Congress.

The dispatches tell that Spain now wants to help the United States. Lieut. Gilmore and the fourteen of the Yorktown's crew who were recently captured by the insurgents, were on an expedition to release some Spanish prisoners held by the rebels, and to show appreciation of this Spain has asked permission for the remaining Spanish troops in the Philippines to join the American forces in finding and releasing the captives, if they are yet alive. However, Spain is treacherous, and if allowed to take a hand in this matter it should be done with a good deal of surveillance.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent. Washington, D.C., April 24, '99 Major Lee, who has been the personal representative of Gen. Miles before the Court of Inquiry, made a speech summing up the evidence taken during the inquiry that any lawyer might have been proud of. He showed that every allegation made by Gen. Miles has been fully sustained by good evidence, but if the Algerites are correct in their outline of the report, which the Court will make in a few days, probably this week, the evidence is to be ignored, Alger and Eagan white-washed, and Gen. Miles and the officers who dared to tell the truth about the beef furnished the army, censured. If that sort of a report is submitted, a wave of indignation is likely to sweep over this country that when compared with that which followed the white washing of Alger by the War Commission, will be as a tornado to a summer zephyr. The people of this country have decided this case on the evidence, and if Mr. McKinley is unwise enough to allow his friendship for Algerism and his dislike for Gen. Miles to cause him to use his official influence to get a report contrary to the evidence, so much the worse for Mr. McKinley. The country has been disposed, through all the dirty mess, to believe in the personal integrity of Mr. McKinley and that he was the victim of his political obligations to Alger, but public opinion cannot be made to stand too great a strain.

The republican managers are trying to get Mr. Hobart to announce that, owing to his health, he will not be a candidate for re-nomination, but he has so far declined to do so, although his health is really in a serious condition.

Manila Bay, last year, when the Germans tried to get a little up-pish. It is denied that the German Ambassador made any complaint about Capt. Coghlan's story, but of course, everybody knows that it is a part of diplomacy to deny anything and everything whenever it is deemed policy to do so.

Factories Help The Farmers. Apprehension has been expressed that growing manufacturing interests will tend to the disadvantage of the farming interests of the South. Observation of facts do not prove such to be the case, but show a contrary result. The population engaged in manufactures become customers of farmers for their crops of food stuffs. These markets for perishable products become of great advantage to farmers and the improvement in farming interests are readily noticeable in the vicinity of manufacturing towns. Of course more work is required but the work of raising fruits, vegetables, chickens, eggs, milk and butter and taking these to the factory villages where markets are found is not by any means disagreeable work. This can all usually be done by a thrifty farmer without materially interfering with the production of the usual cotton crop. It would seem as if manufactures benefit the neighboring farmers in about as large proportion as they do those owning stock in them or engaged in operating them.—Charlotte Observer.

A Strange Case. Mr. W. M. Wilson is well known to many of our readers. He has undergone a strange experience lately. About ten months ago he accidentally struck his head against a post. He was looking in another direction from the post when he ran against it, consequently the shock was great, although at the time no serious injury resulted. A few weeks after the accident his hair, beard, eyebrows and eyelashes began to drop out. This continued until he was as bald as an orange. A little later on his hair began to grow on his head and instead of the natural color it was white, not gray, but white as cotton. In the same manner his beard, eyebrows and lashes were white.
