NEW TOWN CHARTER.

An Act to Amend and Consolidate the Charter of the Town of Greenville.

(CONTINUED FROM YESTERDAY.)

Sec. 28. That no wooden building shall be built on that part of Evans street lying between Second street on the North, and the town sewer at the Academy grove on the South, provided, however that any dwelling between these points now standing, that may be removed, burned or otherwise destroyed may be replaced.

Sec. 29. That all claims against said town shall be presented to the Board of Aldermen to be examined passed upon and audited, and the Board shall cause a record to be made of all claims allowed by them and shall cause an order to be issued upon the Treasurer therefor which order shall state what it is for and be signed by the presiding officer and countersigned by the Clerk.

Sec. 30. That the Treasurer shall keep a book in which he shall charge himself with all moneys that come into his hands which shall show the source or sources from which they were derived and in which he shall record the amount and date of all orders paid by him, the date of payment and to whom paid, and he shall pay out no moneys except upon the order of the Board. He shall make a full report to the Board at the end of each fiscal year which shall show the financial condition of the town, and he shall make such other reports, from time to time, as the Board may direct.

Sec. 31. That the Tax Collector shall collect and account for all the taxes due the town under the direction and supervision of the Board of Aldermen and shall pay the same to the Treasurer, from time to time, as the Board may direct, and he shall make his report to the Board at the end of each fiscal year which shall show the amounts received by him, the sources from which they were received, and the times and amounts when paid to the Treasurer. In addition to this report he shall make such additional reports as the Board may direct.

Sec. 32. That the Board of Aldermen at some meeting in May of each and every year, shall appoint some suitable person to take and make a list of all taxable property and all subjects of taxation within the town which he shall return to the Board at its first regular meet-

ing in July following, unless directed by the Board to make his return at another time. Upon the return of the list the Board shall give ten days notice of a meeting when complaints shall be heard, if any are to be made, and at a regular meeting to be held during the first week in August the Board shall levy the tax for the current fiscal year. The Board shall then cause a tax list to be made out and delivered to the Tax Collector which shall have all the force and effect of an execution. The Tax Collector shall collect said taxes, and pay them over to the Treasurer as fast as collected and he shall have all the rights and remedies, authority and power to enforce the payment of said taxes that are given to Sheriffs or Tax Collectors for the collection of State and county taxes by the laws of this State.

Sec. 33. That thirty days prior to any election to be held in said town for Aldermen the Board of Aldermen shall appoint a Registrar and two poll holders for each ward in said town to conduct the registration and hold the election in said town which shall be conducted and held in accordance with the general election laws of the State so far as the same are applicable to town elections. No person shall vote in said election unless he be a qualified voter under the laws of this State and a bona fide resident of the ward in which he offers to vote. The Board of Aldermen shall, at the time of the appointment of the Registrar and poll holders, designate the place in each ward where the election shall be held, and the Registrar shall attend the place three days immediately preceding the Saturday preceding the election. He shall remain at said place from 9 o'clock, a. m. to five o'clock, p. m. during said three days with his books of registration prepared to register such persons as may be entitled to register. He shall give at least ten days notice of the time and place of registration in one or more newspapers published in the town and at some place in his ward. The returns of said election shall be made to the Board of Aldermen, who shall declare and publish the result.

Sec. 34. That all laws and clauses of laws heretofore passed either chartering or amending the charter of the town of Greenville inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed.

Sec. 35. That this act shall be in force from and after its ratification.

In the General Assembly read three times, and ratified this the 27th day of February, A. D., 1899.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent.

Washington, D. C., April 24, '99

"Like master like man." Secretary Alger's fight upon Gen.

Miles has mostly been of an underhanded nature, so it is not very surprising that the report of the Military Court of Inquiry, now in Mr. McKinley's hands, should seek to make its attack upon Gen. Miles seem fair by jumping on a few minor commissary officers and recommending that they be court-martialed for neglecting their duty in connection with the beef supplied to the army—a neglect that the report says was extremely profitable to the beef contractors. This thing isn't done with. Gen. Miles was completely vindicated by the evidence taken and he intends to keep on fighting until his vindication is officially recognized, and he has been assured of support by prominent men in Congress, some of them republicans. He has known from the first that the personal enmity of two men connected with the Court of Inquiry would have prevented his getting fair treatment, even with Secretary Alger's influence against him left out of consideration.

Political pull was stronger with Mr. McKinley than his friendship for General Joe Wheeler; consequently "Fighting Joe's" application for active service in the Philippines was turned down, and that eminent political warrior, Fred. Grant, chosen as one of the three Brigadier Generals that are to be sent to the Philippines at once; the other two being Bates, who has just been detached from the command of the Santa Clara province, Cuba, and Young, who has been supervising the mustering out of volunteers in the South. Gen. Wheeler has repeatedly said that he would resign his commission if he could not get active service, but it is stated that he is to be offered command of the Department of Texas, which is to be revived. If Gen. Wheeler accepts this command, it will be an indication that there is something in the story of his expecting to be appointed Brigadier General in the regular army.

How Frozen Insects Revive.
Experiments in reviving frozen in-

stove. Several newly hatched moths
revived in a similar manner after being

hatched insects resist cold better than
older ones.
