Ignorance In Tax Paying.

Does the average tax paying citizen, when he is called upon to pay his municipal, county and State taxes, really understand what he is paying taxes upon, and does he know the details and items of the several amounts charged against him.

This may seem an absurd question, yet if the inquiry is made to the tax payer in a year when his taxes are increased, he will find it difficult to tell whether the increase is on account of local affairs or on account of national affairs.

On this line an exchange says: "One of our best citizens came in the office last night after having read the paper at home and was very much disturbed at reading that a tax had been imposed on his business and that he must pay the same this month. 'I'll tell you,' he declared, 'its all on account of this Philippine war. Here we are sending out there killing up those people and taxing our own people to do it.'"

And as the exchange further says, this citizen, "could not understand the tax when he was told that he contributed nothing toward the maintenance of the war unless he used whisky or tobacco besides the war tax on checks, telegrams and papers of that character."

The fact is that the tax payer really pays too little attention to the matters which control and govern the amount of his taxes which he is called upon to pay and only when the day of final settlement comes, when he must pay or get into trouble, then is the protest entered when it is too late, and all in vain.

The time to apply the remedy commences with putting city, county and State affairs in the hands of business men and not politicians, and the protest against taxes should be instituted before the expenses are incurred which compel the collection of the tax.

As long as citizens and tax payers remain indifferent to those selected to control public affairs, there should be no protest made when tax paying time comes.

When the management of public affairs becomes more practical, more business like, and less given into the hands of the politicians, then will there be fewer complaints made by tax payers, and more results made visible to the tax payers, from the tax he pays, and some satisfaction in paying taxes which show results.—New Berne Journal.

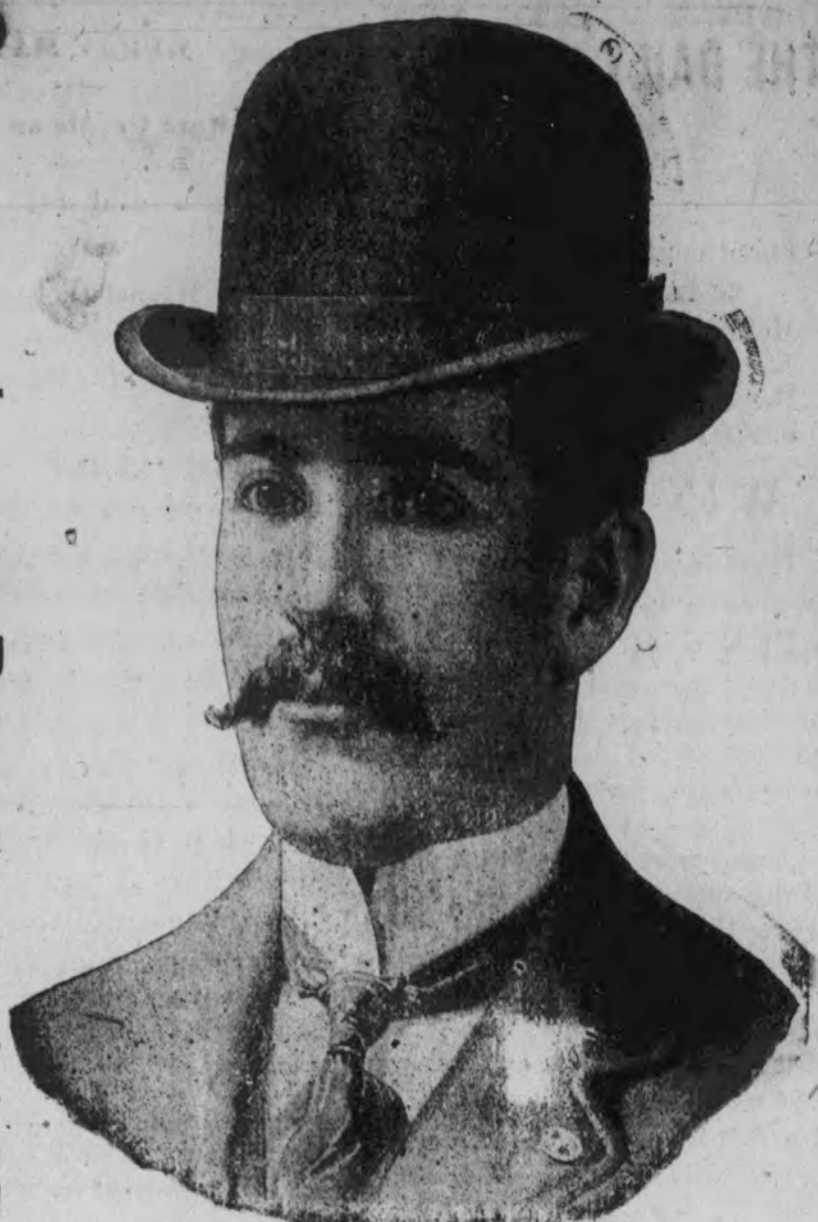
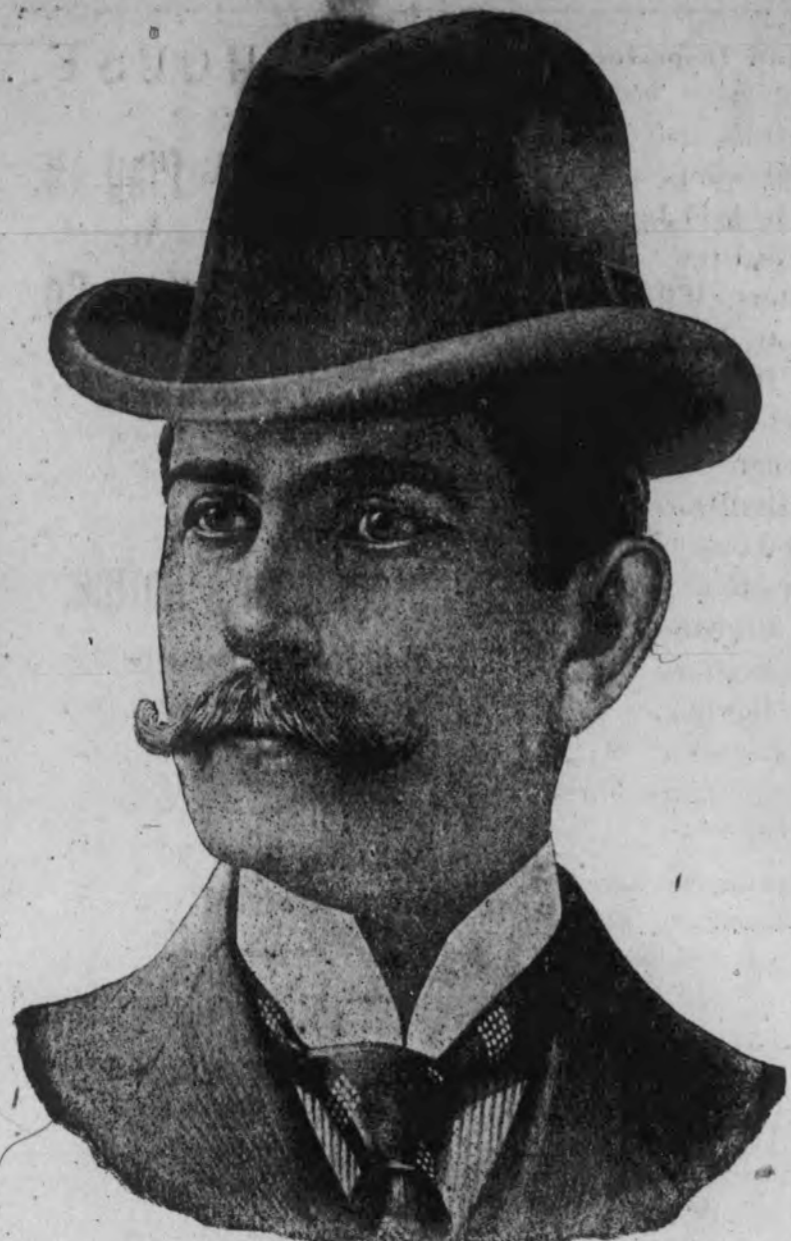

Forest Reservations.
The 30 forest reservations of the
United States embrace an area of 40,-
000,000 acres in 13 states and territo-
ries. Seven are in the state of Califor-
nia, the largest of which, the Sierra
forest reserve, includes 4,006,000 acres.
Within the past 35 years it is estimated
that 11,000,000,000 feet, board measure,
of timber on public land have been de-
stroyed by forest fires.

Sextons in New York.
"Sexton and Undertaker" is the sign
usually found affixed to or near the
New York churches, but it does not
mean that the sexton actually conducts
an undertaker's establishment. He
merely contracts for the funerals of the
members of the congregation and sub-
lets the work to what are known as
wholesale undertakers, who attend to
this class of work exclusively.

A 20 per cent commission is the
sexton's share of the proceeds, and, taking
into consideration the large mem-
bership of some of the New York churches
and the elaborate funerals that take
place almost daily, it can readily be
seen that to be a sexton is an honorable
calling—for it is a business that brings
in the coin. The profits of a sexton in
one of the large downtown churches are
estimated at \$10,000 annually from his
funeral business alone. Weddings are
not so profitable, but they do fairly well
and are cheerful. He collects the pew
rents and takes his habitual commis-
sion: he is paid for opening the church
and for closing it and a few other
things that keep him from starvation.
But there is one thing he must look
sharp after, and that is his collections.
It is a peculiar fact, but people will
stand off a funeral bill as long and ac-
cidentally as any other. —Exchange.

The Two Admirals.
There are now only two admirals
with their flags afloat, namely, Dewey
and Sir John O. Hopkins of the British
navy. France has no grade in her navy
higher than vice admiral, and there is
but one officer of this rank, who is now
attached to the French admiralty office.
Russia also does not recognize a higher
grade than vice admiral, and none of
her stations is now commanded by of-
ficers of higher rank than rear admiral.
Great Britain has more admirals than
all the other naval powers combined,
although the majority of them are mem-
bers of the admiralty. One is in
command at Portsmouth and another at
another important naval port.
