## STATE NEWS.

### Happenings in North Carolina.

Thos. A. Edison, the renowned electrician, is in Wilmington attending the convention of the Railway Telegraph Superintendents' Association.

At a meeting of line officers of the Second Regiment of the State Guard, held in Wilson on Wednesday W. B. Rodman, of Washington, was elected Colonel, W. A. Johnson, of Wilmington, Lieut. Colonel, and J. W. Gulick, of Goldsboro, Major.

A Masonic Temple is being erected at Wilmington, which will cost in the neighborhood of \$30,000.

The Observer says three eggs were found in the center of a bale of cotton at the Victor mill in Charlotte a few days ago. The eggs were not broken but were as sound as the day they were laid. This is an egg story right.

### OVER THE COUNTRY.

The Third Nebraska Volunteers, William J. Bryan's old regiment, want to go to Manila.

The women of Michigan University have adopted resolutions approving of the Peace Conference.

As the result of a feud, John A. Hunter, of Lostine, Ore., was shot and killed by Mrs. G. R. Elliott, who committed suicide.

Judge Ricks, of the Federal Court at Cleveland, O., has enjoined that city from reducing street car fares from five cents to four.

A Filipino flag, captured at Iloilo by Lieutenant W. P. Nilback, has just reached the Navy Department.

It is understood that the owners of the steamer Olinda Rodriguez will claim indemnity for her detention as a prize vessel.

Certain gruesome relics connected with the assassination of President Lincoln, April 14, 1865, are to be placed on exhibition at the National Museum.

### Rev. Mr. Glenn Returns.

Rev. E. C. Glenn, pastor of Central Methodist church, returned yesterday from Baltimore, where he went for medical treatment.

His congregation and friends generally will be pleased to learn that he returns improved already and with hope of gradually recovering his accustomed good health. He expects to actively resume the duties of his pastorate in a short time.—Raleigh Post.

### New York's Legislature to Meet Again.

Albany, May 17.—The Governor has issued a proclamation calling an extra session of the Legislature to meet at 8 on the evening of May 22 to consider amendments to the corporate franchise tax bill.

### A Fatal Lasso Throw.

The skill of eleven-year-old Frank Beaumont in throwing a lasso resulted in his death this evening. Since a Wild West show exhibited in the city recently the boys of Chester have been practicing with lassoes. Young Beaumont, tired of lassoing boys of his own age, looked for bigger game. He stationed himself along the Reading Railroad, near his house, No. 412 Front street, and prepared to lasso the engineer of freight train No. 56. The end of the lasso was tied about his waist. As the engine came swiftly up the grade with a whoop he sent the loop whistling through the air.

The engineer was leaning out of the cab window, unconscious of the boy at the side of the track, and was startled to suddenly find his arms pinioned to his sides. The loop of the lasso had fallen with great precision, and as the train moved forward the rope was jerked taut, rending the engineer helpless. The fireman was on the other side of the cab and knew nothing of the tragedy being enacted.

Young Beaumont, thrown off his feet when the jerk came, and unable to untie the rope around his waist, was dragged for a square, the roar of the train drowning his shrieks. He was finally drawn under the car wheels. The engineer succeeded in freeing his arms and stopped the train, but when the boy was picked up it was found that he was dead. The wheels had torn the scalp from his head and mangled him terribly.—Chester, Pa., Dispatch.

Now Mit is back on the Union chain gang, still behind with it some fifteen or sixteen months' time, which he is now proceeding to make up. Capt. Howie went to Yorkville a few days ago, where Mit was being detained for the space of six months at an institution similar to the one up here, and brought him back. He had indulged in a little sport down there which the "cullud" folks didn't like much. One night while feeling his liquor, he went to a negro wake and woke up things. Friends were singing the last doleful dirges over a departed brother. Mit rolled the earthly remains of the brother out of the coffin and jumped on him in true Injun style. He then made friends and poured a drink of liquor into the mouth of the deceased, one to warm him up, then pressed a cigar in his teeth and lit it. About this time the mourners began to remonstrate and Mit out with his gun and cleared out the house, excepting himself and the corpse. But in the melee he got a ball in his own leg and a gash from a knife.

As mentioned above, for this little sport he got six months, which shows that they don't think much of wakes in South Carolina and don't give corpses any protection worth speaking of.—Monroe Journal.

**THE SUGAR OF MILK**

A Note on the History of the Sugar of Milk  
Of the most important drugs and chemicals which have taken part in the composition of the world's medicine known by the name of medicine. The importation into the United States of lactams, barks, galls, ginseng, ginseng, herbs and leaves, and other valuable products to nearly equal extent, while the exports of similar products from this country have amounted to a total of about 10,000,000. Out of the hundreds of different names on the list with which the importer and wholesale drug dealer are familiar there are scores which are almost perfect strangers to the lay mind. Along with aloch, borax, opium, quinine and other well known drugs will be found cantharides, eccelus, meligan, catch, bala, chiro, and others of equally extraordinary character.

In this latter class might almost be mentioned sugar of milk, which occupies one of the most important positions in the drug transactions of the present day. The title of the drug would imply common knowledge, though, as a matter of fact, few understand its important uses. Time was when every ounce of this drug was imported from Europe. Today, thanks to American enterprise, it is manufactured in the United States on such an extensive scale that not only is the enormous domestic demand supplied by the homemade product, but large quantities are annually exported. When it was imported, the wholesale price was 80 cents a pound. Now it has declined to 8 cents.

History says that sugar of milk was first prepared in 1619, although not introduced into medicine until 1698. It is used almost entirely by pill manufacturers on account of its neutral, filling properties. It is absolutely neutral, inodorous and with a slightly sweet taste. As a vehicle for all manner of pulverized medicines it is perfect. Acids and drugs of all kinds with which it may be mixed do not have any effect upon it nor it upon them, and in the human stomach it is most easily disposed of.

It is manufactured from the whey of cow's milk, and is really a byproduct of milk. The process is one of evaporation and recrystallization. Switzerland once had a monopoly of its manufacture. Now Illinois leads the world, while a large factory has been started in New York state, which gives promise of producing as much as its western predecessor. Such has been the success of the American industry that the product is shipped even to Switzerland, where it is able to compete satisfactorily with the European makers.

In crystal form it resembles rock candy, being white in color. The growing demand for it has been caused by the development of a certain kind of pill and tablet, where hard to be dissolved. It is also used in the form of powder, and is for the most part, the only food that is so easily digested.

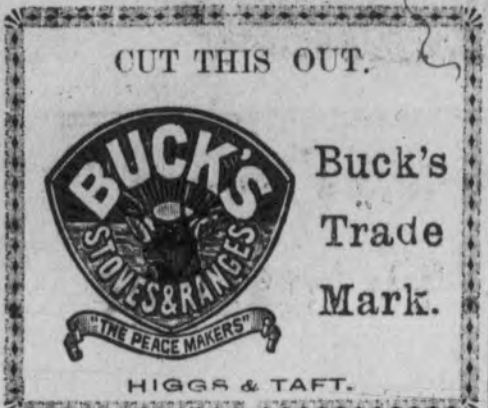
