TOBACCO JOTTINGS AND LOCAL NOTES.

While not generally so considered the tobacco crop at this particular period of growth is just about as liable to serious damage as at any other. We frequently hear peoplesay they want healthy stocky plants with which to set their crop. Why? Because these plants generally start off to growing well, are healthy from the beginning and in most cases develop into fine, strong tobacco which matures well, is not so subject to a second growth and cures a bright color. I am inclined to strong faith in the adage "that to succeed start right." Begin right and it is not much trouble to keep right if judgment and discretion are used, but if you get wrong in the beginning it will require more energy and trouble to get right again than it will require to succeed if you begin right. This is very applicable to a crop of tobacco. The crop is now just starting off to growing and if it can be kept in a healthy state by careful management now for a short while a good crop is assured.

How many who read this have ever seen very many real good crops of tobacco cured where the plants were weak and sickly through half the growing season. If farmers will watch their tobacco daily at this stage and if their tobacco begins to run up spindling—look yellow and narrow leaved—go to work immediately to change the growth by stirring the ground around the plants and in the majority of cases they will check the disease or unnaturalness of growth and it will soon get back to its natural condition and make vigorous growth. Plant life gets sick the same as animal life and each farmer of cultivated crops, if he would succeed with his crops, must to a greater or less extent be a doctor of the diseases to which plant life is the natural heir. The crop at this time generally looks well and healthy and if farmers will look carefully after it there is no reason why a splendid crop should not be made. If your tobacco begins to show signs of disease and you don't know the cause of the trouble consult your neighbor. He may know more about the disease than you. In asking advice of others don't overlook the fact that you are not compelled to take the advice and if it is not in accord with your own views if they are practical put it aside and apply your own common sense and do it quickly lest your crop ruins or becomes permanently damaged.

Samoa's Snake Sivas.

Samoa, it is well known, is one of the very few islands in the Pacific where snakes are found in plenty.

None of the reptiles here, however, are venomous, and in consequence the natives show absolutely no fear of them.

Their indifference to the reptiles is made most markedly manifest at the hamlet of Iva, on the northeast coast of Savail.

The dancing girls of the place are in the habit of employing the snakes for personal adornment in their dances. They tie them about their necks, their ankles and their wrists, festoon them in their head-dresses, and tuck a few extra ones in the belt in readiness to replace such as may escape in the dance.

At their best these sivas danced by the Samoans are revolting shows of savagery. It can be easily imagined that they are made no more attractive by the village maid and her crew of attendant girls careering round adorned with an assortment of writhing red snakes.

How Fish Breathe.

Fish do not breathe air, but the life-supporting constituent of air—oxygen gas—which is soluble in water to the extent of 3 volumes in 100 at ordinary temperatures and 4 in 100 at freezing point.

The water containing the dissolved oxygen is made to pass over the gills, where it is separated from the blood only by a very thin membrane, through which the gas is able to pass.

Fish in ice-bound rivers have to depend entirely upon this store of oxygen for their respiration, and if it becomes exhausted they are suffocated, just as we should be if deprived of oxygen.

It rarely happens, however, that any considerable area of water is entirely covered with ice, especially in the case of rivers. Holes and cracks are almost sure to occur here and there, by which the oxygen of the air can reach the water and become dissolved in it. During a long frost fish may always be found congregated beneath air holes in large numbers. They are there to breathe.

For Easy Travel.

Pneumatic cushions of rectangular form are placed beneath the floor, seats and seat backs of a new English railway carriage to lessen the shocks and jars of the road, the frames supporting the seats being loosely mounted to have free movement on the cushions.

Snakes Never Shut Their Eyes.

One of the most curious facts with regard to snakes is that their eyes are never closed. Sleeping or waking, alive or dead, they are always wide opened. This is because there are no eyelids. The eye is protected only by a strong scale, which forms a part of the epidermal envelope, and is cast off in a piece with that every time the reptile molts. This eye plate is as clear and transparent as glass, and allows the most perfect vision, while at the same time it is so hard and tough as to perfectly protect the delicate organ within from the thorns and twigs among which, in flight from enemies or in pursuit of prey, the reptile so often hurriedly glides, as any close observer of the habits of the snake can readily discover.

A Novel Invention.

One of the most ingenious as well as useful contrivances ever invented is a clock with attachments that not only wake a person at night, but also strike a light in the room and kindle a fire. If a person wants to get up at 3:30 o'clock in the morning, all that is necessary is to set the alarm on the clock for that hour and adjust the light and fire attachments. Promptly at 3:30 the alarm will awake the sleeper, light a candle that is attached and kindle a fire in the grate. The clock works perfectly, and Mr. Hunt has already sold the State right for their sale in a number of States.

Two Hundred Dances in Wine Tank.

One hundred couples can dance at one time in the great half-million-gallon wine reservoir of the Italian-Swiss colony at Asti, Sonoma county. The Asti wine reservoir is the largest, if not the only example of its kind in the world. It was constructed as a matter of necessity and some what as an experiment from inability to obtain sufficient coöperation for the wine crop which the San Francisco merchants refused to purchase. There is room in the reservoir for 200 dancers, as its dimensions are 80 feet in length, 24 in breadth and 24 in height.

An Alarm Thermometer.

To give an alarm when any predetermined temperature is reached a new thermometer has wires inserted in the side of the tube to complete an electric circuit as soon as the mercury rises, the wires being led to a switchboard, which is set at any desired temperature.

For Drawing Corks.

Corks can be easily withdrawn from bottles by means of a new attachment consisting of an endless strip of canvas or other heavy fabric, which is forced into the neck of the bottle with the cork, a loop being left at the top for the insertion of the fingers.

As to Bamboo Rods.

Bamboo rods for the manufacture of furniture, fishing poles, etc., are reduced in size and shaped as desired by a new machine, composed of a tapering metallic die heated to a gray heat, into which the stalks are forced, the heat melting the siliceous coating and fibres into a plastic state.

Pills for Plants.

The administration of food to plants by means of pills is a new idea. The exact kind of nourishment required is easily ascertained, the necessary salts are included in a prepared case and buried under the roots.

Russian Superstition.

Drum Used in Worship.

In the Japanese temples there is a large drum used in worship. It is called the kagara-toko, and it gives a tone much like a gong.

In the Imperial library at Calcutta more than 1,000 volumes on Indian affairs are brought together and classified.
