AYDEN COMMENCEMENT.

Close of Free Will Baptist Seminary.

The commencement exercises of the first session of the Free Will Baptist Seminary at Ayden took place on Friday, 9th inst. A large crowd was present and the interesting programme was very much enjoyed.

The exercises began at 11 o'clock, and after the opening prayer by Rev. Mr. Phillips and two songs by the pupils Miss Emma Lee, of Dunn, one of the students of the Seminary, arose to introduce the speaker of the occasion. Her introductory remarks were as follows:

The long hand upon the dial-plate of the centuries, points to one word—progress. Each decade demands deeper convictions, a broader culture, a more elevated standard of citizenship than its predecessor. The greatest of American orators and statesmen has said: "The most awful thought that ever presented itself to my mind is that of my personal responsibility to God." Next to this, in solemnity we would place our duty to the State.

It is our privilege to listen today to one whose life is a noble lesson in civics. In accepting our invitation to deliver the annual address, our venerable friend expressed a sentiment, which has dominated a long life of distinguished service. His response was—"If I can serve the people of your community and the patrons and pupils of your school on that occasion, you may command my services."

So it has always been while wearing the numerous political honors which it has pleased a grateful people to bestow; he has been always the plain unassuming Christian gentleman, the brave soldier, a man of the people, the secret of whose usefulness has been his willingness to serve. I have the honor of presenting to this audience Ex-Gov. T. J. Jarvis, of Greenville.

Gov. Jarvis in acknowledgement of this said that in his long career as a public speaker he had been introduced to audiences by many different people, but never before had he been presented by a lady in such beautiful language as this. Man can have no higher motto than "I serve" and in any sphere of life to be a true servant of your fellowman is an honor to be held in high esteem. He was present on this occasion to serve, as best he could, those before him and he wished to make a plain, practical talk that even the humblest might understand and have something to take home with them to reflect upon.

Gov. Jarvis announced for his subject "The Home and the School." He spoke at some length upon the influence that goes out into the world from the home, and this influence can be measured for good or evil according to the character of those who occupy the home. The very foundation of our nation rests upon the influence that emanates from the ideal home. Such home is not confined to the palace or mansion, but is oftenest found in the cottage or even the humblest cabin. He enlabeled the consecrated, cultured, Christian mother in the home as yielding the most powerful influence known to the world. The school is second in influence only to the home, for it is here that the foundation laid in the home is builded upon and the structure of true manhood and womanhood is developed. The

speaker enlarged upon the importance of having only the best and most careful instructors in our schools. One strong sentence that he uttered in this connection was that "no man who visits a barroom is fit to occupy the teacher's desk or to stand in the sacred pulpit."

Space will not permit a fuller synopsis of Gov. Jarvis' excellent address which was of such a nature as to be of much value to all so fortunate as to hear it, and was listened to intently by the large audience.

The commencement exercises closed with a splendid concert at night.

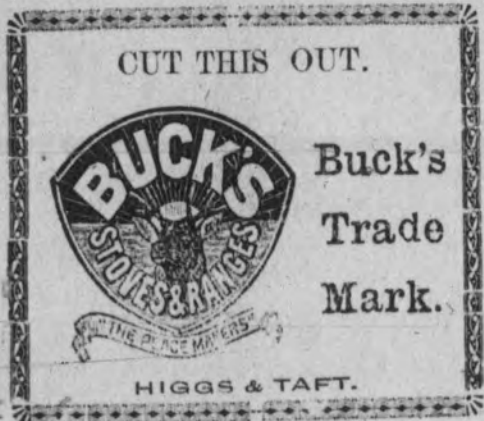
