Happenings in North Carolina.

Double daily passenger trains have been put on the A. & N. C. railroad between Goldsboro and Morehead.

The Baptist Sunday-school Chautauqua, comprising the Flat River, Central, Tar River, Chowan and West Chowan associations, will be held in Scotland Neck, July 18-21.

Four colored prisoners in Halifax jail assaulted the jailer and made their escape. A white prisoner went to the assistance of the jailer and he also was roughly used by the negroes.

A Sunday school excursion from Wilmington to Lake Waccamaw had a sad ending. Some boys went bathing in the lake and two of them, Edward McLaurin and John Murphy, were drowned.

Colored Man Drowned.

Friday afternoon a colored man, named Anthony Vines, about 21 years old, went swimming in a marl hole on the old Lambert Beardsley place. From some cause he began to sink and called for help. Will Barrett, another colored man who was standing on the bank of the marl hole, held a pole to Anthony to try to help him out. The pole broke and Will was thrown into the water. Will succeeded in swimming out but before any further assistance could be rendered Anthony he was drowned. Another man named Hines dived down in the hole and recovered the body.

ALL DISCHARGED.

The case of the United States against a number of the good citizens of Pitt county charged with a conspiracy to intimidate and deter certain voters and election officers at Parker's X Roads precinct in the exercise of their rights and duties at the November election, which has been under investigation before United States Commissioner Ormand, came to a sudden and rather unexpected termination about four o'clock Friday afternoon. The defendants were engaged all day Thursday and up to 4 o'clock Friday in putting before the Court a complete defense to the charges. They developed the fact beyond all manner of doubt that a number of colored people went to the election with double barrel shot guns which were concealed near by. That the election went on smoothly until about eleven o'clock when a colored man went to the window where the voting was going on to cast his vote. The election officer standing at the window who took the ballot called out "Robert Bell." The voter said "no, my name is Robert Staton." The election officer who had the registration book in charge said there was no such name as "Robert Staton" on the book. Another negro standing by suggested to the voter to offer to vote as Robert Bell, but Staton replied "no, my name is Robert Staton." A large crowd of negroes and a considerable number of whites gathered up near the window, some saying his name was Staton and others that it was Bell. A brother of the voter stepping up said "I am his brother, my name is Warren Staton and his name is Robert Staton." The voter was then asked how he had registered and he replied "Robert Staton." The election officer at the window then told him as no such name was on the registration book he could not vote and the negro walked away. He never asked to be allowed to vote or offered to vote as Robert Bell. That the negroes largely outnumbered the whites and that many of them were armed with clubs and sticks; that some one of them was heard to say that that vote should go into the box or he would die; that one negro was seen to leave the crowd, go off

to his buggy, get a double barrel shot gun and load it and start back towards the crowd saying he would kill or be killed. It was in this moment of excitement that some one rushed to the telephone and sent a message to Greenville that there was a riot going on at Parkers X Roads, which is two miles from Greenville, and begging for help. The news spread like wild fire in town as soon as the message was received and a number of persons, arming themselves with guns, rifles and pistols, and taking the first conveyance they could get, went hurriedly to what they supposed was the scene of the conflict. When they arrived they found the disturbance over and the voting resumed. They did not go near the voting place with their guns and did not interfere with any one in his right to vote.

Sometime after they arrived one negro who had voted long before they got there was disorderly and seemed to want to create trouble. He was pointed out to some of the Greenville crowd as the man who had been a leader in creating the disturbances and they compelled him to leave the grounds. Some of the best and most law-abiding citizens of that precinct fearing a renewal of the trouble requested a number of the gentlemen from Greenville to remain 'till the election closed, the votes were counted and the returns signed. That there was no intimidation or interference of any kind with any one. Everybody voted as he pleased without let or hindrance, that it was with these exceptions a quiet election and a full vote, the fusion ticket getting a large majority.

Every one of these facts have been brought out and established beyond the shadow of a doubt by the testimony taken Thursday and Friday. At about four o'clock and before the defense had finished their testimony, one of the counsel for the defendants arose and stated that there was much more testimony yet to be introduced but that it was of the same character and merely cumulative. That while he and his associates did not waive their right to go on with their testimony he asked the Court and the counsel for the Government to admit that further testimony was unnecessary and that the warrant ought to be dismissed without a further consumption of time, it being perfectly apparent that it would be impossible to convict a single one of the defendants upon the testimony already in.

Mr. Spears, who had been conducting the prosecution, stated frankly that he did not believe the evidence as a whole was sufficient to hold the defendants and that he would consent to their discharge without consuming further time; and to the delight and satisfaction of everybody the defendants were all discharged. It is proper for us to say in this connection, and we say it with pleasure, that both Mr. Spears and Mr. Ormond have shown a spirit of fairness during this remarkable trial.

Shot Her Husband.

Mr. Edward Spruill, a progressive farmer who lives on the Perkin's farm, about one mile east of Edenton, came very near being killed Saturday night by a pistol, which was in the hands of his wife. The weapon was discharged twice, both balls taking effect, one on the cheek and the other just over the heart. It was one of Smith & Weston's make of guns, No. 38. It was a new gun. Mr. Spruill had bought it while in town and took it home for protection. He was showing his wife how to use it when she pulled on the trigger too hard, causing it to shoot, the ball striking her husband on the cheek. This frightened Mrs. Spruill so badly that she jerked the gun again, the second ball taking effect just over the heart. Dr. J. H. McMullen was sent for and dressed the wounds, but did not probe for the bullet that lodged over the heart, thinking the operation might prove fatal. Mr. Spruill is up this morning and is doing as well as could be expected.—Ex

WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent.

Washington, D. C., June 23, '99

"Too good to be true," is the general comment upon the rumor that preceded Secretary Alger's return to Washington, saying that having made a deal with Pingree to support him for the Senatorship Alger would soon resign in order to devote his whole time to trying to get to the Senate. There are too many pickings in sight for Alger to voluntarily resign before he gets his share of them. Those Porto Rico concessions are yet to be given out, and the scheme of enlisting volunteers for the Philippines without a regular call for quotas from the States, which was devised so as to leave the appointment of the officers in the hands of the War Department instead of the governors of the states, where it would have to go if the usual course was followed, is an additional reason why Alger isn't likely to resign in the near future.

It is denied at the War Department that Gen. Miles is to be sent to the Philippines so as to have him out of reach when Congress meets, as was rumored several days ago.

The Agricultural Department made public a report that it has just received from Lieut. A. P. Hayne, California Heavy Artillery on agriculture in the Philippines, which shows those islands to be anything but desirable possessions, although the country is now adding more than a million dollars a day to the original big prices paid for them. The report quotes Senor Manuel del Busto, formerly chief of the agricultural experiment station, at Manila, to show the social stagnation—the increase in population from 1842 to 1888 was less than 4 per cent; also their characteristics—"the middle and

lower classes are almost of the worst possible type, irresponsible and degenerate, morally and physically insensible of any contracts or obligations, written or oral, ready to cheat and expecting to be cheated, and amenable, no sort of persuasion except brute force, from which they are always ready to escape by moving their habitat." After reciting the difficulties connected with clearing ground and getting a crop planted, the report says: "When this is accomplished and a luxuriant crop is raised, it is at the mercy of the first typhoon, which in the northern part of the archipelago, is severe. These wind and rain storms level crops, uproot trees, demolish houses and flood with water everything that has been left by the wind, turning plantations into lakes and swamps, and rendering the primitive roads impassable for long periods." Here is another extract: "Diseases, so far hardly known to European doctors, result from the turning up of this virgin soil. According to competent medical authority, many of these strange disorders cause death in a few hours, while by others, even if the patient recovers, he is condemned to a wretched and lingering existence. One of the commonest of these diseases is temporary or permanent paralysis, with almost endless complications."

Mr. William Bryan, of New York City, now visiting Washington, said in reply to questions: "The factional strife that is going on in New York City isn't of much consequence to the democratic party at large, for no principle is involved in it, and the whole struggle is for personal aggrandizement. The taint of commercialism, in fact, is over everything in New York, and dominates its politics absolutely. The mass of democratic voters in New York are for W. J. Bryan for President and for a re-adoption of the Chicago platform. If Mr. Bryan is chosen next year he will carry New York State."

It is regarded as significant that the administration should have considered it necessary for the Postmaster General to make public an official denial of the charge that the letters of the volunteers in the Philippines were being censored.

The Sampson clique is still on top in the Navy Department and is still determined to try to down Admiral Schley, and as the clique owns Secretary Long it is able to use all the machinery of the department for its own purposes. It has compelled Lieut. Commander Hodgson to make a monkey of himself by subscribing to an official statement branding himself as a liar, in order to bolster up the absurd claim that Admiral Schley ordered the Brooklyn to run away from one of Cervera's ships, although to do so he had to come dangerously near to colliding with the Texas, and it is even contemplating the ordering of a court of inquiry by Secretary Long, to be made up of officers who can be depended upon by the clique to report against Schley. All of this disgraceful mess is a part of the scheme of the clique to lessen the number of Schley's friends in Congress, they having them numerous enough at the last session in the Senate to defeat the scheming of the Sampson clique. The members of this clique do not seem to realize that they have been long ago sized up by the press and by public opinion, both of which are almost unanimously ranged on the side of Admiral Schley.

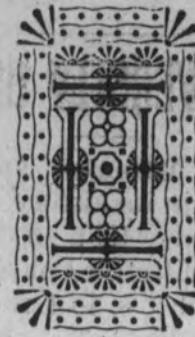
