STATE NEWS.

Happenings in North Carolina.

Washington county will have a centennial celebration on July 4th. It will be a hundred years old on December 30th, this year.

Harvey's shingle mill at Kinston was destroyed by fire Tuesday morning. The electric light plant of the town was also badly damaged.

The Salisbury Sun and Durham Herald have both enlarged to seven column papers. We are glad to see them showing such evidence of prosperity.

A train on the Southern railroad between Salisbury and Charlotte, Sunday night run over a young man and completely cut his body in two just below the waist. He lived two hours in this condition.

The Clyde Line steamer Pawnee was burned Sunday morning ninety miles off Hatteras while enroute from Brunswick, Ga., to New York. All the crew were picked up by a passing steamer, but the vessel and cargo were destroyed.

Tom Meadows, of Graham county, who was thought to have suicided some six or eight months ago, died at the hands of his wife, who shot him. The recent grand jury of that county, we learn, found a true bill to this effect against her.—Murphy Scout.

There seems to be much uncertainty as to the rebuilding of the Benbow House at Greensboro. Mr. Fisher, a Greensboro man tells the News and Observer, proposes to rebuild on one condition—that, he be allowed to sell whiskey. If this condition is not complied with, and the Greensboro man says it will not be, Fisher declares he will allow the walls and charred ruins to remain just as they are—an eyesore to the citizens of the place. Mr. Fisher has been offered \$35,000 for the walls and site, but declines to take it.

A Striking Growth.

The New York Journal of Commerce finds that in August of last year the South had 3,670,000 cotton spindles, against 1,725,000 in August, 1890, a gain of 1,945,000 spindles in eight years, or over 100 per cent. Fresh facts gathered by The Journal: Fifty new mills are under construction or in preparation, involving an outlay of \$11,500,000 and an addition of 700,000 new spindles. Besides these, 39 concerns are enlarging their present facilities so as to add 400,000 new spindles. Thus in 5 months \$17,000,000 of capital and 1,100,000 new spindles are to be added to the productive capacity of the South. South Carolina leads in this expansion with 375,000 new spindles, and North Carolina follows next with 236,000. The mills mentioned produce cotton piece goods or yarns. The hosiery and knitting mills also are being started and a silk mill is reported. The development or manufacturing interests in the South may not conduce to clear or unselfish tariff ideas, but it tends doubtless toward a diversification of the agricultural idea of money and finance.—Baltimore Sun.

The United States authorities at San Francisco have refused to permit the landing at that port of ten Filipino musicians who have contracted to play during the coming season at a summer resort in New York State. They are denied the privilege of landing on the ground that it would be in violation of the alien contract labor law. President McKinley has just paid Spain twenty million dollars for the Philippines archipelago, or two dollars apiece for the ten million inhabitants thereof. Our soldiers are fighting against what the administration terms an insurrection against the authority of the United States in the Philippine Islands. The President insists that those people belong to us and that their territory is now a part and parcel of the United States. Then why have not the Filipinos the right to make contracts with anybody in the United States and move about on any part of the territory of the United States like any other citizens? There is something out of joint.

A Pastor Should Lead His Flock.

"The minister should be given to understand that his congregation expects to share in the ripest knowledge he possesses and will appreciate his most careful thinking," writes Ian Maclaren, of "How to Make the Most of Your Minister," in the July Ladies' Home Journal. "When he rises to his height on any occasion and preaches a great sermon, it does not matter whether every person has understood every word or some of them only about one-half. He ought to be told that all the members of his church are proud of him and thank God for him, and that even if he were beyond them this was not because of obscurity but because of elevation, and that they are pleased to have a minister who lives at such a level. He must not come down to them, but they must strive to rise to him. It is a miserable business for a preacher to repeat the commonplace of his people in a showy form so that the man in the street goes home congratulating himself because he has heard his paltry ideas tricked out in a showy dress. It is the function of the prophet to lead his flock onward, even though the march be sometimes through the wilderness, and they ought to follow close behind him and tell him that they are there, and that they will not cease to follow till he has brought them into the fullness of the Land of Promise. Under those conditions a man will feel bound to read the best books and to think out every subject to its very heart; he will grudge no labor of brain, no emotion of soul to meet the expectation of a thoughtful, broad-minded people, and if he come at last to be a leader of thought whose words fly far and wide, then to this congregation will the credit be due who believed in him, and demanded great things of him, and made of him more than he, in his most ambitious moment, could have imagined."
