A Striking Growth.

The New York Journal of Commerce finds that in August of last year the South had 3,670,000 cotton spindles, against 1,725,000 in August, 1890, a gain of 1,945,000 spindles in eight years, or over 100 under construction or in preparation, involving an outlay of \$11, 500,000 and an addition of 700,000 new spindles. Besides these, 39 concerns are enlarging their present facilities so as to add 400,-000 new spindles. 




