A train struck a crowded carriage at Indianapolis, Ind., yesterday and killed 7-year-old Hazel Shaffer and injured three others.

Lieutenant Colonel M. P. Maus, of General Miles' staff, was married Wednesday to Miss Lindsay Poor, at Skaneateles, N. Y.

The Government transport McPherson has arrived at New York from San Juan, Puerto Rico, bringing several citizens and army officers.

The Union Traction Company has been incorporated at Indianapolis, Ind., with a capital of \$2,000,000, to operate a number of the city and suburban street railways.

The Appellate division of the Supreme Court of New York has authorized the Montauk Indians to bring to trial their suit for \$1,000,000 worth of property at Montauk Point.

LIKES THE AMERICAN COMPANY'S PRESS.

An Arkansas Firm Used it Last Season With Great Satisfaction.

A. J. Clements, of the firm of Clements & Daniel, cotton ginners of Lonoke, Ark., was in the city yesterday. Mr. Clements was seen by a Commercial Appeal representative in the office of the American Cotton Company, in the Continental building, and he talked very enthusiastically of that company's Roundlap bale press, which he has been operating at his gin the past season. He compressed about 4,000 bales on his Roundlap bale press, and the cotton was all sold at the press at Memphis prices. Mr. Clements says that a Roundlap bale from the American Company's press will net from \$2.50 to \$3.00 more than from the old press. In fact, a farmer a few months ago made a test of the matter, bringing the exact number of pounds of the same quality to Mr. Clements that he did to a square bale press, without letting either gin know he was making the test, and the Roundlap bale netted just \$3.75 more than the square bale.

Mr. Clements says that one season has satisfied him of the merits of the American Company's Roundlap bale press. It is a good thing he says, both for the ginner and the farmer, and his firm will continue its use and abandon its other press entirely.—From the Commercial Appeal, Memphis, Tenn.

A Problem for the Prospective Advertiser.

The question of how extensively to advertise naturally comes to the mind of the merchant newly started in business. As a prudent man he counts the cost, and endeavors to estimate the probable returns. He would not be a far seeing man, and would probably never be a successful tradesman, if he should not consider these matters. Having considered them, if he should decide not to advertise he might as well close up his establishment; for he could not expect to successfully compete with his more alert competitors. If he should determine to go right at advertising with vim and persistence, however, and keep at it, using a good and well circulated newspaper as his medium, he would make far more money out of his business notices than would the newspaper which should print them.—Philadelphia Record.

Three Members of a Family go Insane.

In the Illinois Northern Hospital for the Insane at Elgin there died on Friday last Ellen L. Gilson. In the same institution is her daughter, Gertrude, and her brother, Elmer E. Day. All of them lost their reason through the study of Christian Science.

All the victims were persons of apparently keen minds. Day was a druggist in Elgin and had a remunerative business. Mrs. Gilson lived in Blue Island, where she owned property and where she was much respected by her neighbors. Her daughter was a kindergarten teacher in the public schools of Chicago. In none of them was there any lack of mental balance until long after they had become devoted to the beliefs of Christian Science.

Mrs. Gilson and her daughter took up Christian Science in 1897 under the teachings of the Rev. J. C. F. Grumbine, then of Chicago, but now of Syracuse. The brother Elmer E. Day, was at one time an alderman in Elgin. In June, 1898 he went to Chicago on a visit, and while there he was seized with acute mania, developing with homicidal and suicidal tendencies. One of Day's peculiarities was to advise customers of his drug store not to buy medicines or drugs, telling them they would not need them if they had faith in Christ. In this manner he ruined his own business. Neither Day nor his niece can recover.—Elgin, Ill., Dispatch.

What Worried Him Most.

Said a middle-aged man on his death-bed, "The one thing that worries me most, and causes me to dread to die, is that my grown-up son and daughter have not been brought up to work—have not been taught any occupation, and know nothing about earning a living. I am not able to work for them any longer, and have not accumulated enough to last them long. I now see that this has been my greatest mistake, and heaven only knows what will become of my doubly-poor children!" How many parents there are who have made and are making the same mistake today. The poorest persons are those who have been comfortably supported in their youth in idleness and then suddenly bereaved of their supporters, with no one to care for them when their parents are gone. They have no occupation, been taught to despise labor, and when thrown out into the cold world bare-handed are really good-for-nothing, and not able to support themselves even poorly. They live a "hand-to-mouth" existence, too often become paupers or criminals, and despised by the community generally. All young persons, male or female, whose parents are well-to-do, especially, should be taught some art, trade, profession or occupation whereby they may be able to earn a decent living after their parents have been deprived of their property or are in their graves. Parents who fail to instruct their children in the way of earning a living cannot lay claim to being respectable members of society, no matter how much their present possessions may be, for in this country riches too often take wings and fly away without much warning.—Ex.

Convicts Tracked by a Mule.

A letter from Valdosta, Ga., says: "A rather interesting story comes from down about Genoa, Fla., of an old mule which tracked a gang of escaped convicts for two days and led to their capture. The convicts were at Savage & Co.'s stockade and made their escape a few days ago. There were no track dogs at the camp, but a posse was formed to hunt for the men. Among the animals which the men had to ride was an old mule that had been on a similar chase many times before. As soon as the men started out they noticed that the mule put its nose to the ground just as a track dog would and started off as if on a trail. The mule was allowed to go almost as it pleased, and the men were finally convinced that the mule was right. The chase was kept up for two days, and the convicts were captured below Lake City, a distance of fifty miles. The men are now convinced that the capture of the fugitives was due to the good scenting powers of the mule. The story, though it sounds a little fishy, comes through entirely trustworthy sources."—Baltimore Sun.

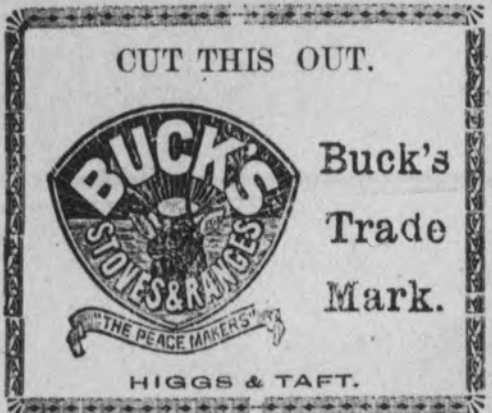
