The Durham Herald well says:

"If the farmers would back up the local warehousemen it would be no trouble to throttle the warehouse trusts."

This is right. The farmers are not so much at the mercy of the trust as some would have them believe. The trust is a failure without tobacco, and where the goods that are wanted and must be had are for sale, the trust must go there to buy. If the charge that a trust has been organized to control the places of sale, or rather to compel, so far as it can, the sale at a certain place or a few places and close warehouses established at other places is true, then the farmers should organize to resist this by sticking to their local markets. Let every tub stand on its own bottom. The trust cannot succeed in closing warehouses unless the owners thereof sell out to it, and this they are not compelled to do; and if they do it may be known they receive more from the trust than they could expect from the handling of the product on their own floors. There is no law, human or divine, that we are aware of which will prevent sales under such circumstances, or circumstances which are satisfactory to owner and seller, and buyer; but neither is there, or can there be any enactment which will compel the trust or any one else to buy on any particular market or at all.

But the trust and all others engaged in manufacturing are compelled to buy or go out of business, and rather than go out of business will buy, somewhere, and anywhere the best goods can be had. The farmers therefore can be as powerful, if they will, as the trust. They can say of themselves where they will sell, if they cannot regulate the prices at which they will sell. It is an insult to the spirit of independence as well as intelligence of our farmers to say they can be made mere vassals by a few shrewd men. Let them be as determined and as united as those with whom they deal can be, and they will compel the consideration due them. We have not lost faith in the people, nor do we believe that they can be "injured" for long by any combination. Mutual dependence will yet assert itself and re-establish the equilibrium according as conditions may require and intelligence dictate.—Raleigh Post.

### Greensboro's Gala Week.

The state firemen's tournament will be held in Greensboro, August 1st, 2d, 3rd, and 4th, and the people of that progressive city propose to celebrate the occasion in a fitting manner. The celebration will be turned into a "gala week" of the rarest enjoyment, and all who attend will be made to feel at home in the "Gate City" of North Carolina.

In addition to the meeting of the North Carolina State Firemen's Association, and the many interesting events incident thereto, such as quick-steaming contests, reel races, hook and ladder races, etc., there will be many other interesting and instructive features. On Tuesday, August 1st, a road congress will be held, and addresses will be made by Prof. J. A. Holmes state geologist, and other prominent and well-informed people on the subject of good roads. Tuesday night the annual meeting of the State Horticultural Society will be held. The grand street parade and spectacular trades display will come off Wednesday morning, and this feature alone will be worth traveling miles to see. Wednesday afternoon will be devoted to horse-racing. Liberal purses are offered and some of the finest blooded stock extant will be on the turf. The half-mile track has been put in splendid condition for the occasion and those who attend may confidently expect to see some interesting races. The industrial exhibit, the trades display and the fine arts exhibit will be specially attractive. Two spacious exhibit halls have been secured, and two of the finest bands in the state will give continuous concerts. No admission will be charged to anything, except the horse races.

Greensboro is putting on her Sunday clothes for this event and her citizens are bubbling over with enthusiasm. Tremendous crowds are anticipated and everybody that comes may feel that they will be properly cared for. Not only the hotels and boarding houses but the private homes of citizens will be thrown open to visitors. If you go to Greensboro you will not be "a stranger in a strange land," but you will be the guest of the most hospitable people on the globe. They will take you by the hand and make you feel that you are among friends.

The railroad rates are so low as to enable all to attend. Tickets will be sold on a basis of one first-class fare for the round trip. Tickets will be on sale July 31, and August 1, 2, and 3, good to return until August 7. On August 2 and 3 (Wednesday and Thursday) a rate of practically one cent a mile will prevail. This rate will apply to points within 150 miles of Greensboro and extend beyond that distance to include Wilmington, Kinston, Rocky Mount and Asheville.

A Morganton special to the Charlotte Observer says a strange fatality seems to attend the Houston family of that place. Early in May three members of the family died of smallpox, these being the only deaths from that disease in Morganton. Two other members of the family were recently discharged from the pest house cured. Saturday morning one of these, a young man, Sandy Houston by name, shot his sister-in-law, the widow of a brother who had died with smallpox. The woman has since died. Both parties claimed that the shooting was accidental but the neighbors say that a violent quarrel was in progress when the shooting occurred. Young Houston is in jail awaiting an investigation.

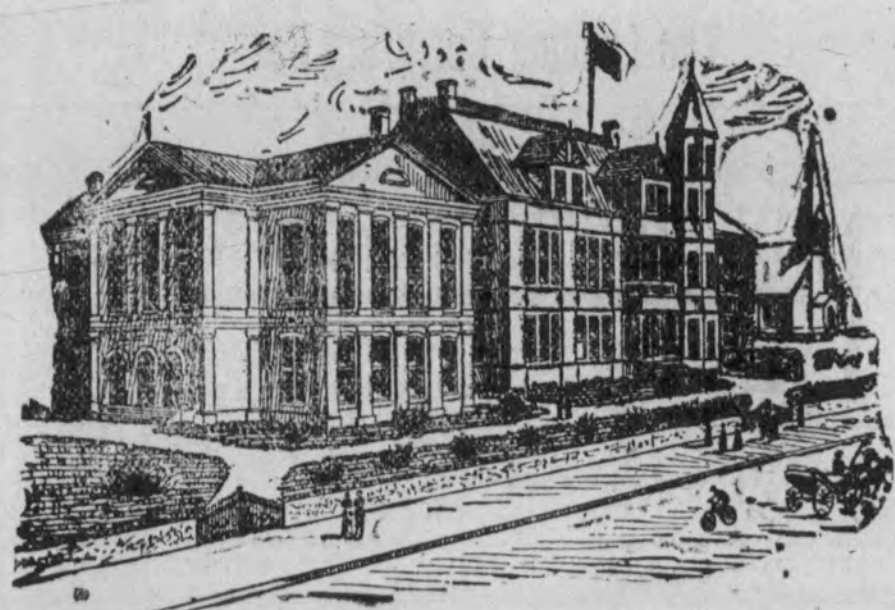

## LIGHTNING'S FATAL STROKE

### A Man and Two Mules Killed and Several Persons Injured.

Fayetteville, July 10.—News was brought here Saturday of a lamentable catastrophe on Mr. John Kirkpatrick's plantation, in Gray's Creek township, in the southern part of this county, whereby, during a thunderstorm Andrew Murdock was killed, together with two mules, while Mrs. Murdock, a little white boy and Henry Gilmore and a girl, the last two colored, were more or less stunned and injured.

During the prevalence of the storm the party, who were at work on the farm, took refuge under a large tree, under which it had been the custom for the hands to take the noon-day meal. Mr. Murdock was killed instantly. Gilmore was restored to life, but is badly hurt and can hardly recover. Mrs. Murdock was terribly burned on different parts of her body. The colored girl was burned on one foot, while the boy seems to have received serious internal injuries.

### Smallpox Record in State.

The Health Bulletin, which is issued by the North Carolina Board of Health, gives the smallpox record in the State from January 12, 1898, to May 1st, 1899.

There was a total of 616 cases, 551 of which were colored and 162 white. The disease was confined to 38 counties. There was a total of 17 deaths, 9 of which were colored and 8 white.

In the number of deaths McDowell led, with a total of 6, while Mecklenburg followed with 3. The death rate was 2.76 per cent. Among the colored population the death rate was 4.93 per cent, and 1.97 among the whites.
