

Etiquette of Cards.

It has always been a general rule that so long as a girl was unmar ried and lived at home she had no separate visiting card, but shared that of her mother, under whose name her own appeared. This rule still holds in society, but so many girls nowadays are engaged in professional careers which cause them to strike out a line of their own and make a different set of acquaintances from that of their mother that the rule has in such cases become very much modified.

If a girl's mother is dead, the daughter's name is printed below her father's on the usual lady's card, never on a man's card, and if the father and mother are both dead and the young lady resides with a brother her name is printed below his, also on a lady's card.

Inquiries in case of illness or after a death on the the bereaved family should never be omitted The lady inquiring should leave a card with "To inquire" written up on it. If a new and undesirable acquaintance persumes to call first on another lady, the latter can check the unwelcome intimacy by leaving cards after a long interval instead of returning the call.

The card should be a thin white piece of pasteboard, absolutely plain, without border or ornament of any kind. This card should be exactly three and one-half by two and one-half inches in size, and the name should be in the center in copper-plate characters. The address should be in the lower left hand corner and in rather smaller characters of the same description.

A great swimming tank stretches nearly the whole length of the building, 350 feet long and 150 feet wide. It is amply long enough for spirited swimming races. Numerous smaller tanks are stowed about; altogether, they hold nearly two million gallons of water.

The great house is built on a solid rock foundation, hollowed out to sea level. Pure salt water is admitted in vast quantities, permitted to "settle" in settling reservoirs, and then passed through the tanks. There are 517 private dressing rooms and club rooms, with capacity for nine bathers each. Nearly two thousand lockers are provided.

Above the tanks are seven toboggan slides, nine spring boards, three trapezes, one high dive and thirty swinging rings. For nonbathers there are seats provided at one end, and a museum to while away their time in. The seats will accommodate 7,400 spectators and the restaurant will feed 1,000 peo-

From any place in the building you can hear the waves of the open sea breaking upon two massive riprap breakwaters outside, which contain 750 000 cubic feet of rock The engines which pump the water in and out are of enormous size. They supply 6,000 gallons every



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

Shot to Death in a Cell. |

Gainesville, Ga., July 15.—A mob of about thirty men surrounded the Hall county jail early this morning and by a clever ruse tricked the sheriff into admitting them to the jail, after which five of them went to the cell of Si. Remember the Oxford Orphans Smith, the murderer of Judge W. B. Snell, of Atlanta, and shot him to death, riddling his body with bullets and spattering his blood on the cell walls. The mob pretended to be a sheriff's posse from Gwinnett county, with a prisoner who they wanted to lodge in the Hall county jail for safe keeping. The leader of the mob said he was the sheriff of Gwinnett and the unsuspecting sheriff of Hall county, W. B. Munday, admitted the men, After their bloody work the mob quickly dispersed. The Governor will be asked to offer a reward for the capture of the men composing the mob. There is great indignation among the people here that such a rime was committed.

Smith was asleep when the mob entered. Without warning or arousing him, one of the mob deliberately leveled his pistol at the sleeping form and emptied it, one of the first bullets piercing the heart of the victim. The other men opened fire on the prisoner and when they ceased firing the victim's body had been riddled with bull ets.

It is an encouraging sign when men of known fitness and free from partisanship, who enjoy the confidence of the people are chosen for this important office.
