### TRINITY NOTES.

Trinity College, July 15.—There has just been issued a Trinity College Album giving various views of the buildings and sections of the park.

Rev. Plato Durham is on a tour through the western part of the state in the interest of the College. He is making himself felt as a young man of very extraordinary platform ability.

Dr. Bassett who is at the head of the College Library, has received a very large number of books since commencement, and is very enthusiastic over the growth of this department of the College.

Very many changes are being made in the surrounding of Trinity Park High School, and we learn from the authorities of this school that the outlook for next year is beyond their greatest expectation.

Plans have been perfected for remodeling the Crowell Science Hall. When this work is completed it will be one of the best arranged buildings for science connected with any College in the South.

President Kilgo expects to add several thousand dollars worth of new apparatus to the Scientific Laboratories.

A very large number of visitors have been to the Park recently. Many returning from the Summer School at Chapel Hill have stopped in Durham to look over Trinity College. These visitors are enthusiastic over what they saw.

Dr. J. S. Bassett left the Park today for Richmond. From there he will go to Goldsboro to join Mrs. Bassett for a weeks stay in that city.

#### Proposed Warehouse Trust.

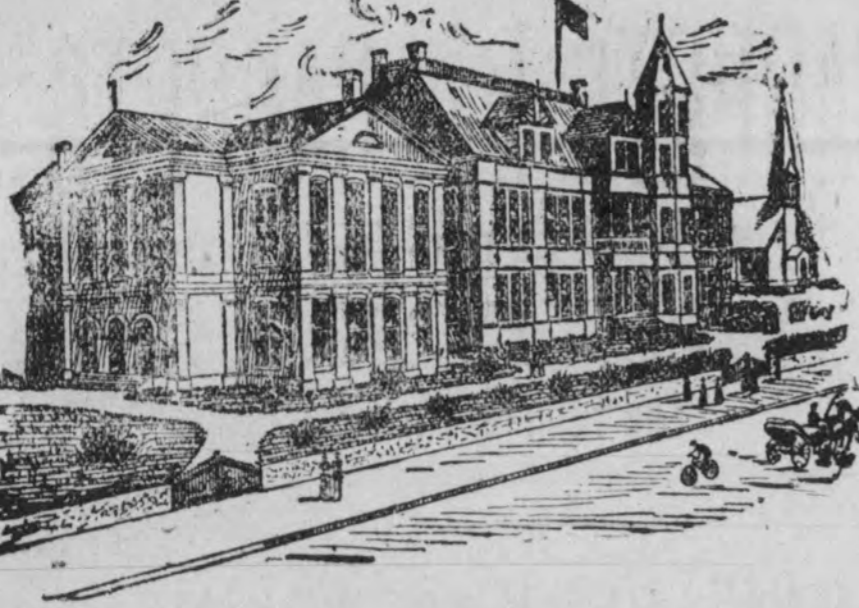

**Stamps on Checks.**

The Commissioner of Internal Revenue has just issued a circular, absolutely prohibiting banks from affixing stamps to unstamped checks when presented for payment, and requiring them to return the checks to the drawers. The Banks failing to obey the order and continuing to stamp checks unstamped will be prosecuted.

The order does away with a previous order allowing banks to affix stamps and which was allowed under an emergency, but now that the law is understood no bank will be allowed to affix stamps, and a heavy penalty will be put upon those who violate the order.—Wilson News.

### Shot to Death in a Cell.

Gainesville, Ga., July 15.—A mob of about thirty men surrounded the Hall county jail early this morning and by a clever ruse tricked the sheriff into admitting them to the jail, after which five of them went to the cell of Si. Smith, the murderer of Judge W. B. Snell, of Atlanta, and shot him to death, riddling his body with bullets and spattering his blood on the cell walls. The mob pretended to be a sheriff's posse from Gwinnett county, with a prisoner who they wanted to lodge in the Hall county jail for safe keeping. The leader of the mob said he was the sheriff of Gwinnett and the unsuspecting sheriff of Hall county, W. B. Munday, admitted the men. After their bloody work the mob quickly dispersed. The Governor will be asked to offer a reward for the capture of the men composing the mob. There is great indignation among the people here that such a crime was committed. Smith was asleep when the mob entered. Without warning or arousing him, one of the mob deliberately leveled his pistol at the sleeping form and emptied it, one of the first bullets piercing the heart of the victim. The other men opened fire on the prisoner and when they ceased firing the victim's body had been riddled with bullets.

### An Encouraging Sign.

Clements, a gentleman splendidly equipped in capacity and character, Durham followed by electing Prof. Massey, Franklin by electing Mr. Bruce White. Wilson by electing Prof. Jas. W. Hays, and Pitt by electing Prof. W. H. Ragsdale, president of the Teacher's Assembly and other counties by selecting men of like character and position.

The efficiency of the public schools is more important than anything else in North Carolina. Their efficiency largely depends upon the county superintendents. It is an encouraging sign when men of known fitness and free from partisanship, who enjoy the confidence of the people are chosen for this important office.
