WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent.
Washington, D. C., July 21, '99

The refusal of the administration to take any notice of the courageous exposure by the newspaper correspondents at Manila, of the deception practiced upon the people of this country by Gen. Otis in his official dispatches and of the extraordinary tactics employed by him to prevent the truth being cabled by the correspondents, is a tacit acknowledgement that the deception has been carried on with the knowledge and approval of the administration. This attitude of the administration has been harshly criticized by prominent republicans as well as by everybody else. If the exposure had been made by one correspondent it would have been right enough to say that it might have been inspired by personal prejudice, but it was signed by every prominent correspondent at Manila, including those of the Associated Press, which furnishes papers of all shades of politics, and moreover it merely confirmed what was known to many for months past. If the administration enjoys its present position, its opponents ought to raise no objection, as it is making anti-McKinley votes by thousands.

Secretary Alger has told Mr. McKinley what he had previously told everybody else—that his resignation, which accompanied the information, might take effect at his pleasure. That was no news to Mr. McKinley and has not relieved his embarrassment a bit. Members of the Cabinet are not in the habit of refusing to resign when asked by the President to do so. The only man who ever did so was Belknap, who had to be kicked out of Grant's cabinet.

While it is not known positively what concessions were granted by this Government in the four treaties negotiated with England, under the Dingley law, respectively for trade reciprocity with the English colonies of Barbadoes, Bermuda, British Guiana and Jamaica, it is said that they are equivalent to a horizontal reduction of 12 per cent in the duties levied by the Dingley tariff on the products of those colonies. All of these treaties will have to be approved by the House as well as the Senate before they go into effect. The time limit was reached this week, and no more treaties can be negotiated under the Dingley law.

foot in administration circles to throw Hobart overboard to make Gov. Roosevelt Mr. McKinley's running mate in next year's campaign, the idea being that Roosevelt's war record will neutralize any defections caused by Algerism and administration war blunders and mismanagement. Roosevelt's consent has not yet been obtained, and that is why the idea is being publicly pushed. The managers of the scheme think that if the McKinley and Roosevelt ticket is advocated by a large number of republican papers it will tickle the vanity of Gov. "Teddy" to such an extent that he will consent to being shelved by becoming a candidate for Vice President. Mr. Hobart's consent has not been obtained, either, but that is not considered any more necessary than was Levi P. Morton's consent when a similar game was played, notwithstanding the close personal friendship existing between Mr. McKinley and Mr. Hobart. Friendship counts for nothing with the men who are arranging for Mr. McKinley's political future.

The Horse's Wonderful Power of Smell.

The following from Horse and Stable shows how very keen indeed must be the horse's sense of smell: "The horse will leave musty hay untouched in his bin, however hungry. He will not drink of water objectionable to his questioning sniff, or from a bucket which some odor makes offensive, however thirsty. His intelligent nostril will widen, quiver and query over the dainties bit offered by the fairest of hands, with coaxing that would make a mortal shut his eyes and swallow a nauseous mouthful at a gulp. A mare is never satisfied by either sight or whinny that her colt is really her own until she has a certified nasal certificate to the fact. A blind horse now living will not allow the approach of any stranger without showing signs of anger not safely to be disregarded. The distinction is evidently made by his sense of smell and at a considerable distance. Blind horses as a rule, will gallop wildly about a pasture without striking the surrounding fence. The sense of smell informs them of its proximity. Others will, when loosened from the stable, go direct to the gate or bars opened to their accustomed feeding ground, and when desiring to return, after hours of careless wandering, will distinguish one outlet and patiently await its opening. The odor of that particular part of the fence is their pilot to it. The horse in browsing or while gathering herbage with its lips is guided in its choice of proper food entirely by its nostrils. Blind horses do not make mistakes in their diet."

A REMARKABLE RACE.

Detroit, Mich., 19.—The gamiest struggle to win the Merchants and Manufacturers' \$10,000 trotting stake since the inception of that annual event ten years ago, was witnessed on the Grosse Pointe track today by more than 9,000 enthusiastic spectators, and the sun went down leaving the result decidedly in doubt, after the four leaders had each been credited with one heat. In the third heat The Queen lowered Directum Kelly's 2:11 record, the best time in the M. and M. until today, three-quarters of a second.

If horses names count for anything, those of the four leaders of the big event, King Mond, The Queen, Royal Baron and Success, were entirely appropriate. So far as it went, the race was a splendid exhibition of drivers' skill combined with young, fast horse flesh. King Mond, the strong favorite of the day, encouraged his backers by getting a heat. Then the exciting finishes began. McHenry, in a wonderful drive, in the stretch pushed Success into a winning in an almost dead heat finish with King Mond. Geers did likewise with The Queen in the third heat. He tried it again in the fourth, but The Queen failed to carry out her noted driver's plans, and again "went up" in the stretch, and Royal Baron rushed out of the bunch and took the heat, while another hitherto conspicuous member of the aristocracy; Lady Wellington, of Cleveland, followed close to the Baron's heels and got third place.

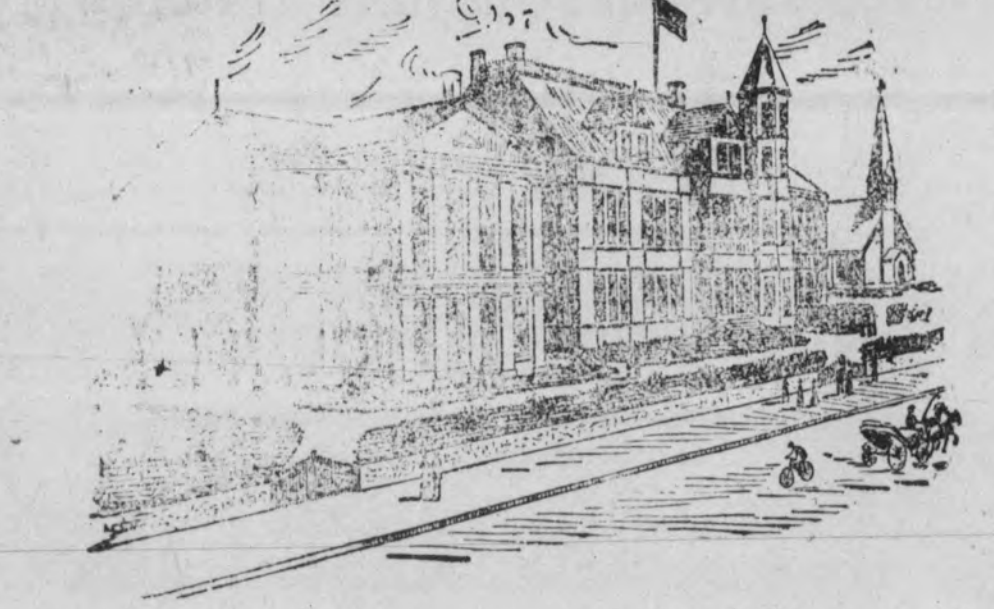

COAST LINE DEPOT BURNED.

The A. C. L. Depot in Kinston and all the Books and Records Therein Destroyed.

The Coast Line depot here was destroyed by fire this afternoon. All the freight, books and records were burned. About \$200 that was in the money drawer was also burned. Fortunately there was a smaller quantity of freight than usual in the depot. The total loss is at least \$6,000.

Mr. T. J. Meacham, the agent, has been home ill for about a week, and his son Mr. C. T. Meacham has been in charge. Mr. C. T. Meacham and all other employes left for dinner about noon.

About 12:20 o'clock people living nearby discovered the depot to be on fire. The fire seemed to have caught in the warehouse, supposed to have been caused by someone passing through carelessly throwing a cigar or cigarette stump down, or it may have been spontaneous combustion.

Hines Bros.' mill sounded the alarm at 12:25 o'clock, and the town fire alarm sounded shortly afterwards.

The hose was laid in about seven minutes after the alarm, but Mr. Brinson, who has charge of the fire engine, was at dinner, and engine being slow in steaming, and having such a long distance to force water through the hose, the building was lost before a stream could be thrown on it. The firemen worked hard and did all they could, several being overcome with heat.

Hose was laid from Hines Bros' Lumber mills and a stream thrown on the south end of the warehouse thereby saving the cotton seed storage house nearby.

During the fire two explosions occurred from drums of gasoline in the warehouse. At one of these explosions the gasoline flamed way up in the heavens and made a grand and beautiful sight, though very awe inspiring.—Kinston Free Press.
