

Six Years For President.

United States Senator Harris will introduce three amendments to the Federal Constitution at the next session of Congress, and ask that they be submitted to a vote of the people.

The first will provide that the President shall be elected for a term of six years, instead of four, and that he shall be ineligible for re-election.

The second is designed to make the term of Congressmen four years. The third will provide for the election of United States Senators by direct vote of the people.
